ATCMW Luncheon Minutes Nov. 12, 2011

The Airedale Terrier Club of Metropolitan Washington (ATCMW) met at the Cedar Knoll Inn, Alexandria, Virginia. Luncheon was served at 12:30. During the luncheon, Dr. Jerry Hinn, DVM, was introduced as the speaker. He brought to the attention of the Club membership the subjects of salmonella in pet foods, hypoallergenic problems and medications available in treating the medical needs of dogs.

Jim Hession conducted the raffle with Club President Corally Burmaster selecting the winning tickets. First winner was Dr. Jerry Hinn; second basket was won by Marie Hammond and third basket winner was Margie Goodyear.

At 2:00 Corally Burmaster called the meeting to order. She announced that minutes of the previous meeting would be provided in the Newsletter. A copy of the Treasurer's Report was posted. She announced the Frying Pan Park meeting had 35 members and guests. She suggested the club might alternate our picnic meetings between Maryland and Virginia, given our membership is represented in both states.

Club President Burmaster brought to the attention of Club members that the registration of our Articles of Incorporation in the State of Maryland had been allowed to lapse. These are necessary in order to allow donations to the club and rescue to be tax deductible. Attorney David Taylor has been valuable in assisting in the process to regain the status held by the Club. Pam McKusick, Rescue Chairman, announced she and Jeanne Esmond had gone to Montgomery with limited monetary success. Airedale Square netted a total of \$496 with purchases and donations. For the Scottish Walk, scheduled for 3 December in Alexandria, VA, Pam McKusick announced a new banner with the Club Logo would be used in the Parade.

Judges at our Specialty will be Margo Dupre for Sweepstakes and Lee Stevens will have regular classes. Russ Hammond will handle the designated trophies. Corally Burmaster will handle the catalog ads for this coming year.

Airedale Square was very successful and appreciation given to Nora Dudman, who in turn thanked the members for their support.

Corally Burmaster announced that the Membership Chairman is Deb Carroll. Scottish Walk Chairman is Susan Crawford. The Newsletter will provide a web link to the details of the Scottish Walk. Corally provided ATCMW business cards which were made available as hand outs for members to introduce potential Airedale owners to the Club. Patrick Broom maintains our club website.

It was announced that additional orders for two Airedale books were required to order the basic order of 16. Two more books were ordered by Tarry Faries. Given

that we now have orders for 16 books, Margie Goodyear will pay for 16 books coming from Sweden to be distributed at the next meeting after the books arrive.

Corally requested that Club Officers list the duties for which they are responsible and submit these to Corally as a book to pass on to future office holders. The information should contain the duties, deadlines and steps required to perform the duties, plus points of contact to complete the duties. It was suggested duties be rotated with the exception of Rescue. The Club needs to put together a club history, including the formation which included Jim McLynn, Joan Andrew and Lou Swafford. The Club Historian should put this project together. Corally also mentioned that the Club needs to adjust the membership profile to adjust to the majority of the club members are not dog breeders, but are interested in the companionship of Airedales. Activities such as grooming sessions might need to be changed to reflect the season, i.e., late Spring and late Autumn. We should also reinstate a Club Roster and include Club recognition of awards or titles awarded to the Airedales.

At 2:55, a motion to adjourn was made by Franklin Goodyear, seconded by Marie Hammond. The motion passed.

Sandy and Katie got along from the start. Katie taught him to be a real Airedale. She taught him to bark at c*ts, the mailman and to keep his tail up. Katie was attitude on four legs. When Lou crossed the Rainbow Bridge to be with Vee, Katie stayed with us. Katie was full of Airedale Attitude and knew how to get her way. She adored men and I swear she batted her eyelashes, and pranced when she went to see Dr Hinn.

Gastric Dilatation Volvulus...aka the Dreaded Bloat

I was saddened to learn that my friend and neighbor just lost her German Shorthaired Pointer/Lab mix, Rufus, to a second attack in a month of bloat. Rufus was a rescue from a shelter in Fredericksburg, Virginia. He hated all other dogs but my Sandy. He and Sandy walked together in the mornings side by side in perfect canine harmony.

Bloat is an emergency condition requiring immediate medical and surgical intervention. It begins with an accumulation of gas in the stomach resulting in the torsion or twisting of the stomach. That twisting cuts off the blood supply to other organs, resulting in damage to the heart, lungs, spleen and the intestines themselves. Shock and death in mere hours can be the result. If the dog has any chance of recovery, treatment must begin immediately. Learn to recognize the symptoms and keep the phone number of your local emergency vet by the phone.

Airedales are listed in the deep chested breeds that are susceptible to GDV or Bloat. Club President, Corally Burmaster tells me that Bloat is rare in Airedales, She knows of only 2 dogs who have succumbed in all the years she has been in the breed. Rescue coordinator, Pam McKusick tells me that some service dogs, Police and rescue dogs for example, deep chested Malinois or German Shepherds, have their stomachs tacked prophylactically to prevent bloat.

When I got my first Airedale, Roxie, I had heard about bloat and read the recommendations for avoiding it; wait an hour after eating to exercise, and use a raised feeding dish. I got a special raised feeding station for Roxie. I followed the other instructions and totally forgot about it, confident that I was doing everything right, until Rufus got bloat. I Googled "Bloat" in an effort to understand what had happened to him and found that not only had the recommendations for prevention changed, there were new treatments as well.

Causes of Bloat

- *Heredity
- *Rapid eating (gulping of air)
- *Drinking too much water immediately following eating
- *One large meal /day - Raised feeding dish
- *Aggressive temperament/ Stress/ Change in routine
- *Who knows!

Some Symptoms of Bloat

- *Dog attempts to vomit, usually unsuccessfully
- *Dog "acts" funny. He might stand "funny" with his legs spread apart. He may glance at his abdomen which may or may not be distended. He may be anxious, restless, hunched up or just pacing .
- *He may have diminished stomach sounds. No digestive gurgling or rumbling of hunger.
- *He may have a rapid heartbeat, pale gums, shallow breathing, panting and or coughing

Bloat is truly a life and death emergency. It can kill in as little as one hour. Every article that I read stressed that I should know my dog so that I could know when his behavior was "off."

Bloat Prevention

- *Feed the dog at least twice a day with a bowl placed on the floor
- *Limit the amount of water consumed immediately after eating
- *Wait one hour after exercising to feed
- *Wait one and one half hours after feeding to exercise
- *Mylanta GAS or Fanatine if the dog is gasey and showing early symptoms of bloat
- *GET TO THE VET IMMEDIATELY if symptoms appear.

Bloat is truly a mysterious disease. The best chance for recovery is immediate action of the owner to get treatment.

Find your closest emergency 24 hour clinic and write the phone number, address and directions down and keep by your phone. Call before you leave home and let them know you are on your way w/ a possible case of bloat so that they can be prepared to treat your dog immediately upon arrival. (If you need assistance locating the closest emergency clinic to you, please call me and I will be happy to assist you.)
