In quilt language, they can be referred to as the mystic knot or the endless knot. We may not know a lot about the history but we can say that the quilt blocks are quite beautiful!

Lick Skillet Recipe Corner

Creamy Fried Confetti Corn

8 bacon slices, chopped
4 cups fresh sweet corn kernels (about 8 ears)
1 medium white onion, chopped
1/3 cup chopped red bell pepper
1/3 cup chopped green bell pepper
1 (8-ounce) package cream cheese, cubed
½ cup half-and-half
1 tsp sugar
1 tsp pepper

Cook chopped bacon in large skillet until crisp; remove bacon and drain on paper towels, reserving 2 tablespoons drippings in skillet. Set bacon aside. Saute corn, onion and bell peppers in hot drippings in skillet over medium-high heat 6 minutes or until tender. Add cream cheese and halfand-half, stirring until cream cheese melts. Stir in sugar, salt and pepper. Top with reserved bacon.

Quilter's Educational Corner – The Buying Behavior of "Dedicated Quilters"

Most of us probably never knew that our "hobby" is big business. We know that in the past several years there has been a spurt of growth in the number of quilters. Every few years *Quilting in America* conducts surveys to measure the amount of time and money quilters spend on their hobby. It is time for another survey but the information from the survey conducted three years ago is quite interesting, in fact it is pretty astounding! There are 21.3 million U.S. quilters over the age of 18. The industry defines "dedicated quilters" as those that spend more than \$600 per year on quilting supplies, represent 6.2% of all U.S. quilters and account for 69% of all quilt related spending. They will buy 157.5 million yards of fabric. In 2010, all U.S. quilters spent \$3.58 billion with \$2.48 billion of that being by "dedicated quilters". The following information highlights the buying behaviors of "dedicated quilters".

QUILTING "STUFF"

- * The majority (83%) have a room dedicated to sewing/quilting activities
- * On average, he/she has \$7,504 of quilting tools & supplies and owns \$3,727 worth of fabric

SEWING MACHINES

- * He/she owns an average of 2.7 sewing machines
- * 26% own more than 4 machines
- * In a 12 month period, 19% purchased a new machine spending \$2,579 on the machine

FABRIC

- * In a 12 month period, he/she purchased an average of 94.3 yards of fabric at a cost of \$892.20 (\$9.46 average price per yard)
- * Favorite fabric patterns: Small-scale florals (68%), Tone-on-tone neutrals (60%), Batiks (66%), Holiday prints (60%)
- * Color schemes most often purchased: Jewel Tones (56%), Bright colors (51%), Earth Tones (51%), Neutrals (47%), Pastels (42%)

THREAD

- * In a 12 month period, he/she spent an average of \$138.70 on thread
- * On average, owns \$508.80 worth of thread and has a collection of 154.8 spools of thread (\$3.29 average price per spool)
- * Color Schemes most often purchased: Neutrals (75%), Earth Tones (47%), White (47%), Black (40%), Jewel Tones (33%)

BOOKS

- * Bought an average of 4.4 quilting books in 12 months with an average price of \$21.00 per book
- * Favorite places to buy books: Quilt shops (49%), Fabric stores (31%), Online (29%), Mail Order (27%)


MAGAZINES

- Subscribe to or read an average of 4.5 quilting magazines
- Spend an average of 5.3 hours reading quilting magazines each month
- Primary reasons offered for reading quilting magazines, Learn new tips/techniques, Get quilt-making inspiration, Learn about new products

INTERNET

- Majority (91%) own a personal computer
- * 73% regularly access the Internet
- Average 2 hours per week on quilting websites
- * 43% go online 2 or more times a day
- * 63% visited quilting specific sites
- 29% belong to Facebook
- Primary reasons for visiting quilting websites: Get free quilt patterns, Learn about quilting products, Shop for quilting supplies, Get quilt-making inspiration, Search for fabrics

Finally, the average quilter starts over 17 projects each year. No wonder we have so many UFOs and can't get any quilting done, we are too busy getting ready to quilt!



Mystery Quilt

Okay, mystery quilters! We're now ready for Part 5 of our mystery quilt. This is the final part of the directions. It will be posted on the website and copies will also be available at this month's meeting. Hopefully you're well on your way to completion!

*** If you haven't already, you may run into one <u>small</u> error on last month's Part 4, Unit 4B–Corner Triangles. Thankfully it's the outside corners and at most will only require you to remove them and replace with larger triangles! The directions below are on the original instructions for Part 4.

Unit 4B - Corner Triangles Step 2: Cut (1) 10." strip from the light fabric. Cut (2) 10" squares.

Cut each square in half diagonally. Save these (4) triangles for Part 4.

If, as you followed these instructions, the outside corners were flush with the rest of the quilt with no seam allowance on the corners for adding your border, you will want to cut two squares at 11" to make you four new corner triangles! ***
