On separate weeks, over 300 people attended the Knights Fish Fry Dinners Fridays during Lent.

For the past three years, the Knights have been putting on the Father's Day Pancake Breakfast. This year, approximately 100 people were served after the two Sunday Masses.

For the first time this past year, the council purchased over 100 "Coats for Kids" which were distributed by





SVDP Society. Over \$3000 was distributed in the form of scholarships and aid to Catholic schools.

Congratulations to Brittany Feurstein, the winner of the \$2000 "Fritz Neumann" scholarship. Congratulations also to Mike Groves who was named Knight of the Year for his many contributions to the Council.

Youth Ministry—Can a conference really be "life-changing"? by Christine Goss

This 3 part series will look at the National Catholic Youth each participant's cost. The balance is met through a combination Conference: what it is, who from Immaculate is attending, and how the conference experience impacts their faith and their lives.

What is NCYC?

NCYC is the National Catholic Youth Conference, the largest Catholic youth-based conference in the country. It is organized by the National Federation for Catholic Youth Ministry (NFCYM) and held every other year.

Who attends NCYC?

Catholic high school teens from across the country attend NCYC, along with youth ministers, chaperones, priests, deacons, and more! In 2013 over 23,000 young people and chaperones attended NCYC.

Where is NCYC?

NCYC 2015 is in Indianapolis, Indiana – held between the Convention How does someone participate in NCYC? Center and Lucas Oil Stadium (where the Indianapolis Colts play!).

How much does it cost? Who pays for it?

Costs for the trip vary from year to year, but typically cost about \$1,200 per person. Our parish, under the leadership of Fr. Jerry with approval of the Finance Committee, has generously paid a portion of of fundraising efforts and individual family contributions.

Does NCYC have a theme?

Every year the conference has an overall theme. For 2015, the theme is "Here I am Lord." Each of the three days of the conference also has a specific scripture theme which is the center of the keynote presentation for that day.

What's the point?

NCYC offers high school students and their adult chaperones multiple opportunities to interact and learn more about our Catholic faith. From general sessions to workshops to occasions to be of service and participate in the sacraments to the chance to dance or play basketball, NCYC attempts to engage the head, heart, and hands of all participants.

Our parish delegation of 11 teens and 2 adult chaperones is currently set for NCYC 2015. If you are going to be a high school student in Fall 2017 and are interested in attending NCYC - get involved in Youth Ministries and our Parish now! The preparation and fundraising for NCYC goes on for almost an entire year before the trip, so the 2017 delegation will be identified in late 2016. Details are always posted in the Parish Bulletin.



Lynn Winterberger's Cheesy Potatoes

Mix together in large bowl:

- 1 pkg (20 oz) shredded hashbrown potatoes (refrigerated Simply Potatoes)
- 1 10 and 3/4 oz. can of cream of chicken (or celery/mushroom/broccoli) soup
- ½ 1 cup sour cream
- 2 cups shredded sharp cheddar cheese

Spray 13 x 9 glass or metal baking dish with non-stick cooking spray.


Bake at 350 degrees for 70 minutes, or until golden brown and potatoes are cooked through.

When I make it for my family, I usually triple or quadruple the recipe (using 2 cups of sour cream regardless) and cook it overnight in the 6-quart crockpot on low. If I need to, I throw in on high in the morning for an hour or so.

ENCYCLICAL?

Answer: about the Papal Encyclical, Laudato Si', so Father Jerry suggested that I write about them for this issue. An encyclical is something that the Holy Father writes, but what does it mean? There are different kinds of Vatican communications, documents, or decrees. For example, there are Exhortations, Constitutions, Letters, Bulls, and Encyclicals, which we examine today.

What then, is an encyclical? The word comes from the Greek, εγκύκλιος, which transliterates to egkyklios, meaning circle. In the early days of the church, written documents would be carried to their destinations. These encyclicals were meant to be "circulated" among the bishops, who would then share them with their flocks.

The more contemporary encyclical dates back to Pope Benedict XIV in 1740. Encyclicals are written in Latin, and then translated into the vernacular. Until fairly recently, this task was burdensome, translating the original text into Latin, and then, translating back into various languages. Today, this happens far more quickly. An encyclical may be sent to all bishops, or to a certain group, depending on the meaning or teaching, but in general, they are universal.

The title of an encyclical is taken from its first sentence, pointing to the We can learn so much from studying these papal documents. They are topic to be addressed. For example, Pope Francis' first encyclical was called, Lumen Fidei, or Light of Faith. The title of Laudato Si' departs from this formula. First, it means "Praise be to you" in Umbrian, or Central Medieval Italian, a reference to words used by St. Francis of Assisi in his Canticle of the Sun. In addition, the title of the encyclical always has a subtitle, in this case, "on the care of our common home."

All of this is a long way of saying that an encyclical is a form of for Administration Fran Szplczyn.

Question: WHAT IS A PAPAL communicating to the bishops, to the Catholic world, and to all interested people of good will. That last part is important, because it clearly illustrates the universal and evangelical nature of our faith.

> > Laudato Si' is a long encyclical, and highly misunderstood. This is a reminder to read the encyclical itself, and not just about it. In addition to Laudato Si', here are some encyclicals that I recommend:
