
## Heating and Cooling System Update

To date, \$54,980 has been raised for the installation of the climate control system. The first phase of the installation requires the drilling of six (6) wells for the ground source heat pumps.

The Mansion Board has contracted with Frey Mechanical to install the cooling and heating system. They will begin working on drilling the wells within the next couple of weeks.

Your generous contributions have made this important step in the Mansion preservation possible. Less than \$100,000 more is needed to complete the museum-grade system. Once completed, items that are currently in storage at museums can be returned to the Mansion for display and appreciation.

The <u>Yard Sale</u> held on April 11 and 12 resulted in \$587.36 raised towards the Mansion operating expenses. A special thank you to all those people that donated their time and treasures to make this weekend a success, despite the rain.
