Podiceps auritus	Category A
Rare passage migrant and winter visitor.	50 records, 68 birds

World/British distribution (Snow & Perrins 1998; Holling et al. 2019; Eaton et al. 2021):

Breeds in Iceland, Scotland, Fenno-Scandia and Russia eastwards across Siberia to the Pacific, also in North America from Alaska to the Great Lakes. European breeders winter around coasts of western Europe, but also on large inland lakes. The Scottish population is in steep decline (a 61% decrease over the last 25 years) and the Rare Breeding Birds Panel report for 2017 reported fewer than 20 confirmed breeding pairs for the first time since the inception in 1973, whilst it has been almost completely lost from its previously fragmented range in central Europe and the Baltic States, with population declines reported in Fenno-Scandia and a decline of 76% over 40 years in the North America.

Kent status (KOS 2022):

It is a scarce passage migrant and winter visitor to the county.

Ticehurst (1909) regarded the Slavonian Grebe as a regular autumn and winter visitor to the county but cited no local occurrences and it was not included in Knight & Tolputt's "List of birds observed in Folkestone and its immediate neighbourhood" (1871). Harrison (1953) was in "no doubt that this grebe ... is the most abundant" of the scarce grebes and provided the first area record, recounting how in 1939 Miss Alice Stone saw one at sea off Folkestone by on the 16th February.

Taylor *et al.* (1981) also considered it to be the "most frequently encountered" of the scarce grebes and it was during their review period (1952-76) that the next two local records occurred, with John Hollyer noting one off Folkestone on the 19th February 1954 and Roger Norman seeing one that "was rapidly achieving breeding plumage" at Nickolls Quarry between the 13th and 20th April 1958 (Norman 2007).




Figure 1: Slavonian Grebe records in Kent between 1959/60 and 2019/20

Henderson (2021) described how occurrences in the county increased significantly shortly after the review period of Taylor *et al.*, with the 1978/79 winter producing an exceptional total over 80 records, which included one seen by Dave Weaver at Nickolls Quarry on the 10th March 1979. As figure 1 demonstrates, Kent enjoyed relatively high annual numbers during the 1980s and 1990s and this period produced 29 local records, involving a total of 37 birds.




Figure 2: Slavonian Grebe records at Folkestone and Hythe since 1985

There has been a decline in Kent records since the early 2000s and figure 2 shows a similar pattern locally to the overall trend within the county. In the 1980s and 1990s there were a total of 29 local records (at a rate of 1.4 per annum), including an exceptional total of ten in 1996 (an influx which was noted at the county level, as figure 1 demonstrates), but since the turn of the millennium there have been just 17 records (at a rate of 0.8 per annum).

The 1996 influx included a count of five individuals off Copt Point on the 21st February which remains the record day total.

The records by year are shown in figure 2.




Figure 3: Slavonian Grebe records at Folkestone and Hythe by week

Autumn records are relatively rare, with just one in October and two in November. This species is more regularly encountered from December through to February, and on spring passage in March and April. The latest record involved one in full breeding plumage at Nickolls Quarry on the 27th April 1994 (which lingered until the 4th May). The records by week are given in figure 3. There is a further undated record from December.

As with the other scarce grebes most sightings are either from Nickolls Quarry (ten) or coastal sites, with 15 off Copt Point, five off Mill Point and Samphire Hoe, ten in the bay between Sandgate and the Dymchurch Redoubt, one in Folkestone Harbour, two early records "at Folkestone" (site unspecified) and one on the canal at Hythe, near the Hotel Imperial. Figure 4 shows the location of records by tetrad.
