Greetings of Grace and Blessings in the New Year!

I love the New Year; not the parties and celebrations but the wide open calendar days, new promises to live healthier; physically, socially, spiritually, and the hope in new beginnings. Hope abounds. In Isaiah 43, The Lord promises to be with us no matter what is going on in our lives or the world around us; God affirms that we are God's beloved children and we are very much loved; then S/He goes on to instructs us to forget the former things and not to dwell on the past as we look to the future, for God will lead us into something new.

I am a dreamer: a visionary, always thinking of something new to do or how to tweak something we already do to make it work so that more people are involved and that it meets more folks needs. There were quite a few on the list, more than twenty folks. At a Deacons meeting, we sought a way to make worship possible for these folks while also bringing folks together for fellowship and maybe ease at making a meal. It was decided that we would try a Wednesday afternoon light meal followed by a worship service. Many folks attend Wednesday morning Bible study and would be here to set up and assist in transportation. We have had a few offers to make the first meals, so we are off to a good start. This January we are going to try something new. On the second and fourth Wednesdays of each month, we are going to have a light meal and fellowship followed by worship which will be held either in Libby Hall or in the prayer room (that will depend on the number of folks participating, their comfort at moving around, and their desire). I am excited. I hope you are also. It is a new way to meet the worship needs of some of our members and possibly reach new folks. We will need extra help and I hope that you will pray about being part of this new ministry. You do not have to participate every week or even every month, but if you could help with a lunch, set up or transportation even once a quarter, it will make a difference for all of us.

I believe that God has given us the church as a place to come together and put some of God's ideas into action. When we all use our gifts we prevent burnout or ineffectiveness, since we have others to come along beside us and help each other. As we join together in doing for others, we develop new or deepen friendships and often find we are filled more than we expected.

I hope you will pray and consider how you can be part of this exciting new ministry. It is open to all so if you know of someone who needs a light meal and community, please invite them, better yet, offer to bring them. Set up and transportation at noon, the meal and fellowship at 12:30PM, followed by worship. God is doing a new thing. I hope you will be part of it.

Well Done! (so far...)



As of this writing, our total pledges-to-date have exceeded last year's at the same time! We currently have received 56 pledges for a total of \$80,112, an amount equal to 25% over last year at this time,

but 9% lower than 2 years ago for the same time span.

We all know last year was a difficult year in many ways, and that was certainly reflected in the pledging by our church family as well as the deficit in our budget. The increase in the pledges-to-date is a hopeful sign that our church can, once again, serve the mission of God with the same verve and gusto as we have in the past!

<u>Missions Moment</u>

We cannot extend our gratitude enough to everyone who helped and bring a little Christmas cheer to the Foster Kids we adopted, as well as to Christina's House. We were able to fulfill the wish lists of 2 Foster Children through Maryanne's Kids. We also welcomed a new outreach into our Missions. For those who have not heard of Christian's, they Provide Transitional Housing for Women and Their Children. Here is an excerpt about what they do:

"Many women and children in the Springfield area go without housing on a daily basis. Children have no place to call home and no place to feel safe. The lives of these little ones are forever changed; their nutrition suffers putting them at risk for health concerns and their psychological health may be damaged. The voices of those little ones called out to us for help.

Christina's House was designed to provide transitional housing for women and their children but more importantly to offer and provide emotional, spiritual, physical support, and education as they transition from homelessness to permanent, stable living environments.

Their Board of Directors is diverse and comprised of a retired Springfield Police Officer, nurses, Licensed Clinical Social Workers, and company presidents. The board facilitates the day to day running of a home large enough to accommodate 4-6 mothers who are homeless (or those at risk of imminent homelessness) and their children. The women who reside in this home are responsible for maintaining the home while working with mentors and volunteers. Cooking, cleaning, shopping, and childcare are shared. An on-site House Mother helps oversee the day-to-day operation of the home and functions as role model in the home. Within the program design, it is anticipated that the families will reside in the home for at least 24 months. In that time, we expect the mothers to obtain the life and job skills needed, which will result in confidence and selfsufficiency. Once the women transition out of Christina's House we will continue to provide long-term support to help ensure continued success."

As a congregation we were able to provide new bedding, kitchen supplies, and many more for these transitioning families. We look forward to working with them throughout the year.

As a missions team, we will be bringing you more information on whom we support as a congregation through the years.

