#### SoMar Year in Review

**2007** was a busy year for the company. In February we performed at the fourth bi-annual Erie Festival of Dance held at the beautiful Mary D'Angelo Performing Arts Center. SoMar has been participating in the event since 2001.

April, of course, was our big concert at the East Erie Turners Club. By all accounts, the project was a big success and we were so pleased with the way everything turned out.

After the success of SoMar Dance Works in Concert, we found ourselves involved in a number of projects. Three took place at Erie's Frontier Park. The first involved some impromptu dancing at the Labyrinth. The second was a performance for the official dedication ceremony for the new willow sculpture by artist Bonnie Gail. For this we created an original site-specific piece entitled *Dancing in the Temple of Syrinx* to live music performed by flutist Anna Meyer.

In June, we returned to Frontier Park for a performance at their arboretum. Although it rained heavily until just before the "curtain," the show went on as scheduled.

July found Solveig and Mark in California teaching a master class in partnering techniques to the San Diego Civic Dance Company. We had worked with the dancers the previous year creating an original piece for their performing ensemble.

The summer was also the time to apply for another grant from the Pennsylvania Partners in the Arts. I'm so pleased to report that we were awarded some funds for our upcoming concert.

Along those same lines, SoMar Dance Works is now an official member of the Arts Council of Erie,

In December, Mark rejoined his old friends in Pilobolus Dance Theatre for a show in Abu Dhabi. While there, he collaborated on two dances performed at the palace for the President of the United Arab Emirates.

The year ended with SoMar being included in a nice year-in-review article in the Erie Times/News.
