The Connellsville Canteen perserves the history of the Fayette County men and women who served not only in the War but at the homefront. The Rural Arts Collaborative was formed to place local professional artists into a classroom setting. The Fayette County Cultural Trust brings all walks of life together in the Fayette County area to perserve the history and collaborate working relationships with other like minded organizations.

The Connellsville Canteen is the only WWII Museum in Southwestern Pennsylvania. It is also the home of Harry Clark's Indian Creek Valley Railroad Display. Since opening, it has received the Pennsylvania Downtown Center award for community enhancement. The Canteen has also been visited by the *Travel Channel*, *Mysteries at the Museum* and News Center 4 from Cleveland, Ohio.

This year has truly been a rollercoaster ride due to COVID - 19. This is a time like no other in our lives. The COVID-19 pandemic continues to produce uncertainty, stress and trauma in our communities. By now, we have all been impacted by this virus, which has been devastating for so many. In 2020, the Fayette County Cultural Trust offered financial relief for our downtown businesses who purchased personal protection equipment supplies. The Fayette County Cultural Trust is very thankful and fortunate to have generous supporters who continued with funding this year. We are also thankful to all those who volunteered their time in advancing initiatives of the Trust. COVID - 19 is a devastating virus, but we adapted and continued as best as we could.

Neighborhood Partnership Program

The Partnership is funded through the Pennsylvania Neighborhood Assistance Program, which is a tax credit program offered through the Pennsylvania Department of Community and Economic Development. The program offers tax credits of 80% against applicable Pennsylvania business taxes to businesses who commit at least \$50,000 per year for over 6 years for an approved program.

The Fayette County Cultural Trust has three Neighborhood Partnership Program corporate partners which include UPMC Health Plan, Somerset Trust Company and TriState Capital.











In June 2020, PNC Bank replaced UPMC Health Plan as a corporate sponsor and the Trust was able to add Highlands Hospital and the Connellsville K-9 Unit as non-profit partners in the Neighborhood Partnership Program.

Allegheny Conference on Community Developement Continued Support

The Allegheny Conference's Strengthening Communities Partnership (SCP) program assists communities to achieve stronger momentum in their economic transformation. Leaders representing communities, business and government are working collaboratively to create truly transformative economic development. Their program was created to concentrate private investment and help address disparities in many of the region's neighborhoods.

Since the program's inception in 2012, they have seen the tremendous impact these partnerships have, not only the buildings and vacant lots in these communities, but also, in the restoration of pride and hope in these communities.

The Conference helps build strong relationships between business and community leaders and has committed resources to assist our community partners. The Conference currently assist 16 communities. These communities are Beaver Falls, Bloomfield, City of Butler, Braddock, North Braddock, Rankin, Swissvale, Fineview, Perry Hilltop, Hazelwood, Hill District, Penn Hills, Homestead, W. Neighborhood Partnership Program

Connellsville Community Ministries

The Connellsville Community Ministries serves low income individuals and families. They operate a Care & Share Boutique and currently run the largest food pantry in the area. The Connellsville Community Ministries is managed by Rob Reamer, Executive Director and a board of directors.





Connellsville Carnegie Free Library

The library opened its doors on April 30, 1903, thanks to the generosity of Andrew Carnegie, who believed that education is the cornerstone of success. At that time, Connellsville was the leading coke producer in the world and immigrants were flocking here to work in the mines and coke works. Built of sandstone in the Italianate manner, the building housed books and magazines and offered early patrons both educational and recreational reading, as well as musical evenings in the second floor auditorium. The library was named to the National Register of Historic Places in 1981. Library patrons now have access to more than a million volumes including magazines, e-books, audio books, music and movies through the WAGGIN network.





Wesley Health Center

Wesley Church Health Center, Inc. (WHC), a mission of Wesley United Methodist Church, was founded in 1993 by the Rev. Eugene Ankeny and parishioner Dr. J. Miller Oppy. WHC has been in continuous operation since that time and is the only clinic in southwestern Pennsylvania that provides free primary health care for individuals without health insurance or who are underinsured. WHC is managed by a volunteer Board of Directors and a volunteer Executive Director. Part-time paid staff consists of a Nurse Practitioner, Office Manager, and a Medical Assistant. Dr. Mouhanad Al-Fakih is WHC's Medical Collaborator and, over the years, WHC has added services through collaborative agreements including those with Connellsville Counseling and Pyschological Services for counseling, Dr. John Ellis for eye care, Dr. Francis Jacobyansky for dental care, and Excela

Health's Frick Hospital for blood analysis. An elevator makes WHC's second floor accessible for additional services such as dental and vision screenings, patient education and health classes.





