#### IT'S ONE OF THOSE "MOMENTS"...

I don't know what I am doing! Seriously...and I freely admit it!

But then, if you've been paying attention at all over the past months, I am not the only one.

Since the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic it seems everyone has been scrambling, especially everyone and anyone in any kind of leadership or service role—from government (at every level), to health care, to schools and nursing facilities, small businesses, large corporations, banks, sports leagues, agriculture, the Church...you name it. All these institutions, as well as the public at large, have been plunged into uncharted waters as a result of Covid-19. These are unprecedented times; and, as has been often pointed out (by pundit and by experience), none of these institutions had a playbook ready for this pandemic.

Then, the George Floyd incident in Minneapolis (following other recent, similar incidents)...and we have a country in convulsions; and along with it, a rekindled but sadly, painfully familiar debate about race, justice, and history. I say "rekindled" and "sadly familiar" because at times in our past it has burned red hot...but in reality, has never stopped smoldering in our national life—because systemic racism requires systemic solutions, and we Americans can't seem to unite long enough or with enough intention (national will?) to find those solutions (yet).

And now...Covid-19 is resurging in many places. Add all this up, and the only constants since mid-to-late winter have been uncertainty, fear, anxiety, question upon question... along with pain, and grief, and loss, and inconsistency, and guess work...and more uncertainty.

So, no...as a church leader, I don't know what I am doing with all this. Except like just about everyone else, I am scrambling to make sense of it all and seeking some helpful responses to answer it all, reassure others in the midst of it all, plan/create online worship regardless of it all, stay strong and focused despite it all, persevere and find some kind of hope through it all, grieve and overcome the losses brought by it all. And maybe most of all, try to trust God in the middle of it all.

But, even if I don't know what I am doing a lot of the time, I do know a few things. I know, for example, that even those these are "unprecedented" times, we have been through unprecedented times before. Wars...social upheavals...recessions and depressions...times of national tragedy and national angst. And in this church, we have also lived through great stresses and upheaval before.

I also know we have always come through these times, one way or another. Different or changed, perhaps. Worn down but still resilient, definitely. Stronger and more united, occasionally. Wiser and more compassionate to one another—and more enlightened--hopefully. <u>Always</u> work to do there.

Further, I know that this tough and unique "moment" in history is a time of "testing," for everyone; and especially perhaps for our church. At our most recent "special" Council meeting (all members were invited), there was a lot of angst, anxiety, anger...some of this flowing from ongoing historic tensions, some from systemic problems we

need to fix in the church, some from mistakes or lapses in leadership (including my own!)—all mashed together, and all <u>undoubtedly exacerbated</u> by the stress and uncertainty of this tough and unique "moment" in history.

We will be working on these old tensions—or should I say, we will <u>keep</u> working on them, as we've been trying to in the past. We will address and try to fix the systemic problems. We'll learn from our mistakes. And, in the (hopefully) not too distant future, we will be meeting again together for worship in the church. Of course, doing any of these things in <u>isolation</u> won't end the angst and anxiety. But when added <u>together</u>, and with time, they give us some guiding direction, and the path toward increased unity. And for the current moment—our shared NOW—it puts us <u>on that path</u> to travel together. The task for each one of us—our individual decision to make, now—is to decide to take the first steps on that path.

Here are a few of those steps we can all take...

- 1. Examine your own heart, and see how it might be affected by (even feeding on?) old tensions and historic discord; and if it is affected, start to <u>let go of the past</u> (it guarantees us nothing), reject the discord, and start working on some heart healing. A main key to that—the first step—is to <u>want</u> to let it go and to <u>desire</u> some healing...and, wow! God offers expert help with that!
- 2. Support the church leadership, with empathy and prayer—in general, church leadership in today's world is <a href="https://marches.org/harder-than-even">harder than EVER</a> in the past (that's no joke—even <a href="https://www.without">without</a> a pandemic and the current social unrest); and especially offer support as we learn to better discern the systemic problems we have and start to implement adaptations we need to make.
- 3. And finally—actually, maybe <u>start</u> here?—<u>consciously and intentionally</u> make the effort to consistently <u>GROW in your own spiritual life and depth</u>, if you're not already doing this. And even if you are, or think you are, we can ALWAYS (all of us!) be more consistent. We need this. We need this a LOT. Every church needs this, especially churches that want to become and remain relevant in today's world. A church MUST have regular, consistent, quality spiritual growth in its members...or it has become little more than a social club.

Not that there's anything wrong with social clubs; they're fun, and offer lots of benefits and good times for their members! But a CHURCH is not a club; it's a gathering of <u>called disciples</u>, being transformed by the Spirit and then transforming their world. A church is not about benefits you receive, nor perks of membership, nor "having good times." Certainly, being the church <u>can</u> lead to some "good times, <u>even great ones!</u> But, those are the <u>result</u> of growth in faith and discipleship, growth in the Spirit and in <u>UNITY</u>...they are the "fruit of the Spirit" (see below)...but they are not the starting place. Again, the church is a gathering of <u>called disciples</u>, a called people—called to manifest and mirror the Living Christ, all the time, everywhere, every day, sharing God's full Love in a world that so badly needs more love, and less drama.

That "fruit of the Spirit?" I close by quoting our church's namesake, St. Paul, from one of his authentic (and earliest) letters, <u>Galatians</u>...written in a tough and unique "moment" in history:

But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and-self-control. There is no law against things like this. Those who belong to Christ Jesus have crucified the self with its passions and its desires. If we live by the Spirit, let's follow the Spirit. Let's not become arrogant, make each other angry, or be jealous of each other. — Galatians 5.22-26

Letting go of the past and moving into our shared NOW...consistent regular spiritual formation (with it's accompanying peace and JOY)...growing with your leaders...addressing needed (and do-able) changes...more love, less drama...harvesting fruit of the Spirit. Sounds good to me. How about you?

