Keep it Legal I's a watching.

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


Splitty's Dummy Spit

Time for a quick photo session and then we all went our separate ways, a very pleasant start to the day.












The Fox's Den.

Vietnam Part II



Wednesday:

We had to be ready to ride at 08:00 and we almost made it. We were now going to ride up in the mountains with a total different landscape. After a

few minutes riding, we were corner marking at the outskirt of the first small town we went through. We weren't told that the tail end Charlie was not riding with us as he had a flat tire that had to be fixed before he could go so we waited at that corner for 40 minutes and were a bit concerned about if we would ever find the rest of the team again as we had no idea where we were and even if we could phone someone, we wouldn't be able to explain our position as we couldn't read the road signs. While waiting, we watching the locals doing their things. Most noticeable, there was an elderly couple selling "fresh" meat. The meat was laying on a table on the footpath where the couple took turns in sitting in front of it and waving a piece of wire with a plastic at the end of it to chase flies away. It may also have helped that they were smoking cigarettes and blowing the smoke over the meat.

When we came to the bottom, we had to cross the river on a barge. Anni jumped on the back of the bike as she was feeling better and we rode on board. She was a little nervous as the ramp weren't exactly smooth, but with my riding skills and some luck, we made it. The barge was powered with a boat that was tied to the side of the barge. I have never seen that setup before, but one of the Norwegians told me that that is common practice in Norway.

We checked in at a hotel in Phù Yên. Anni was complaining about the room, having no windows. I didn't care as there was a bed and a shower.

We went to a restaurant next to the hotel for dinner and they had karaoke which was very noisy, so a half deaf person like me couldn't communicate with the other people so after having shoved the food down, I went back to the hotel.

Thursday.

There was a storm overnight and we could hear that there was a lot of water coming down overnight, even without windows, so it must have been bad. We were advised to wear our wet weather gear as there could be more wet stuff coming down.

First, we went across the road to get some breakfast and then we went back to the hotel to get ready for some more adventures. Unfortunately, a Norwegian bloke had to go home as his mother was very sick, so we said goodbye to him and never saw him again.

Because of all the rain we had, the roads were not very good and there had been some mud slides, so the road was not very easy to negotiate in some places. As this is a motorcycle country, they didn't worry too much about clearing the road and they had cleared one track where motorcycles could pass, but no cars could go there so our support vehicle had to go a different route.

At one place, they had given up clearing the road and there was a track over the dirt where we could have fun. Anni didn't want to sit on the bike on that stretch so she walked across.

We stopped on a concrete stretch of the road for a coffee break. There was a beautiful view, but I thought that it wasn't the safest place to have a break as the road was narrow, but it seemed to work out as we didn't get run down by any trucks or cars.

After some more riding, we pulled in on a vacant block of land for some lunch. The travel crew worked hard to make some lunch out of the stuff they just bought that morning and they succeeded.



We stayed there for a while and relaxed and some locals turned up to see what we were doing, and the people next door came over and brought a couple of roosters and started a rooster fight that I wasn't all that

interested in.



After lunch, we went for some more riding and in the afternoon, we stopped at a Homestay in Yên Bình where we should stay for two nights. The host family were very nice people and the man in the family shared willingly his "Happy Water" and drank heaps of it himself. They all seems to make "Happy Water" in Vietnam, mostly of rice, but we also saw some people making it out of corn.

We were having dinner in the "sleeping room" and the host stayed with us for a long time to make sure we had plenty of "Happy Water". We were expecting the host to fall over anytime because he had a lot to drink, but it didn't happen, and he was certainly happy so we came to the conclusion that he had trained a lot in drinking that stuff and his liver must have grown big and strong.

Interesting Article from Motorbike Writer on future safety

gear.



Pomelo fruit and fish scales could hold the key to more protective, lighter and cheaper motorcycle riding gear, says BMW Motorrad.

The German manufacturer has spent three years working with universities and companies such as adidas, drawing inspiration from nature to develop safety clothing and helmets for their factory workers. It will also have applications for riders with better helmets and protective clothing and gloves.

Among their prototypes is a helmet that draws impact protection inspiration from the pomelo fruit. Despite its light rind, it does not split open when it falls from a high tree branch.

They claim the helmet would have cushioning properties 10 to 20% better than current materials. They say potential applications include "new forms of protective equipment for motorcyclists".

