


There is no set budgeted amount for the building fund. It is sustained by individual members' generosity, who choose to contribute to it.



### Early Signs and Symptoms of Alzheimer's

Memory loss that disrupts daily life may be a symptom of Alzheimer's or another dementia. Alzheimer's is a brain disease that causes a slow decline in memory, thinking and reasoning skills and is the most common form of dementia. There are also typical changes we see in normal aging which can make it challenging to properly diagnose dementia. In the chart below see the common warning signs of Alzheimer's compared with the corresponding normal age-related changes. Every individual may experience one or more of these signs in different degrees. If you notice any of them, please see a doctor.

- Memory loss that disrupts daily life
   What's a typical age-related change?
   Sometimes forgetting names or appointments, but
   remembering them later.
- Challenges in planning or solving problems What's a typical age-related change?
   Making occasional errors when balancing a checkbook.
- Difficulty completing familiar tasks at home, at work or at leisure
   What's a typical age-related change?
   Occasionally needing help to use the settings on a microwave or to record a television show.
- Confusion with time or place
   What's a typical age-related change?
   Getting confused about the day of the week but figuring it out later.

 Trouble understanding visual images and spatial relationships

What's a typical age-related change? Vision changes related to cataracts

- New problems with words in speaking or writing What's a typical age-related change?
   Sometimes having trouble finding the right word
- Misplacing things and losing the ability to retrace steps

What's a typical age-related change?
Misplacing things from time to time and retracing steps to find them.

- Decreased or poor judgment What's a typical age-related change?
   Making a bad decision once in a while.
- Withdrawal from work or social activities
   What's a typical age-related change?
   Sometimes feeling weary of work, family and social
   obligations.
- Changes in mood and personality
   What's a typical age-related change?
   Developing very specific ways of doing things and becoming irritable when a routine is disrupted.

### NOTES FROM YOUR PARISH NURSE

During the Month of November, Pastor Mel has asked me to do a Sunday School offering with regards to Living Wills and Durable Power of Attorney for Health Care therefore I felt it was important to repeat these two articles in this month's newsletter.

### What is a Living Will?

The purpose of a Living Will is to document your wish with regards to life-sustaining treatments. This includes artificially or technologically supplied nutrition and hydration.

If you are ever in a terminal condition or in a permanently unconscious state these treatments may be withheld or withdrawn.



A living Will does not affect the responsibility of health care providers to provide care to keep you comfortable. This comfort care involves helping to diminish pain or discomfort but will not postpone death.

If you would not choose to limit any or all forms of life-sustaining treatment, including CPR, you have the legal right to do so. You may wish to state your medical treatment preferences in writing in a different document.

Under Ohio law, a Living Will Declaration is applicable only to individuals in a terminal condition or a permanently unconscious state. If you wish to direct medical treatment in other circumstances, you should prepare a Health Care Power of Attorney. If you are in a terminal condition or a permanently unconscious state, a Living Will controls over a Health Care Power of Attorney.

If you have a Living Will and a Health Care Power of Attorney, you should keep copies of both documents together, with your other important papers, and bring copies of both your Living Will and your Health Care Power of Attorney with you whenever you are a patient in a health care facility.

I have placed copies of Living Wills and Health Care Power Of Attorney forms on the back table. Please help yourself to these forms. You are never too young or too old to take charge of your medical wishes.

### What is a Durable Power of Attorney for Health Care?

This is a legal document that allows people to appoint someone else the right to make health care decisions on their behalf. This is extremely important in the event a person becomes unable to make decisions on their own, such as in a coma or confused. As long as a person is of sound mind and can make their own decisions they will continue to make their own health care decisions.

In Ohio only a person of sound mind may create a durable power of attorney. This document must include the person's signature and the date the document was signed. The document can name any competent adult as the person's health care power of attorney. The only exclusions are your physician and the administrator of a nursing home if you reside there.

This document must be witnessed by two people who are not related to you by blood, marriage or adoption. Again your witness can not be your physician or your nursing home administrator.

A durable health care power of attorney grants specific rights, but it also limits this power as well. For example, the attorney-in-fact has the right to receive health care information about you, including such information that would normally be excluded from other parties because of doctor-patient confidentiality laws. However, the attorney-in-fact does not have the right to refuse or withdraw informed consent to health care that you previously agreed to unless there has been a significant change in your condition or the health care is no longer sufficient to achieve the purposes that you had desired

There are copies of Living Wills and Health Care Power off Attorney forms in the back on the table. Please help yourself to these forms. You are never too young or too old to take charge of your medical wishes.

### Built On A Rock

Under the golden rock face of the mountains in the northern Yunnan province of China is nestled a small white church with a tile roof. More than 200 Lisu worshipers and their international guests, including ELCA Presiding Bishop Elizabeth A. Eaton, marched outside the church singing in Chinese: "Come friends, to the little church on the mountain. For the blessing of eternal life is more than silver and gold, for here we meet God."

Seventy percent of the Lisu people, one of China's 55 ethnic minorities, are Christian. The gospel was first introduced to them some 100 years ago. Even today the Lisu live and farm in rugged mountain terrain, where some walk for hours to attend worship on Sunday. The ELCA first connected with a Lisu community north of Lijiang after a 1996 earthquake, helping renovate houses and build schools, said He Wen-gin, director of the Lisu Cultural Association.

ELCA support continues today: schoolchildren receive computers; farmers receive goats and walnut seedlings; and churches are built. The newly dedicated Meile Anqi (Rock of Ages) Christian Church is the most recent development. "This is the best facility in the province for the people," Wen-gin said. The small


complex includes the church building, a community center, a kitchen and outhouses. Its architectural elements both preserve and celebrate the Lisu culture.

In Lijiang, the Yulong County Bible Training Center houses 21 students. Ranging in age from 14 to 26, they study the Bible, music, Christian education, preaching and other skills to equip them to be lay leaders and evangelists. They will serve alongside the current two pastors to meet the needs of some 50 congregations and worship points in the region. Many of these young church leaders will continue to farm as they work with the church. They will rise to meet the challenges of contemporary society that take many newly baptized away from the church.

Through it all, the ELCA is committed to accompanying the Lisu community in its journey of faith and life. In her message at the Meile Anqi church dedication, Eaton said, "We depend on you to preach the gospel here. And we promise to you, the Lisu people, that we will preach the gospel back in America. And together we can fulfill the command of Jesus, who told his disciples to go to all the world to tell about the new life we have in Jesus."

As I prepare this article for the November Trinity Trumpet Newsletter I am concerned about our understanding of what Benevolence is and what it is spent on. My guess is most of you would be hard pressed to define Benevolence much less to be able to tell me where the money goes. I used to wonder about that myself. I, perhaps like many of you, thought the money I gave to the Benevolence fund went into some black hole never to be seen or heard from again. I now know that is simply not true. Benevolence is just another name for Mission Support. I think I understand what it means to support the mission much better than I understand the "B" word...

One way to overcome this lack of knowledge and understanding is through education. I came to an understanding of how our benevolence/Mission Support dollars are spent by reading stories like the one attached at the end of my newsletter article. This is just one of many stories of our faith in action. Through our partnership with the Southern Ohio Synod and the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America we are able to so much more than we could on our own. The story of the Lisu people of China is one small example of how we fulfill the command of Jesus from the 28<sup>th</sup> chapter of the Gospel of Saint Matthew. As we try to educate ourselves on all our Church does to serve our Lord, look for more articles like the one about the Lisu people of China in our newsletters and bulletins in the months to come.


