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Message from the President

Dear Members,

It is with great pleasure to welcome you all to APA's 9th Annual General Meeting. To those who would have liked to attend in person and were unable to, we would like to wish you a pleasant read of this report and do get in touch with the members of the committee should you have any questions.

This year is a very special year for APA as we will be celebrating its 10th Anniversary from it becoming an NGO. During the course of these 5 years in my role of

president I am truly amazed with the amount of achievements and growth of this Association. It is an honour for me to be addressing the presentation of this Annual General Meeting to brief you through what we have been upto in 2017 and what our plans are for the coming year.

2017 hasn't been an easy year especially in view of time constraints of our key committee members and the local government elections which brought about changes in the cabinet. As with every change people have been assigned new roles and therefore we had no option but to rebuild our network and explain to the new government officials & policy makers, the needs of our children, the discussions held, changes which were in the making and the vision of APA to improve the service provision to children and youths with ASD and their families.

It is with great honour to inform you, that nothwithstanding these changes, we didn't lose the momentum and are once again in good relationships with all stakeholders. Our main focus is to remain primarily to support the families in their daily endeavours and to educate the public in general.

At APA our key objective is to continue to be in line with Autism Europe's campaign around the theme "Breaking Barriers Together for Autism" and I take this opportunity to thank the Marigold Foundation for making it possible to integrate both the Autism Europe and Autism Speaks - Light it Up Blue campaigns during our annual awareness event which landed us in Gozo lighting up the beautiful Cittadella in 2017.

Regretfully, people with Autism constantly face challenges primarily due to the discrimination they face on a daily basis. Certain attitudes and stereotype behaviour deviate participation for people on the spectrum within our society and we will work harder so that we help our society in becoming more accessible and more focused towards our children who deserve respect acceptance and inclusion be it in school, social groups or on the job.



From my perspective and hopefully many of you here today will agree that being a parent of a child with Autism is no easy job and one must live it to understand the feeling and the frustrations of bringing up a child under the spectrum. This is all due to the barriers and rigid systems we face every day. The biggest challenge is to recognise the potential of each and every child and guide them in the right direction. It is important for our children to be active participants in our society.

Last year the focus was on distributing the Autism Guide to the parent members of APA and putting together the Maltese version of the guide. Both versions will shortly be distributed to all Child Care centres and Primary Schools in order for staff to be in a position to guide parents whose children have been just diagnosed. The Social Integration Programme for Teens (SIPT) has continued to bloom and the youths participating in the varied and fun activities every forthnight enjoy themselves and fill the team with energy to keep the programme going. For this I would like to thank the staff of St. Jeanne Antide Foundation for believing in the need of this programme and partnering with us to obtain the funds from the Malta Community Chest Fund Foundation. I also thank all the contributors who have volunteered to organise activities for the youths and sponsors for the events.

Last but not least is the event organised at Corinthia Marina, sponsored by the Corinthia Social fund. Ms Nathalie Buhagiar, the key speaker, gave parents some excellent tips on how to deal with sensory issues at home. As to the Autism Empowerment Bill, the legislation has been passed and APA has a representative on the Autism Council. This bill empowers people on the spectrum and the council will focus on promoting the needs of this condition on a national basis.

The committee of APA is wholeheartedly working hard to "Break together the Barriers of Autism". I would like to thank the committee who dedicate time to attend meetings, organise our numerous and entertaining events, meeting government officials and above all offering constant support to other parents.

I also thank all those parents who send us messages showing their appreciation in the work we do as this is encourages the committee to continue with their mission.

Following Diagnosis

Last April, APA was delighted to launch the guide 'Autism: A Guide for Parents and Carers Following Diagnosis'.

This initiative was born from parents asking APA and other parents in the support forum for advice on how to help their child, what therapies are offered in Malta and what social services were available.

The guide was developed by parents for parents and provides an overview of autism,

guidance on how to cope in the early years, services offered locally and the benefits one can avail from.





The guide is available in English to every APA member, free of charge. It is also available on our website and on DVD on request.

The next step – 'Autism: A Guide for Parents and Carers Following Diagnosis' in Maltese

The production of the guide in Maltese relies solely on fund raising. Fundraising efforts started last March when Board member Emma McEwen, and Sandra Peyre raised Euro 2,082 by running the Malta Half Marathon. Fundraising continued 6 May 2017 when 4 athletes took part in the Hellfire 'Gozo 50km trail run'. We were blessed with amazing sponsors and donors. Team Sport Birkirkara provided the runners tshirts, Mayhem Design & Branding printed the t-shirts, 'Alan the designer' produced produced the artwork for the t-shirts and adverts, Sado Printing provided the banner for the event. Vibe FM aired adverts both in English and Maltese on the radio. Vodafone provided the ability to receive donations by SMS from all mobile networks. We had a campaign on ZAAR, a crowd funding platform. Public Relations was



driven by Write Me Anything. Emma McEwen and Patrick Tabone were invited on Trudy Kerrs Big Drive Home

and Matthew Caruana from Zaar was interviewed on the TVM show Twelve to 3 to raise autism awareness and funds.



