Some people will tell you that it happens to everyone...eventually.

At some point, we get stuck in neutral. It can be for a short season or a long season; regardless, it happens.

We stop moving forward. We stop growing. We become content with just existing. And that's not all. William S. Burroughs is credited with saying: "When you stop growing, you start dying"

When we get stuck in neutral...when we stop moving forward...when we stop growing...when we are content with just existing...we begin to wither and die.

In the Church, it happens most often when a *certain phrase* is thrown around haphazardly (at least at first) to casually justify being stuck in neutral. We lose sight of our main purpose and either become stagnant or allow unnecessary chaos to slow us down until we eventually stop. Then, that *certain phrase* becomes an excuse for why we stopped moving in any direction. The next stage is when that *certain phrase* becomes the reason we are content with just existing. Finally, that *certain phrase* becomes the very reason a church dies. What is this *certain phrase*?

"We've always done it that way..."

All words have power yet these six words can kill a church. Church leaders who have served in churches that have stalled out and eventually died - as well as churches that have flourished and grown - will tell you that when a church is committed to holding onto "the way we've always done things" and thus refusing change, it will begin to wither and will eventually become extinct.

Personally, I am a firm believer that one should never initiate change for the sake of making changes; however, I also believe that we should never continue doing things "the way it has always been done" simply because we dread change or because change requires more effort than we are willing to give.

Last month, the Church Council of St. John's United Methodist Church, led by Chairman Steve Roller, was asked to look at St. John's United Methodist Church through the eyes of a first-time visitor. Then as a follow up, I invited the Church Council to secure a copy of "Becoming a Welcoming Church" by Thom Rainer.

In our commitment to help our faith family be the best it can be – now and in the future - we identified areas of ministry where we can begin this process of becoming a more welcoming church. As a Church Council we have been intentional about viewing our church from a physical campus perspective, as well as a relational perspective. In other words, how easy is it to access the different areas of our church, do we provide clear signage, and are we being honest with ourselves concerning how visitors are being welcomed once they take that courageous first step of entering the church. As a Church Council, we are in agreement that yes, we are a welcoming and loving faith family! We also agree that what we must do now is evaluate is whether we are welcoming and loving to everyone or just to those that people we know. Do we seem surprised when visitors choose to join us for worship or ministry opportunities or do they feel as though we are expecting them? Believe it or not, the answer to this question can make all the difference in the world to a first-time visitor.

Whether you serve as part of the Church Council or not, your participation in this endeavor is of utmost importance and we invite you to be a part of this most important work.

We encourage you to ask yourself, "How can I help make sure that EVERYONE – those who have called St. John's UMC 'home' for 70+ years, as well as those whom we have not yet met – know that there is a place for them to call 'home' and a family of faith who desires to embrace them"?

Let us all join in prayer that God would guide us as we strive to be united, inspired, encouraged, and empowered to make the changes that are necessary to live life with abundance and be open to growth – as individuals and as a family of faith.





St. John's United Methodist Church Family,

Here we are again with another year passed with hopes that 2021 would have been different than 2020. Who would have thought that in 2022 we would still be dealing with COVID? <u>BUT</u> 2022 finds us in a different place because we have resumed all services, meetings (many are still being offered via ZOOM), missions, and activities at St. John's United Methodist Church. In spite of all that has happened and the uncertainty that remains, God is good, and God is still in control.

At this time, the St. John's UMC Finance Committee would like to give you a recap of 2021/2020 and offer you a glimpse of how God continues to sustain and provide for our faith family through your financial generosity.

- We applied for and received funding from the Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) in 2020 which supplied the funds necessary to provide payroll for our Church staff and Child Care Ministry Staff, as well as the utility costs for our facilities for ten weeks. We submitted the loan forgiveness application in December 2020 and the loan was forgiven on April 14, 2021.
- 2) The Finance Committee adopted and approved a budget for 2022 for \$386,713.00. (This budget was a substantial decrease from our 2021 budget of \$444,059.00.
- 3) We continue supporting the following missions: Sacks of Love, Angel Tree, Operation Christmas Child Shoeboxes, Habitat for Humanity, Christian Community Ministries, Food for the Soul, Meals on Wheels and the Warm Project in addition to several others through different ministries in the church.
- 4) We paid 100% of our apportionments to the South Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church.
- 5) We continued with monthly landscaping projects on the church campus, monthly cemetery maintenance, removed 19 dead trees on the church campus, repaired potholes in the parking lot, made repairs to the picnic area, made updates to the Memorial Prayer Garden, and replaced the AED battery.
- Our offerings/tithes were down substantially through the first six months of 2021 compared to the first six months of 2020; **HOWEVER**, due to God's provision through **YOU** and your renewed commitment to offer God's tithes and offerings to St. John's United Methodist Church, we ended 2021 with total revenues of \$348,366 compared to \$336,639 for 2020.

