We know it will be an exciting time in a beautiful country, with amazing people, great facilities, and an opportunity to network with professionals from all over the world.

One very important reminder is that each of the hotels being used for the conference has a different cut off deadline for making a reservation at the conference rate! Also, the sightseeing tours before and after the conference are advertised on the IASE website have a minimum number of participants to make them happen. Register early for those events too!

I would like to highlight some of our outstanding keynote speakers as well as a new conference feature this year of "invited showcase sessions." Our first plenary session keynote speaker will be Professor Boguslaw Sliwerski, a noted expert in the field of education and the current minister of education for Poland. Our second plenary speaker will be Susan A. Conners, a member of the National Tourette Association. She is the author of "The Tourette Syndrome/OCD Checklist: A Practical Resource for Parents and Educators." Our closing plenary session will be done by Kevin Spencer. Kevin has been conducting some amazing research on "arts-integrated" approach to impact cognitive and social skills development of children with ADHD and Autism. I know you will not want to miss any of these keynote speakers!

The conference will include "invited showcase sessions" on topics of particular relevance to the conference theme. The first is titled "Effective Sex Education Can Prevent Sexual Abuse of People with Disabilities." This panel discussion will feature Swaleha Mohamendali, Tanzania; Hazel Chang, Hong Kong; Roni Chavez, Vietnam; and Ambumulire Phiri, Malawi.

The second will be a panel presentation titled "Leadership: The Key to Effective Inclusionary Practices" and will feature Alice Farling, Emily Collins, Mark Francis, Mary Kealy, and Nick Burnett. The third will be "Collaboration in Planning and Teaching to Facilitate Inclusion" by Richard Villa and Jacque Thousand, and the fourth "A Consultative Model for Providing Technical Assistance to School Personnel in Service to Children with Autism" by John Wheeler and Stacy Carter. I think these showcase sessions will offer a new dimension to our conference.

There will be plenty of breakout sessions as well as round table discussions, presentations, and poster sessions. Topics range across the spectrum of persons with disabilities and I am sure there will be something for everyone! This year we are dedicating one room to all of the Volunteer Service Project presentations. There will be displays and items for sale from some of the service project areas. You will not want to miss this room!

A gentle reminder to each conference participant to bring items from your country for the silent and live auctions to be held during the conference. The silent auctions will take place daily where you can stop by, peruse the items, and write down your bid. At the end of each day, the highest bidder will win that item. Yesterday we visited the Panorama Raclawicka, the only preserved Polish panoramic painting and one of the few in the world. It was created to commemorate the centenary of the Kosciuszko Uprising. It depicts a battle fought in Raclawice between Polish insurgent army and two columns of Russian forces sent to suppress the revolt of April 4, 1794. Hidden away during WW II in a Bernardine monastery, the panorama was moved to a rotunda of the Panorama Raclawicka in Slowacki Park. This is a must see while you are in Wroclaw.

The local arrangements committee is busy securing items for your conference bags!! We hope to have maps, guide books, and other items to assist you while you are in the city. There is so much to do here and such friendly people, that I know you will all enjoy your time at the 14th Biennial Conference. Make plans to attend! First National Chair Workshop

The IASE National Chair Program was created with a vision that one of the roles of a National Chair is to communicate information about inclusive and special education events and projects in his or her nation. With the support and guidance of IASE National Chair Program Coordinator, Shamani-Jeffery Shikwambi, the first National Chair Workshop has been convened in Arusha, Tanzania. It was conducted on January 19-22, 2015, at Meru Primary School with permission from Headmaster Musa Ibrahim.

Tanzania IASE National Chair, Swaleha Mohamedali, felt that educators in her country needed to understand the importance of social skill training for students who are ready to go into their communities for job training. She organized and coordinated a workshop entitled "The Role of Social Skills for Employment Opportunities and Social Inclusion" with help from Eunice Tondi, SEN Representative at the Arusha City Council and acting Secretary to Ms. Mohamedali. Special Education officers from 16 regions in Tanzania, teachers, non-profit directors from Toa Nafasi, Ithemba Foundation, and Diana Women Empowerment Group, plus international volunteers were in attendance. Iris Drower, IASE President, and Mary Gale Budzisz, IASE Volunteer Service Project, helped to facilitate the workshop.

Topics addressed during the workshop ranged from "Identification and Assessment of Social Skills", "How to Teach Social Skills to Young Adults with Disabilities", "Employment Training and Opportunities", to "The Process of Teaching a Complex Skill by Breaking it down into Manageable Steps/Task Analysis." In conjunction with theory, the participants also learned songs, art and crafts, acting, role playing and hands-on-activities to use in the classrooms. At the culmination of the workshop, each participant had to create an Action Plan that they could implement in their own region. These plans will be monitored and a final document with data will be compiled to share across Tanzania.