#### **WORK ORDERS**



# ST. PAUL UCC'S REFORMING TEAM Report to the Church

Our ReForming Team, an *ad hoc* group of church Council members, started working over six weeks ago to begin discussions and planning on how to safely reopen SPUCC this summer, while we are still IN the middle of the Covid-19 pandemic. The Team consists of Pastor Barry, Pastor Joan, Judith Lewis-Combs,

Linda Woods, and Judy Boyce.

The following are the recommendations of the Team—including the safety guidelines we are asking ALL members and visitors to follow for at least the rest of the summer and possibly beyond. The earliest date for reopening—our <u>current</u> target date—is **July 19**. This could change, as a resurgence of infections is now taking place in more and more places; and in the last week, the church's zip code (45231) has been one of the "hottest" zones in Ohio. We will keep everyone updated on any change of plans via email, phone, our website, and the church's Facebook page.

#### **GUIDELINES FOR REOPENING**

- 1. Only ONE entrance is to be used, the main entrance, off main parking lot. All other entrances will be locked. Please remain on the Sanctuary level while in the church.
- 2. Everyone must have their temperature checked (non-touch digital thermometers) upon entering the church.
- 3. Everyone is strongly encouraged to wear a face covering upon entering the church. Disposable face masks will be provided, if needed.
- 4. Everyone must sanitize their hands upon entering the church. Hand sanitizer will be available at the main entrance and at various spots throughout the main level.
- 5. Everyone must practice social distancing. We are asking that people REFRAIN from physical contact for the time being—NO hugging, handshakes, etc. (elbow or fist bumps permitted).
- 6. Everyone must adhere to seating arrangements. Pews will be <u>marked</u> to allow proper distancing. Persons in same household may sit together.
- 7. No drinking or eating inside church at this time.
- 8. Use sanitizing wipes in restrooms, after each use. Do not place wipes in toilets.
- 9. There will be no printed bulletins. Order of worship will be projected on screen in sanctuary.
- 10. A box will be located at rear of sanctuary for placement of giving envelopes. We are in the process of setting up online giving for those who may be interested.
- 11. We still encourage the following persons to stay at home and continue to worship virtually:
  - A. Persons with cold or flu symptoms;
  - B. Persons who have been caring with someone with cold/flu symptoms;
  - C. Persons with pre-existing conditions (diabetes, asthma, COPD or other lung/breathing issues, heart disease, kidney disease, weak immune systems)
  - D. Persons 60 and over with pre-existing conditions and weak immune systems.
- 12. These rules will be adjusted as time goes on, and as the safety of ALL allows.










#### From Living Waters Association (NE Ohio)



Once upon a time there were five sisters Mahlah, Noah, Hoglah, Milcah, and Tirzah. They were the daughters of Zelophahad whose story is "hidden" in Numbers 27 and 36 tucked in the story about the end of 40 year wilderness journey of the Israelites to the promised land.

Israelites had left Egypt and were near the plains of Jericho when God said to Moses and Eleazar, We have to get ready for entering the promised land. Take a census of the whole community, count them ALL from the age twenty years and older, so that we can divide up the land between them justly.

The counting of the whole community commenced, but not really. The census was to count males over 20 years of age who were old enough to bear arms. Women and children were not to be counted.

The sisters had no brothers. What were they to do? Were they to remain landless and homeless? They found this to be unjust and decided to do something about it.

So, they marched before Moses, in public, in front of the whole congregation, and made their case – "Why should our father's name be lost because he had no sons? Give to us our rightful inheritance!"

Moses was speechless! What could he say? How could he respond? Besides, how is it possible to change years of tradition and law, social order and structure?

Moses brings this complicated question to God and God says, the daughters of Zelophahad are right. Give them their rightful inheritance. Give them what's their father's. And, from now on here is a new law – if a man dies and

has no sons, then you shall give his inheritance to his daughters...

The law is amended because these women had the courage to speak out, and demand what's rightfully theirs. They wanted to be counted. They wanted justice. Moses was not so sure but God took the side of the women, the marginalized, the uncounted! Because of their courage to speak their truth God changed the law expanding women's economic status, hence culture, and society.

I think of this story as I watch the protests for equality, respect and human dignity. My heart breaks for the racism experienced daily by those who are born with darker pigments in their skin. I find hope in the throngs of people gathered demanding change. I celebrate that God loves all yet stands especially with those who are dismissed by society, those toward whom society remains indifferent, those who are uncounted, demeaned and degraded, even murdered.

Human dignity is a rightful inheritance for God's children created in God's image. Inheritance is passed on through bloodline. As God's children of all colors we all inherit the right to live with dignity, respect and nobility. This right is a birthright, a gift. Begrudging another their birthright is violence demonstrated in racism, classism, homophobia, and all the "isms" that demean, belittle and oppress.

May we continue to have the courage to learn about racism, to accept our part in it, and speaking truth to power ensure that all God's children of all colors inherit their birthright now!

#### **Paycheck Protection Program**

With Covid-19, there were many programs offered for small business'. For the first time, churches were also able to receive help as well.

St. Paul applied for the Paycheck Protection Program, aka, PPP. We did receive the loan. There was criteria we had to follow. The main criteria was that we had to maintain our employees. Salary employees were not affected, but hourly employees hours were cut. The original loan amount was based on payroll, pension, and health benefits. This loan is forgivable, which essentially it means it will be a grant. This will help us to cover payroll, pension payments, health benefits, and utilities over a 24 week period. As the end of the 24 week approaches, an application will be submitted with all the required documentation to make it "forgiveable"
