**Bible Verses about Roses** 


The Rose is mentioned in the Bible 48 times and is translated from English to Hebrew as 'Chabatsteleth', which means 'red' and 'bulb'.

#### THE STAINED GLASS WINDOWS AT ST JAMES'





Windows by Jones & Willis – Maker

Have you ever looked at our stained-glass windows and wondered who put them in? Here's a little history about the company who put in our stained-glass window.



The business, originally Newton, Jones & Willis, was active from the 1840s until the 1930s. and became one of the largest church furnishers in Britain.

This Birmingham company was established around 1847, who manufactured church furnishings. Jones & Willis were one of the biggest firms of this kind in the latter part of the nineteenth century.

They also opened premises in Liverpool and in London. Jones & Willis began to supply stained glass from about 1880, and some of their work in the 1920s and 30s was designed by the architect F.E. Howard.

Does anyone know why all of the windows were not all stained glassed in St. James'? If so, please let us know.

Dear Lord, it is my will to surrender to you everything that I am and everything that I'm striving to be.


I open the deepest recesses of my heart and invite Your Holy Spirit to dwell inside of me. I offer you my life, heart, mind, body, soul, and spirit.

# Historical background

Allerton Tower Park was part of the Manor of Allerton until 1849 when Hardman Earle acquired the estate and introduced the eponymous mansion based on a design by Harvey Lonsdale Elmes, the famed architect of St George's Hall. The house was of classic Italianate design with an attractive tower providing views across the surrounding countryside.

The estate was acquired by Liverpool Corporation in 1924, opening as a park three years later however sadly, by 1937 the Tower had become seriously affected by dry rot and was demolished.

## The park today

The lodge, stables, former laundry and part of the orangery of Allerton Tower remain along with a partially walled garden adding seasonal interest to one of Liverpool's attractive former park estates in the Allerton-Woolton 'green wedge'.

## NEW MEMBERS TO OUR ST. JAMES' FAMILY



As a small boy growing up in a village in Berkshire many years ago, I was taken to Sunday School at Scotland Hill Methodist church in Sandhurst. I can still remember the warmth and kindness of everyone there and heard about the love of Jesus for the first time. I remember how we used to sing a hymn which forever encapsulates this experience and I believe has set me up for life. The first verse goes like this (you probably know it). *I love to hear the story which angel voices tell, how once the King of Glory came down on earth to dwell. I am both weak and sinful, but this I surely know, the Lord came down to save me, because He loved me so.* 

Life moved on as it always does. When I was twelve my parents became Anglicans, and so began for me a 56-year connection with the Church of England. In due course I studied for the Ministry and was ordained in 1977 and spent the next 17 years as a parish priest. For complex reasons, I decided to leave whilst in my forties. Leaving professional ministry is daunting, but God was completely present to me although I could hardly discern Him. I began a new role as a residential social worker amongst ex-offenders. I felt this was my

niche, so I was able to go back to university and qualify as a probation officer. It was a promotion in this field of work that brought me north to Liverpool, and I retired in 2013 having spent 17 fabulous years in the probation service, most of it here in Merseyside.

I have developed a ministry in Christian communication. I've written a book about prayer, preached the occasional sermons, and been a podcaster.

I am also a musician – I play bassoon and sing. I'm married to Claire, and we have a 16-year-old son. In my spare time I run a charity that provides an 18-bed probation approved premises for women ex-offenders in Edge Lane – Adelaide House.

Why have I felt the need to return to my Methodist roots just now? There are many reasons, but chief amongst them is that I am fortunate to have many good friends in the LGBTQIA community, and it's become increasingly clear how much pain the current Anglican position causes amongst faithful gay, lesbian, trans and inter-sex people. So it was with huge joy that I learnt of Conference decision that Methodism should come alongside the URC and be fully affirming, along with the church locally here at St James. I'd also been lucky enough to meet Margaret Dee through our musical connection, so knew that I would find a big welcome here – as I have. So, I have returned to my Methodist roots, to be part of God's universal welcome, be part of a community that shows God's delight in all His human creation, just as we are. Thank you for welcoming me. **Paul Holt** 

Thank you for your welcome and hospitality, it's great to be getting to know you. I'm originally from an Irish Catholic family and went to Catholic schools until I went to university. There I became involved in the chaplaincy, and began working with Christians of other traditions, and people of other faiths, for the first time.

After university I became a primary school teacher, then got half way through training for priesthood, though I was not ordained.

I moved to south Liverpool almost 20 years ago, and have been involved with several churches, including Liverpool City Centre Methodist Church, better known as 'Somewhere Else', or the Bread Church. I was involved there from 2005 to 2011, and received much support from their former minister, Revd Dr Barbara Glasson. After Barbara left, my work situation changed, and I was no longer able to join them during the week for prayer and lunch after bread making. So I found a new spiritual home in St Bride's Liverpool, near the Anglican Cathedral, in 2011, as part of the Sunday morning community.

St Bride's was a church in decline until 2007 until it relaunched as a 'creative, progressive, inclusive' church, and piloted several 'fresh expressions' of church on Sunday evenings. One of these, called <u>Open Table</u>, was inspired by the Methodist understanding that members and nonmembers are welcome to Communion. Open Table began in June 2008 as a group of six Christians from four different traditions who shared two things in common: the practice of Communion, that central act of hospitality of our faith, and their identities as lesbian, gay, bi and trans (LGBT) people who had not always been welcome and included in their church traditions. I was one of the founding members of the first Open Table community in Liverpool, attending its monthly Communion service. I later became part of its leadership team, which led me into the wider church community and leadership team at St Bride's.

Ten years ago this month, in May 2012, my husband Warren and I became <u>the first couple to</u> register a civil partnership in a place of worship in the UK.

In 2015, other churches started asking about how they might also host an Open Table community, and we began to become a network, a dispersed community of communities. In the last seven years the network has grown from one community in Liverpool to six across Merseyside, and 18 more across England and Wales, hosted by churches in five different traditions, including Methodist and URC. I've also spoken to more than 100 other churches about how they might make their church more welcoming, inclusive and affirming for LGBT people.

In 2018 I began coordinating the Open Table Network part-time while working as a chaplain at several YMCA hostels across Merseyside. In 2020 the network received funding to enable me to take on the role of Coordinator full-time, and in 2021 we became a charity, with Barbara Glasson

as one of our Patrons, along with Revd Dr John Bradbury, General Secretary of the URC. Three of our eight trustees are also from the URC.

They are among the reasons I am here. I have been following the conversations in the URC, Methodist and Anglican churches around identity, sexuality, relationships and marriage for many years. I have been impressed by the grace, humility and integrity of these conversations in the URC and Methodist Churches - the Church of England has much to learn from you. When the Methodist Conference last summer voted in favour of allowing same-sex couple to marry in churches which support this, against so-called 'conversion therapy' which tries to change people's orientation and identity, and for using more inclusive language in its governance, I was impressed.

Since then, I have felt called to explore a new direction in my ministry within the Methodist Church - becoming a member here today is one small step in seeing where this new direction might lead.

My work for the Open Table Network often takes me away to other churches around the country at weekends, so I won't be here every Sunday, but I take comfort in knowing I have a new spiritual home to return to when I am in Liverpool. Thank you! **Kieran Bohan**
