

July 1, 2, 3, and 4<sup>th</sup> are the only days fireworks are allowed.



### SIMPLE STEPS TO PREVENT STORMWATER RUNOFF POLLUTION

Storm water can be damaging to a neighborhood, community and waterways if not managed properly. Effective storm water management reduces the amount of runoff and runoff pollution. Slowing runoff and allowing it to soak in prevents erosion and the passing of dangerous chemicals into waterways. It also keeps the flow of water moving safely and not collecting in roadways which can be hazardous. Residents can help by following these simple steps which can prevent chemicals or sediments into the waterways of our area.

- Sweep grass clippings out of street gutters after mowing. Grass clipping can be pollution to the waterways due to the nitrogen and phosphorous in them. These chemicals added to the waterways cause growth of algae and aquatic weeds that can be harmful.
- Check your car for leaking fluids and recycle your motor oil. Improper disposal of used oil, contributes to storm water pollution. If you have a spill, use sand or kitty litter to soak it up so it can be swept up as a solid material. If you have used motor oil, please be sure to recycle it.
- **Pick up trash and don't litter.** Litter can wash into area creeks and streams through storm drains. Litter is also dangerous to wildlife that mistake it for food or get tangled up in it.
- Pick up after your pet. Pet waste can easily wash into area creeks and streams. This waste can add harmful bacteria to the water and make it unsafe to swim or play in. Pet waste also has nutrients that cause algae to grow which can be harmful to the animals that live in and around the waterways.
- **Don't ever dump anything down ditches or storm drains.** Storm drains are not part of the sanitary sewer system which flows to the wastewater treatment area. Storm drains go directly to local streams, rivers, lakes and wetlands.



Remember clean water coming from sump pumps can go into storm water drains and SHOULD NOT go into the city's waste water system.



### Don't ask for pests in your yard Check for standing water

When mosquito populations are present, citizens can protect themselves and loved ones from being bitten by:

- ✓ Stay indoors at dawn and dusk when mosquitoes are most active
- ✓ Wear long sleeved shirts, socks, and long pants when you must be outdoors.
- ✓ Use an approved insect repellent, and follow the instructions on the product label
- ✓ Talk to your physician or health care provider before applying insect repellants to young children
- ✓ Make sure your window screens fit tightly and are free from holes

Remember the best way to control mosquito populations is to eliminate the standing water sources that the mosquitoes need to reproduce.

### SEVERE WEATHER PLAN

MAKE SURE YOU AND YOUR FAMILY ARE PREPARED.

Make sure you have a good safety kit ready. Recommended supplies for a basic kit are:

- Backpack or storage tub to hold supplies
- Bottled water
- Non-perishable food
- Flashlight with extra batteries
- First Aid supplies
- Tissues and paper towels
- Toilet paper and bags with ties for personal sanitation
- Paper and pen for taking notes
- Sleeping bag or warm blanket, rain gear
- Wrench or pliers
- Personal hygiene items (travel size)
- Whistle to signal for help
- Important documents, cash
- Emergency reference materials
- Battery powered radio
- Formula and diapers (if there is an infant in house)
- Extra pet food
- Mask, plastic sheeting and Duct Tape
- Can opener for food
- Cups and utensils
- Fire extinguisher
- Change of clothes

### Our area Storm Shelters are located:

- 1. Storm shelter on SE corner behind <u>City</u> Hall. 1501 S. Duquesne.
- 2. <u>Celebration Church</u> at SE corner of 13<sup>th</sup> and Duquesne, shelter furthest to the East
- 3. Soaring Heights Elementary School, after school hours, shelter is available to residents within ½ mile radius. The shelter is in the rear of building, look for signs.