"Research models of crash helmets and protectors offering the same level of protection weighed considerably less than conventional models available on the market," a BMW press release states.

Fish findings

BMW has also worked on protection gear inspired by fish and reptile scales that overlap and stiffen under load to provide protection against injury.

They are not the first to discover this.

In 2015, <u>we reported on the findings of a Boston University engineering team</u> working on armour based on fish, snake and even butterfly scales.

The researchers constructed scales with a 3D printer and added them to a soft impact-resistant material to create armour that has extra structural stiffening.



BMW says their prototypes designed from nature are up to 20% lighter, tougher and more stable than conventional materials.

They claim gloves and protective inserts made from bionic materials could protect workers on the assembly line from sharp-edged car-body parts. No doubt they would also protect riders.

"The low weight, breathable design and flexibility of the research models mean that movement is barely restricted," BMW says in a press release.

Cheaper riding gear

Future BMW riding gear may not only be lighter and offer better protection, but also be cheaper. Although, BMW riding gear could never be accused of being cheap!

"They can be produced economically and processed for the intended purposes," their release says. "The high level of functional efficiency achieved by biologically-inspired protective equipment also saves material. This not only makes both product and production more sustainable, but also less expensive."

• act ethically and with integrity; • make decisions fairly, impartially and promptly, considering all available information, legislation, policies and procedures; • treat members of the public and colleagues with respect, courtesy, honesty and fairness, and have proper regard for their interests, rights, safety and welfare; • not harass, bully or discriminate against colleagues, members of the public and employees; • contribute to a harmonious, safe and productive work environment by our work habits, and professional workplace relationships; and • fulfilling our purpose as Committee members.

2 Communication and official information - we will:

· not disclose official information or documents acquired through any Ulysses Club Committee, other than as required by law or where proper authorisation is given by The Committee. · not misuse official information for personal or commercial gain for myself or another; · adhere to legal requirements, policies and all other lawful directives regarding communication with members of the media and members of the public generally; and · respect the confidentiality and privacy of all information as it pertains to individuals.

3 Fraudulent and corrupt behaviour – we will: \cdot not engage in fraud or corruption; \cdot report any fraudulent or corrupt behaviour; and \cdot be accountable for the decisions and input we provide.

Facebook Post from MRAQ.

It is with regret that the public is being presented with the misleading, and in some cases completely wrong statistics used to justify another round of singularly focused activity aimed at motorcyclists in Queensland without any particular attempt to understand the issues involved in motorcycle crashes.

While the MRAQ acknowledges that rider safety is of concern and should be a high priority for both Government and individuals the statistics presented in the Ministerial Media Release to justify this round of enforcement are at best being presented in a way that misrepresents the real trends or at worst they are willingly being wrongfully supplied.

Motorcycle fatalities are NOT showing an upward trend. In fact, they are on a downward trend. See the attached fatalities statistics up to 23rd April which in fact shows the number until this date at one less than the previous five-year average. Overall numbers have been declining on average for the last 10-15 years. The statement that rider injuries and deaths are on an upward trend is simply NOT TRUE and we are perplexed as to why this falsehood is being put out by any Government Minister.

Additionally, and of more concern, is the complete abrogation of the information in relation to the amount of increase in numbers of motorcycles on Queensland roads which if no improvement in rider safety was achieved would have resulted in a considerable increase in crashes. Motorcycles are the vehicle type that for the last 10+years was had the highest annual percentage increase in numbers every year and hence if no reduction in crashes versus vehicle numbers was not being achieved the crash rate would be increasing significantly every year. The fact is that the opposite is actually happening. See attached vehicle registration numbers and compare these with the fatality rates.

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The statistics used to justify the increased enforcement attention simply does not stack up.

The MRAQ has been actively involved with various Government groups in the hope of better targeting the reasons for motorcycle crashes and understands that enforcement is one of the various avenues available to Government to attempt to reduce the crash rate. However, if this is the only one used then the result is highly likely to not achieved any great advance in rider safety but will go to reinforce an already existing attitude that riders are unfairly targeted for enforcement attention.

The MRAQ calls upon the Queensland Government to better investigate the reasons for motorcycle crashes and then work with riders and others to achieve a holistic approach to safety instead of all to regularly resorting to a single means campaign which is unlikely to have any tangible result.


