About This Issue—and the Issues

With very little news regarding COVID-19 in Monterey County and the County's pretty much steady-state status with respect to infections, this issue of the newsletter will feature a number of online opportunities for education, entertainment, self-development and involvement.

This is not to say no news is good news and that online opportunities are welcome in our lives. In the no news and steady-state departments, new infections keep occurring at roughly a fraction of 1% to about 1% per day. Currently that's about 40 to 90 new COVID-19 diagnoses per day.

The number of active cases increases more slowly. Nearly 7,000 persons of the nearly 10,000 diagnosed to date have recovered. We Seniors have done well in keeping our rate of infections low, but among those infected the hospitalization and fatality rates are relatively high. Stay safe please.

The new diagnoses, however, are keeping Monterey County in the purple or widespread infections tier and preventing the county from opening more businesses. That means an extended and indeterminate shelter-in-place requirement for MoCo residents. It's a shame, really, after Monterey County got off to an excellent low-incident start to the pandemic.


The increased opportunities for on-line involvement and participation in activities is not good news either. It means we (especially us seniors) are stuck with the threat of the virus for some time to come with little prospect for large-scale openings of businesses and sectors.

Finally, we all need to be aware that we are under a County ordinance requiring us to wear face masks in public and that we can be fined for not doing so.


Hey creative community! Just a reminder that Shakespeare was quarantined for the plague when he wrote King Lear. No pressure!!!


I was in a long line at 7:45 am today at the grocery store that opened at 8:00 for seniors only.

As he approached the line for the 3rd time he said, "If you don't let me unlock the door, you'll never get in there."






I wanted zombies and anarchy. Instead we got working from home and toilet paper shortages.
