

This last month my family and I went to Seattle for vacation. Melinda grew up near there, so we visited her folks and brother and enjoyed the Pacific Northwest. We crammed a lot of activities in that week and one of our trips was to Mt. St. Helens. Hannah, Carter and I had never been there and it was a long time ago for Melinda — so we ventured out. It was overcast and sprinkled as we started out that morning but by the time we got to the top (as far as you could drive anyway) it cleared up and turned out to be a nice warm sunny day. We took the trail up Windy Ridge and from the top you could see Spirit Lake which is full of logs that were left over from the 1980 explosion of the mountain. We could see the lava crater that was formed on the mountain, the glacier and a waterfall that flowed out of it and had amazing views of Mt. Hood, Mt. Adams, and Mt. Rainier. My mother-in-law who grew up in the area was telling us about the resort that was on Spirit Lake and all of the boats and cabins that were there. None of that remained, all that was left was barren land filled with ash and lava rocks or pumice stones.

We drove back down the mountain to a trailhead that went down to Spirit Lake. As we hiked down the trail, we noticed different types of succulents, plants and other flowers. We saw tracks from elk and other animals and saw fish swimming around in the lake. An area that was total devastation was now coming back to life and is starting to resemble what it looked like before. The part of the mountain that blew up in the explosion will never be restored but new life is forming in its place. It was a reminder to me that even when disaster strikes, God can still make something beautiful out of the rubble. It will never be the same as before, but new life can sprout out of death and despair.

The day we happened to go up there was on a Sunday and I happened to mention to Hannah that this would be a beautiful place to have a church service. She reminded me that Jesus did preach a sermon on the mount but that I didn't need to preach one that day. Being in nature and seeing the beauty of God's creation was my cathedral that day. Picking wild berries and drinking the cool water flowing from a mountain stream was my sacrament. The whistling of the wind through the trees and the songs of the birds was my hymn. God

spoke to me on our hike and it was a reminder that He is in the res-

toration business. God takes

our broken pieces, cleans them up, and puts us back together again. Enjoy some time in God's creation and listen for what He would want to say to you.

(Unapproved) Sunday, July 9, 2019 5:30 pm

David Taft, chairperson called the meeting to order with Joyce reading the devotion from "Jesus Is Calling". Present were Brad Grotewold, Joyce & Daryl Sherman, Pastor Jerry & Betty Robertson, Harriet Young and Pastor Rob. The minutes from the May meeting were read. Daryl made a motion to approve the minutes and Betty seconded. The treasurer's report was read stating a balance as of 7-9-19 is \$7,757.33. Brad made a motion to approve the treasurer's report and Pastor Jerry seconded the motion. Carried. Daryl stated that the May apportionments have been paid. He also stated that the siding fund now has a balance of \$37,420.12. Thanks to all who have contributed to this great project. Donna Lair has been asked if she would take a before and during pictures of the siding progress. That way we can track the progress on a weekly basis and keep all the members posted on the event.

There was a meeting of 2 from each circle that met and made recommendations which will be brought before the UMW meeting in September for approval. The SPRC committee is going to meet and make a job description list and post the job. Raymond will work until July 31st.

He also reported that Wednesday evening July 10th at 6 p.m. the church float will be put on the trailer for July Jubilee parade.

On July 21st there will be service in the park at 5:00 with the community invited. The LMAMA will be furnishing the ice cream for floats. Charge conference will be held on September 29th at Northwood following a potluck dinner.

The next meeting will be held on September 3rd at 5:30. Pastor Jerry will give the devotions. Brad made a motion to adjourn and Daryl second the motion.


