

The Gary Turbak Memorial Back-to-School Clothing Project - 2021

35 Years of School Clothes for Children in Need

It was a banner year for the Back-to-School Clothing Project!! Praise the Lord! We had \$13,000 to spend on clothes for more than 450 children in our valley! Half of the money came from the following businesses: 1st Security Bank, 1st Interstate Bank, Clearwater Credit Union, Thrivent, Dillards, WalMart, Town Pump, United Way, and the Washington Foundation. Eight churches collected "tons" of socks and underwear.

About 270 children came to the church for clothes – many more than last year! The boxes of clothing left over were picked up by Colleen Lehman from the Missoula school district. She took them to Family Resource Centers in various schools where they will be distributed to children in need. Approximately 150 more children will get clothes at their schools, so this project will help clothe more than 400 children this year!!

Thank you to the more than 30 people who volunteered MANY hours to carry out this event. A special thank you to Sheila Gray for shopping for most of the clothes, Vicke Schend for purchasing the shoes, Debbie Allison & Sharon Tandberg for handling online grant applications, Karen Sitte who tallied the money & bookkeeping, and Elaine Ryan who helped with the bulletin & newsletter notices. Thank you to so many people who donated money and prayed to make this wonderful event possible!

Take a Closer Look at the Stained Glass Window in the Chancel

As you sit in the sanctuary and gaze up at the stained glass window, have you ever wondered what this special window is telling you? I stood studying the write up in the back of church to gain a better understanding of the stories the window tells.

The overall theme of the window is *Prayer*. The dominant figure represents our Lord., the recipient of our supplications, as he might have stood on the mount. He concludes his sermon with his exhortations to prayer, lettered at the base of the center column. The words are very small in the presentation, but they state: "Ask and it shall be given you, seek and ye shall find and knock and it shall be opened unto you."

Our Lord is in the middle panel. Shown throughout the side panels are modern day listeners, who are all praying. The medallion in the lower left corner is devoted to Old Testament prayer, represented by David kneeling before the Ark.

The bottom, far righthand corner features the New Testament represented by Saint Paul kneeling before the vision, praying "that Christ may dwell in your hearts through faith."

In the early 1950s considerable reconstruction had taken place as the church rebuilt the sanctuary, added the stained glass window, mounted the chancel wood carvings that are now at the rear of the worship area, and improved the basement. Also, two offices were constructed. **See Stained Glass page 8**

Pastor's Pen

My message this month lifts up a letter received from our fellow brothers and sisters in Christ in the American Indian Alaskan Native Lutheran Association. The letter in its entirety is below (please read it).

Colter Murphy, our Director for Children, Youth, and Family, will be working on a special orange banner project that will help to remember and honor the 251 plus children whose remains were recently discovered in a mass grave. The orange banner will be hung in the sanctuary as humbly requested. The color orange has special significance as does the connection to those who grieve and suffer.

We are reminded in scripture to bear one another's burdens. "Bear one another's burdens, and in this way you will fulfill the law of Christ." (Galatians 6:2) The Law of Christ is to Love. One act of love is to remember and honor, and that we can do in this small way. Another act of love we can do is to hold the victims' families in our prayers as they deal with past trauma and grief. One more act of love is to work for equal respect and justice for all peoples, especially those of color and cultures that are different from our own.

The letter:

AMERICAN INDIAN ALASKA NATIVE LUTHERAN ASSOCIATION

July 23, 2021

Greetings in the name of our Creator, in the name of Jesus, Savior of all. We speak to you all today on behalf of the Indigenous people throughout North Americas. We come with sad hearts at the news of 215+ children of the Kamloops Residential School whose remains were recently found in a mass grave and of the children of the Rosebud Sioux whose bodies were returned to their homeland this past week. They are being remembered by many by the color orange.

The color orange is symbolic and came from the inspiration of a survivor of that era, Phyllis Webstad, who stated that when she was a 6-year-old girl arriving at a residential boarding school, she was stripped of her clothes which included a new orange t-shirt her grandmother had gifted her and was never given back. The orange shirt/color now symbolizes how the church and the schools they administered took away the Indigenous identity of the children in their care.

In honor and memory of the children of the First Nations people and of our Native children who never made it home, and for those still living the nightmare imposed on them as children of Canada and the United States we humbly ask our brothers and sisters of the church to hang an orange banner in the sanctuaries of your churches for 225 days. In remembrance and lament of each child that was thrown into those graves, and those yet to be discovered we honor each of their lives.

Please grieve with us and remember us as the Indigenous people of this land who are going through a very sad and heartbreaking time in our collective psyche. We invite all our Christian brothers and sisters, in solidarity with us, to honor all our First Nations and our Native children that never made it out of residential schools by hanging an orange banner for 225 days.

We now call on the Church to acknowledge and confess its complicity in all the atrocities committed against the Indigenous peoples of North America and throughout the world where western Christianity colonized Indigenous peoples. Please stand in partnership with us for the children.

The true history of the western church in America has been participation in acts of ethnic cleansing, genocide through warfare including biological and chemical, sterilization, depletion of our main food source, the taking of land and resources for personal gains. We ask you, the ELCA Church and Bishops Church leaders and congregations to support our people in remembering the children.

Many Tribal nations have had church groups offer apologies on behalf of their ancestors, which is well and good, but that only serves to assuage any feelings of guilt or shame for them and does not bring about true repentance. So in light of these past gestures we call upon the churches serving in the United States to advocate the U.S. Government to fully acknowledge all the atrocities it has committed against the indigenous peoples of this land now known as the United States of America and for the future of Christianity in Indian Country.

Pastor Gordon V. Tollefson lead the dedication program on October 26, 1952. My family and I were present.

A number of years ago, an effort was made to improve the lighting of the stained glass window at night because the single light originally installed was not giving it enough illumination. Renny Malach and Ron Mueller installed four lights on a frame outside of the window, considerably increasing the visibility of this special piece. The Women in Mission funded the project.

Pastor Chris told me that he has received many comments from members and visitors about the stained glass window. "They feel it is a focal point of their worship," Pastor Chris said.

For anyone who would like to brush up on the message told by this window, there is a framed writeup below the carved medallions at the top of the stairs in the entrance to the worship area.
