#### Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

There is an interesting scientific theory that exists as to how the waters receded when Moses and the Israelites crossed the Red Sea on dry ground as recorded in Exodus chapter 14. The theory tries to explain how this phenomenon occurred without the intervention of a miracle. There is a rare weather condition called 'wind set-down' which has the power to separate water in huge quantities and when the wind subsides, a huge boreal wave is created in a given body of water, which strikes with immediate impact and returns the body of water to its original shaping.

It is fascinating but the question remains: How did Moses and the Israelites time this scenario precisely with opposing Egyptians hastily chasing them?

Cape St Vincent is the most westerly point of land on mainland Europe. I was able to visit it on one occasion on holiday some years ago in Portugal. There was a sign for touristic appeal which stated, 'After this, oblivion!' This sign was located on the edge of the clifftops at the Cape and referred to the height of the cliffs and nothing but water ahead for thousands of miles in a westerly direction. You would not want to fall off those cliffs for certain! It reminded me of the saying, 'the leap of faith', which involves a huge step forward into something, in our mindset or understanding, that could detrimentally affect us or we lose something we don't want to give up. Not that I wanted to leap of the Cape to justify the saying!! The bible tells us not to tempt the Lord our God but there are times in our lives that the leap of faith may be required.

Many of us are very good at quantifying or rationalising our faith or to keep it firmly in our control for comfort reasons etc. Moses and the Israelites took an enormous leap of faith at the Red Sea, trusting in God at a point when they were surely snookered! It is a test to move forward into the unknown. When we first come to faith in Jesus as Lord of our lives it requires a leap of faith. A leap of faith and trust that He died for our sins, that He will forgive us our sins if we ask Him, that He is the only way to Heaven and that He offers the gifts of salvation and eternal life. This requires a transformation of our lives and that we will follow Him all our days. There are many leaps of faith that Christians continue to make in life thereafter but as a relationship grows between Saviour and saved sinner, trust grows and we know that God will never let anyone go or be lost from His guiding hand who trust in Him. Have we taken that initial leap of faith of trust in Jesus? That stepping out and firmly placing our hand in His and knowing that He will be with us through all trials in life. There is no other relationship like it and no other trust can compare.
