BOOK HIGHLIGHTS: Completes the public records of I Chronicles

KEY STORIES:

- Solomon prays to God for wisdom instead of long life, power, or money, so he is given them all.
- The Queen of Sheba visits Solomon.
- King Cyrus of Persia rebuilds the temple after releasing Israel from exile to Babylon.

KEY VERSES:

Wisdom and knowledge is granted unto thee; and I will give thee riches, and wealth, and honour, such as none of the kings have had that have been before thee, neither shall there any after thee have the like. *II Chronicles 1:11-12*

If my people, which are called by my name, shall humble themselves, and pray, and seek my face, and turn from their wicked ways; then will I hear from heaven, and will forgive their sin, and will heal their land. **II Chronicles 7:14**

Important Points about the Book:

- II Chronicles covers the reigns of all the kings of Israel and Judah after the split of the united kingdom of Kings Saul, David and Solomon.
- Like the books of the Kings this book gives little snippets about each king and notes whether they did that which was right or evil in the sight of the Lord (only a handful, all from Judah, pleased the Lord).
- The closing chapter, 36, summarizes the 70 years of captivity in the Great Exile and also summarizes Cyrus, King of Persia, releasing the Jews to go home and his funding of the rebuilding of the Temple.

2 CHRONICLES

II Chronicles officially records the kings and their events after David to the last king of Judah. This book is primarily limited to the royal line of David and the southern kingdom. It records Solomon's reign, the division of the kingdom, the apostasy, the captivity and the restoration by the decree of Cyrus.

The central theme reveals the benefits of humility. The humble mind believes the word by faith and prays for understanding. **II Chronicles 7:14; 12:6-7**

INTERESTING FACTS ABOUT II CHRONICLES:

- Chapters: 36
- Verses: 822
- Words: 26,069
- Chapters 1-9 cover the 40 years of Solomon's reign
- Chapters 10-36 cover the 393 years following
- Almost 3/4 of chapters 10-36 deals with the 8 good kings of Judah, leaving 1/4 to cover the 12 wicked rulers
- 6 of the first 9 chapters cover the construction and dedication of the Temple

TYPOLOGY:

- ⇒ 2:6—Solomon understood the impossibility of building a house for God to dwell in and the only real purpose for a house for God was to SACRIFICE in. Today—Romans 12:2—we are the church and we are to be a continual LIVING sacrifice.
- ⇒ 2:17-18 God used strangers to build His house (the Temple). Today, God is still using strangers to build His house (the Church) - Gentiles!