Thank you to everyone connected to St. John's United Methodist Church who recognized the importance of supporting the local church with God's tithes and offerings helping us to maintain our missions and ministries that seek to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. Even during a year of great loss as we have offered several of our faithful faith family members back to God, we have continued to give God thanks for their impact on our lives as we pick up their torch for St. John's UMC and light the way. We have done this in many ways – one of them by offering our resources which has allowed us to end the year with just a small shortfall between revenues and expenses.

- Thank you to every person connected to St. John's United Methodist Church that generously gave of their resources by offering God's tithes and offerings so that ministry would continue;
- Thank you to the musicians, choir members, staff members, and Pastor who week after week pulled together to offer weekly worship services while also tending to the business of the church throughout the year;
- <u>Thank you</u> to all our Sunday School teachers, youth leaders, and committee members, team members who remained faithful by offering with regular meetings in spite of the limitations COVID caused.
- Thank you to our technology wizards who helped us stay in contact through use of video streaming and ZOOM week after week.
- Thank you also to everyone who participated in worship online or in person at St. John's United Methodist Church. It is truly because of the love and commitment of each person connected to our faith family that St. John's UMC ended the year with our financial status being drastically improved. We attribute these amazing accomplishments to God's provision through you our incredibly generous faith family.

Thank you for continuing to support St. John's UMC with your <u>prayers</u>, <u>presence</u>, <u>gifts</u>, <u>service</u> and <u>witness</u>. We are truly excited and looking forward to what God has in store for St. John's United Methodist Church and our community in 2022!

(No) HOLY COMMUNION DURING LENT

at St. John's United Methodist Church

At St. John's United Methodist Church, it is our tradition to share in the sacrament of Holy Communion on the first Sunday of each month, as well as on special days that are recognized by the Church as an appropriate day to celebrate the sacrament – such as Christmas Eve. This year, during the season of Lent, St. John's United Methodist Church is abstaining from offering Holy Communion on the 1st Sundays of the months that fall during Lent (March 6th and April 3rd).

Why would we do this?

As we seek to live a "Holy Lent" it is important to recognize that the season of Lent provides an opportunity for us to be more disciplined and focused in our living. The season of Lent is a time of preparation and focus, reminiscent of Jesus' time in the wilderness before he started his public ministry. When Jesus went into the wilderness, he set aside the distractions of normal "worldly" life to focus on the will of God as he began ministry. During this Lent we are invited to do the same – to focus on the "main thing" and reflect on how we all too often take this sacred, holy meal for granted.

Our hope is that in abstaining of this holy sacrament our understanding and appreciation for the sacrament of Holy Communion would grow; that we would understand it is a gift (a gift we could never earn, nor will we ever deserve); that we would come to know it is a gift offered by Christ that draws us into deeper communion with God. And it is our hope that the next time we gather at the Table to remember the Last Supper that Jesus shared with his disciples, on Maundy Thursday (April 14th), we would hear their story with a fresh understanding allowing each one of us to receive the gift of holy communion as never before. You see, it may sound illogical to abstain from the greatest good we have in the world; however, it is often in the sacrifice of something that we learn to appreciate it more deeply.

GREENERY (INSTEAD OF FLOWERS) DURING LENT

at St. John's United Methodist Church

The Lenten season is designated as a time of repentance, sacrifice, and self-denial. During Lent, the physical appearance of the sanctuary often reflects these aspects of the Lenten season. While it is common for the sanctuary of St. John's United Methodist Church to be adorned with colorful flowers throughout most of the year, during the season of Lent we will honor a spirit of simplicity by not having any flowers and only using greenery. Instead of flowers, two peace lilies have been placed in the sanctuary by the worship ministry team to remain in the sanctuary throughout the Lenten season until Good Friday during our Tenebrae Worship Service.

Easter Flower Cross

On Easter morning, Sunday, April 17th, everyone is invited and encouraged to bring fresh flowers that can be used to adorn the flower cross on Easter morning in celebration of the Resurrection of Christ our Lord! This is always a beautiful display of life!



LENTEN SERMON SERIES

"Lent in Plain Sight"

"God works through the ordinary. Ordinary people, everyday objects, things we bump up against moment by moment. From burning bushes to talking donkeys to a booming voice from heaven, God goes to great lengths to communicate with people, sending Jesus Christ, God's only Son, to unmistakably tell human beings about salvation, grace, and reconciliation."