A big thank you to the athletes – Emma McEwen, Sandra Peyre, Jason Greenaway, Italo Bonnici, Tiziana Bonnici, Patrick Tabone for taking on and completing the challenges. We hugely appreciate the efforts of APA members who spread the word. Thank you to everyone who donated including our generous corporate donors – Alfred Mizzi Foundation, The Corinthia Group of Companies, Ganado Advocates, F5 Magazine, Ladybird Foundation, Malta Information Technology Agency, Malta

A grand total of Euro 13,000 was raised enabling not only the production of the guide in Maltese but also providing funds for future guides.

The Maltese translation has now been completed and is currently with the designer. We hope to receive the Guide in print before the summer. We would like to thank Mark Vella and Joe Salomone for the translation, Marvic Budeja for proof reading and Julian McEwen for designing.

Projects today and tomorrow By Sandra Borg

SIPT Programme May 2017 to April 2018

The Social Integration Programme for Teens (SIPT) is a partnership project between the St Jeanne Antide Foundation and the Autism Parents Association (APA). This project is funded through the Funds for NGOs of the Malta Community Chest Fund Foundation (MCCFF). Project Ref: MCCFF-C3-004-2016

This was the second project that APA embarked upon which related to providing a service to Youths with Autism. This was a follow-up of the Integrating youths with Autism in the Community (IYAC) Programme and therefore most youths who attended the previous year, once again enrolled for this programme. The application was open for 25 youths aged between



14 and 21 years. They were all professionally assessed to determine their ability across 3 areas; communication level, social integration skills and cognitive ability.



The SIPT programme had a twist from the IYAC programme. The IYAC had three groups running at the same time whilst all youths attending SIPT were grouped together. The reason being that although the ability levels were quiet varied, the activities organised were all enjoyable and accessible to all the

youths. Plans were to eventually split the group however it was agreed to continue orgainising activities together, considering the success.

The activities consisted of a visit to Esplora, make your own pizza at El Catalan in Xaghra, Xmas decoration craft

activity, dancing and fitness activities in preparation of the Xmas party, trampolining, red sponge making and hot dog night, preparation for the European Waste Recycling competition, scouts tent assembling, a boat trip from Birgu to Valletta and a carnival party which was organised by the parents.

Overall, the IYAC programme turned out to be a successful initiative since its primary aim of enabling youths with ASD to integrate in the community has been reached. The second aim of having other youths join the group turned out to be difficult since no youth groups meet on a Saturday. The aim is for the project to continue for another 2 years.

Carnival Party February 2018

Overall, SIPT is turning out to be a successful initiative since its aim of enabling youths with ASD to integrate in the community is being reached. Members of APA together with the help of SJAF staff, the coordinators Silvan and Sharon, activity facilitators and parents worked wholeheartedly to make this a success and we are truly thankful. The proof of this is that the youths enter and exit with a smile and eagerly look forwad to the next activity. The aim is for the project to continue during the summer and for the second phase to proceed until May 2019.



Trampolining Activity 2018

Training for Police first responders

APA are in touch with Autism Hampshire who have already organised training to first responders in Hampshire and a plan of action is currently being developed. Training dates and agreement on the cost and training material are being assessed by APA and the local Policy Academy.



MCAST – Creating an Autism Friendly Environment April 2017 to June 2018

APA continue to work with MCAST with the aim to accomplish yet another "Breaking Barriers together for Autism" in line with the Autism Europe Campaign.

Following the meeting with MCAST top management, where an explanation on what it feels like to be Autistic was delivered, training for the staff of the learning support unit was also organised. These will be the, so called, Autism Ambassadors. Printed guidelines to be provided to all levels of staff are in the process and the training needs are currently being assessed.

These best practices will be transposed to MCAST by June 2018.

Compulsory Education

APA met with the Education Minister a number of times addressing the issues we are encountering with our children and youths at all levels being primary, secondary, post secondary and also in the work environment. A number of project ideas were given to the Minister three of which were:-

- To train a pool of LSAs on Autism and select a number of LSAs to become Autism Ambassadors
- To reform Adult Training Centres and Resource Centres by restructuring the curriculum and provide Autism Training to management and staff
- To organize a national educational campaign on Autism targeted to households and employers with the aim for more understanding of the condition.

The following issues were addressed:-

- Shortage of LSAs
- No compulsory training for teachers on handling children with Autism in the school setting and there is no synchronization with LSAs and parents
- Specialised training for LSAs is needed
- LSAs are not all at the same level...salary and position scales must be introduced.
- Are schools really Autism Friendly? One can engage the National Autistic society to obtain accreditation
- No continuation in students learning time is wasted when there is a change in LSA or when an LSA is not trained enough
- Children with special skills are losing out and are not motivated leading to depression and behavior issues.
- Summer School LSA's to be provided for all children with an LSA not provided in private schools.
- Security in the schools is weak there have been issues of children walking out of school unattended

A number of training ideas and educational resources were also provided to the Minister.