Welcome to Connellsville Walking Map







Business After Hours

The Fayette County Cultural Trust was able to graduate several business entrepreneurs that, over four sessions, learned all aspects of running a successful business. These classes were free and taught by Seton Hill Professor Lyz Marshall from the Wukich Center. A project of the Fayette County Cultural Trust, the Connellsville Canteen has been operating since 2012 and is the only museum in Southwestern Pennsylvania dedicated to preserving the history of WWII. Since opening, the Canteen has hosted several school field trips, mystery tours from out of state tour groups, the *Travel Channel*, news teams from Ohio, and has received an asset enhancement award from the Pennsylvania Downtown Center. The Canteen continues to be the hub of education in the area with its programming to include Lunch & Learns, Dinner & Dialogues, educational partnerships with the Heinz History Center and other organizations. In 2017, the Connellsville Canteen was awarded the Asset Enhancement Award from the state through the Pennsylvania Downtown Center.



Rotating Historical Displays

The Connellsville Canteen has many permanent displays and a few displays that rotate throughout the year. This year our rotating display was on the lives of the Eisenhower family who had ties to Connellsville.



The Connellsville Canteen hosted dinner shows at the beginning of the year featuring local musical artists. These dinner shows were sponsored by the Laurel Highlands Wealth Advisory Group of Janney Montgomery Scott LLC.

In March 2020, the Connellsville Canteen closed temporarilly due to a State of Pennsylvania mandate on museums and restaurants due to COVID. At the end of the year the Canteen opened back up for private tours with limited occupancy.

Connellsville Canteen - Educational Programming





Started in 2012 and after a year of conversations and planning with funding from the Claude Worthington Benedum Foundation, the Rural Arts Collaborative (RAC) Arts Education Project was formed. The premise behind the RAC project approach was to recruit Teaching Artists to work in school districts in Southwestern Pennsylvania counties, with the intent to infuse a diverse arts education approach into existing curriculum, enhance social and cognitive learning for students, and contribute to sustained partnerships amongst educators, artists and students in the region, particularly in those schools which were experiencing cutbacks or entire elimination of their arts programs.

The Fayette County Cultural Trust has been the force to build a strong home for the RAC on that original foundation, and the project continues to flourish in Southwestern Pennsylvania school districts with continuing support from the Claude Worthington Benedum Foundation and additional funding from the Community Foundation of Fayette County, Chevron and EQT. We are ever grateful to our funders, supporters and schools for believing in this project that has made a difference for so many students in our region.




Unlock your History - February 2020

The Fayette County Cultural Trust hosted "Unlock your History" with Pamela & Stefan Israel. This program, provided through a partnership with the Heinz History Center Affiliate Program, was a study on German Immigration in this area during the 1800's. We were provided a tour of St. John's Lutheran Church by Pastor Daniel Clark. St. John's was once a German Church with lots of local history. The Church organ was donated by Andrew Carnegie. This site is one of the oldest in Connellsville for the location of a church. After the tour we headed to the Connellsville Canteen and learned about the history of a letter that was sent from New Haven PA to Pittsburgh that was written in the 1830's. This letter describes the working conditions at a Wool Mill and Weaving Center that was located here. 






Connellsville Crossroads Magazine

This is the second state award the Fayette County Cultural Trust received. The Connellsville Canteen was presented a Pennsylvania state Asset Enhancement awardin 2017.














The Fayette County Cultrual Trust advertized the city of Connellsville in the Trail Guide. This Trail Guide is published for users of the Great Allegheny Passage.








The Fayette County Cultural Trust uses the calendar year for IRS purposes and audits. The FCCT incorporates two financial cycles in its end of year financial report. The IRS calendar year runs from January 1st through December 31st on any given year and the Pennsylvania state's fiscal year is a 12-month period that runs from July 1st through June 30th of the following year. Pennsylvania's Neighborhood Partnership tax credit program is based on the state's fiscal year. The financials reported in this end of year financial report only reflects part of the income from the Neighborhood Partnership tax credit program which is the reason the FCCT is showing a deficit at the end of the 2020 calendar year.
