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Fish of every kind and the mission of the church

At the end of every Eucharist, we are sent into the world. The dismissal– "Go" – tells us that we are people on the move.

"Let us go forth in the name of Christ... "Go in peace to love and serve the Lord... "Let us go forth into the world, rejoicing in the power of the Spirit...

We Christians have ended our services with "Let's Go!" for so long that the languages aren't spoken anymore. "Ite, missa est" can mean "Go, it is dismissed," but also, "Go, it is mission." When we leave church on Sunday, we are launched on a mission just like missiles from a launching pad. The worship inside the church building ends so that the worship in the world can begin.

As St. Francis said, "Preach the gospel always. Use words when necessary." Or as the great mystic country parson, George Herbert, said "Seven whole days, not one in seven, I will praise thee."

We are launched from the community of the faithful. The Greek word for church is "ekklesia" –ek means "out of" and keleo means "called." We are called together out of the world and then sent back into the world with our cry "Let's go!" We get our word "ecclectic" from the word for "church" – God's unique collection of people "deriving ideas, style, or taste from a broad and diverse range of sources."

God has very broad and diverse taste bringing us all together. Jesus tries to tell us this all the time. "The kingdom of heaven is like a dragnet gathering fish of every kind." (Matthew 13:47). A dragnet (Greek sagéné) is a big rectangular net with weights on one side and floats on the other. When a dragnet is pulled in with ropes from the corners, it snags whatever gets in the way: boots, bottles, beer cans, seaweed, old tires and every kind of fish.

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Some of us fish are tropical lovelies, like Nemo the Clownfish, Rainbow fish, Angelfish, Lionfish, and even the dazzling blue Regal Tang. And others of us are less stunning, like the drab Grouper, the walking Sea Pig with seven pairs of unaesthetic nubby feet, and even one poor guy with the unfortunate name, the Blobfish. But the point is that all of us fish, beautiful or not, belong together in the dragnet that is God's peculiar collection.

So, if a congregation is made up of people who think exactly alike, who look exactly alike, and who agree on everything, then they failed to live into God's creative diversity. Notice that God fishes with a dragnet, not fancy hand-tied fly fishing gear designed to land only speckled trout, as Robert F. Capon is fond of pointing out. Or to put it differently, Church is where we go to be with people who are different from us, in order to prove that God's unifying love is more powerful than our differences.

With all that background in mind, I am on a personal mission to eliminate a common word from our vocabulary, and more importantly, from our thought processes. That word is "Recessional" as in "Recessional hymn" indicating the end of a service.

The church does not declare recess when we go forth into the world. We do not recede from anything. Recessional comes from the Latin "recedere" which means to go backwards! Christians never go backwards because we are too busy going forth into the world! We do not declare recess until next Sunday. We process into the world, or more accurately, we are launched. So, just erase "recessional" from your mind, and strike it out of your heart as a piece of negative thinking we just don't need. We go on our way rejoicing, instead of receding into our hole until next week.

[Please note that there is no place in the Book of Common Prayer where the word "recessional hymn" is found. There is merely the note on page 409: "A hymn may be sung before or after the postcommunion prayer." So, if we don't call it a recessional hymn, what do we call it? Try "Concluding hymn" or "Procession into the World" or just plain old "hymn."]

I saw the most ironic thing on Youtube the other day. A church posted a video of their small congregation singing "O Zion, haste, thy mission high fulfilling." They sang it with vigor, with gusto, with personal commitment, with missionary zeal. They sang with all their hearts: "Proclaim to every people, tongue and nation that God, in whom they live and move, is Love." And in the middle of all this positive missionary forward movement, whoever posted the video labeled it a "recessional hymn." It was really a "Let's go and win one for the Gipper" hymn. It was really a "take no prisoners" hymn. It was really a "Go forth into the world, rejoicing in the power of the Spirit" hymn.

We do not declare recess. We declare victory over sin and death. We declare glad tidings of great joy for all people. Jesus's Resurrection invented the idea that Love always wins two thousand years ago. We declare that God loves you exactly as you are, and this congregation is the place where you can find God's love reflected in God's people "with skin on them."

This week, I was lucky enough to take communion to one of our elderly members who lives in an assisted living memory unit. As we were leaving after our too brief visit, she wanted to give her visitors a hug. The staff member at the facility stopped her and said "I'm sorry, but right now we can't do that." While it was for our Covid safety, the inability to give one another a hug broke my heart into little pieces. You could just see her sweet face drop.

So, I make you this promise: when we can finally safely gather again after this Covid mess is over, we are going to hug one another as we have never hugged one another before. We are going to exchange the peace as Christians have done for two thousand years, with all the agapé, acceptance, and affirmation that we can muster. We will treasure every one of the "fish of every kind" that Jesus has gathered into this dragnet. And we will each be sent forth to fish like dragnets in the oceans of the world. "Let's go!"


Our attendance has declined since we have not been able to meet in person.
