Kind: This week our focus will be on Scarecrows. We will be reading <u>Scarecrow</u> by Cynthia Rylant. Our focus will be on the setting (and seasons) and putting ourselves in the story to decide how we would feel. Our vocabulary words will be dawn, mammoth, chat, borrowed, and lapel. The vocabulary words are always words that are found in our weekly read. This week's letter focus will be /o/. We will talk about long o and short o, which can be tricky. Please keep reading at home, it has a huge impact on reading fluency as we get closer and closer to your student becoming an independent reader. In math we are discussing pennies, introducing time to the hour, and identifying ordinal position. I hope everyone has a great week! Only 10 more days until Thanksgiving! - Mrs. Stewart

1st/2nd: This week in 1st and 2nd grade we will be reading the same story, <u>Turk and Runt</u>, by Lisa Wheeler. This is a great Thanksgiving book that the kids enjoy! In 1st grade we will be learning about story elements such as characters, setting, problem, and solution. We will continue working on all vowel sounds now that we have covered them all (short and long) and continue working on verbs and identifying them in a sentence. In math we will be going over even numbers We will continue working on adding and subtracting within 10 and identifying and taking apart numbers up to 50. In 2nd grade we will be talking about making inferences that go along with our story, <u>Turk and Runt</u>. We will learn all about turkeys and be able to retell facts about them. In grammar we will continue working on adjectives but will also be adding adverbs this week. In math we will work on adding, creating and reading a venn diagram. We will continue to work on adding and subtracting and counting coins (dimes, nickels, pennies). This week will be chilly! Please make sure your children have a coat, hat, and gloves! — Mrs. Thomas

3rd/4th: Brr. we had some cold temperatures over the weekend compared to what we have had lately. Our class will be busy trying to finish things before the upcoming holiday break. Both grades should have brought home their study guides for chapter 6 in science. Third grade will have their test on Tuesday and fourth grade will have their test on Thursday. Each grade will have a math test on Wednesday. In math, we have started working on multiplication. You should be on the lookout for math facts sheets coming home. We will start working on our goal of an ice cream party for those who master all of their timed multiplication facts. Please practice with your student nightly. Spelling this week is review. Third grade will have 35 words and fourth grade will have 50 words. As always on review weeks, these words are all ones that the students have already had during previous weeks. - **Mrs. Cooper**

5/6 Math: In fifth grade, students are working on average and other types of multi-step story problems and two-digit multiplication problems. Sixth graders are working on expanded notation of decimal numbers, mentally multiplying by powers of 10, and characteristics of circles, including circle parts and pi. Tests This Week: 5th Math: Wednesday 7/8: In grammar, students will continue their unit on modifiers. This week, we will discuss adverbs. In math, seventh grade is working on distributive property, fraction/decimal/percent conversions, and the nature of quotients. In pre-algebra, students will continue looking at part/whole relationships, order of operations with fractions, and proportions In algebra, students are working on more polynomial operations, graphs of equations, and irrational number operations.