Parish Notes



Laying on of Hands Prayer

Is anyone among you in trouble? Let them pray. Is anyone happy? Let them sing songs of praise. Is anyone among you sick? Let them call the elders of the church to pray over them and anoint them with oil in the name of the Lord. And the prayer offered in faith will make the sick person well; the Lord will raise them up. If they have sinned, they will be forgiven. Therefore confess your sins to each other and pray for each other so that you may be healed. The prayer of a righteous person is powerful and effective. James 5: 13-16

Pastor Pat is trained in Healing Energy (the Holy Spirit) and a student of Healing Touch and Reiki. If you are not feeling well or have those January blahs, come and see Pastor Pat. We will pray for healing. Healing is not the same as curing. Healing is being made whole. The prayer of Healing Energy and Healing Touch opens your inner pathway so that the Holy Spirit (energy) can freely flow through your entire body. If we are blocked by an anger, grief, resentment, jealousy or other trauma, we can block the pathway. When we open up the pathway, the Spirit helps us in our weakness. We do not know what we ought to pray for, but the Spirit himself intercedes for us through wordless groans. Romans 8:26)

Since this is the beginning of the new year, give something new a try. Pastor Pat will be available on Friday mornings: 10:00 AM-noon in January. The praying normally takes half an hour. Call or stop by the office and sign up. I am reminded of the LIFE cereal commercial: *Try it, you just might like it.*

Preaching in January

For the month of January, Pastor Pat will be preaching on **Greater Gifts**, using the UMC worship and discipleship resources as a guide. The season after Epiphany almost always begins with a transitional Sunday—Baptism of the Lord—in which we encounter the narrative of Jesus' baptism and John's very dramatic description of baptism in Jesus' name. The voice of God rings from heaven at Jesus' baptism: "You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased" (Lk. 3:22, NRSV). When we are baptized or gathered at the baptism of others, how do we hear God's voice affirming each new member of God's family? The second week contains Paul's description of spiritual gifts—how the Spirit works in and through them and how we are gifted for being a part of the body of Christ with one another. A little bit of explanation is needed around the theme for week three, "Being Needy": This phrase has a certain negative connotation that often relates to people who require a little more attention than others (we all likely know people like this). We would like to redeem the meaning by asserting that we all, regardless of our own gifts, need one another in order to be part of the whole body of Christ. The purpose of all these gifts is revealed in week four, in which the whole point of acting together is revealed—"having love," which is the most important of the "marks of the new birth" (faith, hope, and love), as shared by both the apostle Paul and John Wesley.

Since this season takes place at the beginning of a new calendar year, it may be a helpful practice for each of us to assess our spiritual gifts. A spiritual gifts inventory that can help each of us in the congregation realize our potential in ministry, and collectively as a church congregation, you can find resources here:

Spotlight On....

Pastor's Membership

Some members of the Federated Community Church congregation have inquired when the new pastor is going to join the church. In the United Methodist Denomination, clergy are members of an Annual Conference, which is a basic body of the United Methodist Church (UMC). For Pastor Pat, (me) I am a member of the New England Annual Conference.

In accepting my call into ministry, I had to be involved in a process which affirmed my call to ministry by members of the UMC and expected to meet the standards set by the UMC in education, training, and provide evidence of productive implementation of call. Clergy are elected into an Annual Conference and ordained by the bishop. Ordination is an act which the Church symbolizes a shared relationship between those ordained for sacramental and functional leadership and the Church community from which the person being ordained has come, but once ordained the clergy is responsible to the UMC doctrines, government and polity.

The Bishop is shepherd over the entire annual conference. The Bishop and his/her Cabinet know the gifts of their clergy and the missional needs of the churches. In UMC, we are appointed by the Bishop and held to standards of and by the larger UMC. The local church has input as to how the church and pastor are doing to meet the needs of the congregation and surrounding community through yearly forms, meetings with the Deacons and Board of Directors, and voice at the yearly church conference; however, we are appointed to the church, not called by them and the clergy cannot retire without approval from the UMC body nor be fired or let go by the local congregation. All of the decisions must be approved by the larger body of ordained UMC members and the Bishop. So, UMC clergy are members of the larger body of UMC and have voice and vote there. In the local church to where clergy are appointed, they have voice but since their membership is with the UMC body, they do not have a vote.

My family can and has become members at various churches where I have been appointed.