Swaleha Mohamedali moved into action and the Tanzania Association of Special Education (TASE) was developed. Elected to leadership were: Michael Pima from Sebastian Kolowa Memorial University (SEKOMU) in Lushoto as Chairperson, Peter Ngatunga from the City Council of Singida as Vice-Chairperson, and Salome Cherehani from the Municipal Office of the Geita Region in Mwanza as the Secretary. Ms. Mohamedali will serve as the Coordinator.

The closing ceremony was complete with a local band provided by Farida Khakoo. Special guests were Mr. Albert Nestory, Arusha City Council Regional Education Officer, Mr. Muslim Remtula, President of the Board of Directors at Jaffery Academy, and Mr. Hudson, Manager of McMoody's Restaurant. Ms. Mohamedali spoke about the need to continue workshops to enable Tanzania's educational leaders to come together and collaborate on effective strategies to meet the needs of young adults with disabilities. She encouraged the participants to take what they learned and share it with colleagues, parents and fellow educators in their own communities. Certificates were presented to all participants and a bit of dancing finished off a wonderful workshop.

SANKALP

Since its inception in 2006, Sankalp Society has evolved and transformed itself to respond to the changing needs of children from disadvantaged groups in India. Sankalp believes every child has a right to good education. Sankalp's main purpose is to help empower girls by providing them stimulating, gender sensitive, and non-discriminatory environments in which to learn. The Sankalp Society has taken the initiative to empower girls through vocational training with the objectives of increasing enrollment of girls in rural schools in India; reducing their drop-out rates; helping them to complete elementary education; building awareness in the community about the need and importance of educating girls; and enhancing community school linkages by involving the community in the sustainability of vocational training.

To help implement vocational training of girls, the IASE GIVING Fund has purchased 16 sewing machines for two schools in New Delhi, India. Community members have offered their support for the maintenance of the machines. Vocational instructors are teaching sewing as part of their curriculum.

The following responses from the girls about this vocational project reflect the impact of the gifts on their lives:

We will stitch clothes at home now, instead of buying them from the open market. Himani, Grade 8.

I will now stitch new clothes for my doll and other toys. Shimran, Grade 6.

My father has expired. If I learn to sew, then I can contribute some money for my household. Pooja, Grade 8.

My father is a labourer. I can learn to sew and earn money from which I can buy some books and improve my learning. Ruksaar, Grade 9.

Treasurer's Report

As of December 31, 2014, IASE had expended \$15,352 of its 2014 General Fund Budget of \$34,800 or 44%. Additionally, \$27,371 of a budgeted amount of \$30,600 (89%) has been expended from the GIVING and VSP dedicated accounts.

Account balances as of 12/31/14 were as follows:

- VSP Dedicated Account = \$644
- GIVING Dedicated Account = \$2,585
- Marg Csapo Scholarship Dedicated Account = \$9,152
- General Fund Savings & Checking = \$234,522

Total IASE Accounts' balance = \$246,903

The IASE Board of Directors has approved the following budget for 2015:

- General Fund Budget - \$27,205
 - Volunteer Service Project Budget (VSP + GIVING) - \$51,050
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IASE Seeks Proposals for the 2019 Conference Site

IASE, with membership in 50 countries, is seeking proposals for the 2019 Conference site. We welcome proposals for a venue site that meet the requirements listed below.

1. Be located in a city with an international airport.
2. Provide adequate meeting space: (a) 12-15 meeting rooms that would accommodate 25-35 persons, (b) a large meeting space (to accommodate 400 people) for general plenary sessions, and (c) space for registration, exhibits, and poster sessions.
3. Provide needed equipment (e.g., overheads, and/or LCD projectors, screens, lap tops, easels).
4. Have food services available at/near the venue site.
5. Be situated in a reasonably close proximity to hotels.
6. Promote the conference in the region/country.
7. Be willing to provide guidance to the IASE Planning Committee about tours, school visits, venue for Gala Dinner, and more.
8. Be able to designate a minimum of 5-6 people to serve on a Local Planning Committee to work with the IASE Planning Committee on conference needs (e.g., printing a program).
9. Be able and willing to accept registrations from own country. This would include accepting the registrations and funds, and maintaining appropriate records for accounting purposes.
10. Have available low cost sleeping rooms (e.g., dorms) for individuals who seek/prefer to stay on the university campus.
