This Place Matters

Part 4: 1934 To 1950 By Loman McCurdy



Now let's go into the Mansion.....

We will enter the first door on the back porch. This was our summer kitchen. We had kerosene stove in this room that as used after the large wood burning cook stove was shut down for the summer. From this room, there was a stairway that led to the second floor. This room could not be heated during the winter so we used it as a refrigerator.

When we butchered, we hung our sausage here. Our hams and bacon were smoked and laid out on tables. We also had other meats in a barrel of brine to preserve them.

Back to the first floor- The next room was our kitchen with two doors leading outside. These helped to circulate the air during the hot summer months. I think the walls of both kitchens were painted and the floors were covered with linoleum.

The stairway to the basement led from the kitchen. This was a large basement, under most of the house except the two kitchens and the front porch entrance. In the basement there was a small room which was divided when the house was made into a double house. In the large room was a large steam type furnace which burned soft coal. There was water in the coils above the fire box and this made steam which flowed to the radiators until it cooled and then flowed back to the furnace to be reheated. Also in the basement were a large coal bin, a good sized area for canned goods, and a potato bin. I used to be afraid of the bin when the potatoes would sprout. I guess I thought they were snakes.

Coming up from the basement, make a sharp right and you will be in our dining and sitting room. This room and the room above are the rooms with the bay windows. These two rooms had fancy hardwood flooring over the usual wide floor boards. There is another stair way to the second floor. The dining room also had a large built -in 6(The ending will come in the next issue.)

china closet on the one wall. Besides dining in this room, there were several odd chairs and the radio extending into the bay window.

The next room was half the size of the previous over-sized room. Before Baker Co. divided this room, it was not furnished. The younger children played and roller skated from room to room. Also the Methodist gave us a Baby Grande piano. My older brothers and sister would invite their friends and have sing-alongs. For some reason, we had our parlor on the second floor in the front corner bedroom. This changed when the house became a double and the other family got our upstairs parlor. After being divided, the first floor room made a nice parlor for us and a bedroom for the other tenants.

I will tell you about one other room. As you enter the front door from the long porch, you will find yourself in a very large room that extends across the short part of the "L" to another door to the back porch. This is the room that has the winding stairway to the attic on the third floor. No one ever used the attic. This winding stairway was very impressive and still is.

A Few Observations about the Interior of the Mansion

The light fixtures were mostly chandeliers hanging from the ceilings. Some of the rooms had wall-type fixtures. The wall coverings were not the ordinary kinds but they were made of heavy material that could be washed. Some of the wallpaper was very ornate. The woodwork was always painted white. My dad kept the floor boards around thecarpet and linoleum painted brown. In discussing the mansion with my brothers and sister, we all agreed that living here as quite comfortable and we felt that it looked rather nice in appearance.

2010 HMPS President's Annual Report

This report is from April, 2009 to March, 2010. This is my fourth year as president and my eleventh year on the board. I was asked to be on the board the year I retired from teaching and I said, "Yes". I became an officer immediately. In these

eleven years, I've learned a lot and I've worked with events and came to all the painting sessions with the volunteers, and I also did painting and cleaning at other times.

We had our first monthly meeting for 2009 in April. At this meeting we decided on the need for a dehumidifier for the Summer Kitchen to remove excess moisture which was causing the paint to peel. This was purchased from Hostetter's Hardware Store at a discount and used during the summer. I also repaired and painted the back wall of the Summer Kitchen.

Several events were held to raise money for maintenance and repairs. Our first event was Conoy Educational Day with Tina Mark as chair. We raised about \$750 after expenses for the roof. Other events included the Strawberry Festival and Fall Festival with Elaine Jackson, chair of both. Profits at the Strawberry Festival were about \$2,500.00 and at the Fall Fest \$3,100.00. We also had two Arts and Craft Shows with Jody Stuart as chair. About \$1,200.00 was raised. All of our events had great volunteer response.

We also had many volunteers at the mansion to help with cleaning and painting. We are grateful to the Milton Hershey School, United Way, and Elizabethtown College. Several board members including Jody Stuart, Judy Kay Bard, Keith Shearer, Gail Yurkovic, Tina Mark and Elaine Jackson worked with them.

The largest group with about 30 eager girls and their leaders helped paint the carriage house and worked on the lawn in August to support Milton Hershey's belief in caring.

In September, Day of Caring with United Way had five volunteers who cleaned the floor in the Meeting Room and removed board strips from the Display Room.

Elizabethtown College in October had Into the Streets Day and sent five young ladies who helped with painting and completing the removal of the wood strips inside the mansion. We do appreciate the work done by these three volunteer groups.

It seems never ending what went on at the mansion during 2009. I can remember three or four more happenings. We began a Roof Fund with The Preservation Marchers and selling shingles at the Strawberry Festival. These two events brought in \$650.00. In June, a group of Civil War re-enactors marched from Millersville to The Haldeman Mansion. Their leaders were James Meisenbach and Neil Hobbins. At our Fall Festival, we had two wonderful visitors from Maine. Louis and Mary Dorogi donated two beautiful chairs and an old bookcase full of old books which are on display in the museum section of the mansion.

Friends, Members and Volunteers Pot Luck Event was held in July. Attendance was low but the ones who came enjoyed chatting, eating and enjoying the beautiful area.

At our November meeting Douglas Mc Reynolds was voted in as a board member.

Letters were sent out in January to renew memberships and get new members. We had a good response with 90 new memberships responding. We have about 300 on our membership list. Some are volunteers who donate time and some are businesses who support us. I would like to see the membership grow to 400. If you haven't sent in dues or donated to the roof fund, please help save the mansion.

Recently we met with Gene Aleci who will be doing a Structural Report which is needed to get grants. As we can afford, this process will be done in steps with most crucial done first. We are not going into debt doing the report. Right now the State doesn't have much money for grants. Our most immediate concern is raising money to replace the roof.

We are getting ready for two events that will happen soon. Conoy Education Day is Saturday, May 22 with Tina Mark, our chair woman. The second event, the Strawberry Festival, is Sunday, June 13, 2009 with Elaine Jackson as the chair. We have two other events this summer: Victorian Tea will be Saturday, July 31 with Tina Mark as Chair. Tavern Dinner will be Saturday, September 11 with Gail Yurkovic as chair. The last two events are new and we need your support. These are events to raise needed money for the roof. Both will have reservations.

\star For this year, I want to raise lots of money for the roof fund.

 \star We started to repair walls and paint the kitchen. I want to complete the walls of this room and have the floor repaired.

 \star A refrigerator is needed to replace the one which doesn't get cold
