Writing Tips

3. What Should You Do When the Book is Edited?

After it's been poked and prodded during the editing process the next part will also take patience and inner strength. Because the next part involves formatting your book. And, if you want to publish your book in different mediums, such as digital and print, this will involve different formats for each.

You can format your book on your own. It's not easy, but B&N Press (and other self-publishing sites) offer guides to do this depending on your book type.

For eBooks this will include choosing between formatting your book in doc/docx, txt, html, and epub.

For print this will first include choosing a print color, cover format, cover finish, and paper color. If you don't want to format your book on your own and have a budget, there are professional services you can use such as 99designs, which offer professionals to format your book for you.

QUICK GUIDE TO COMMAS

- 1. Use commas to separate independent clauses when they are joined by any of these seven coordinating conjunctions: *and, but, for, or, nor, so, yet.*
- 2. Use commas after introductory a) clauses, b) phrases, or c) words that come before the main clause.
- 3. Use a pair of commas in the middle of a sentence to set off clauses, phrases, and words that are not essential to the meaning of the sentence. Use one comma before to indicate the beginning of the pause and one at the end to indicate the end of the pause.

- 4. Do not use commas to set off essential elements of the sentence, such as clauses beginning with *that* (relative clauses). *That* clauses after nouns are always essential. *That* clauses following a verb expressing mental action are always essential.
- 5. Use commas to separate three or more words, phrases, or clauses written in a series.
- 6. Use commas to separate two or more coordinate adjectives that describe the same noun. Be sure never to add an extra comma between the final adjective and the noun itself or to use commas with non-coordinate adjectives.
- 7. Use a comma near the end of a sentence to separate contrasted coordinate elements or to indicate a distinct pause or shift.
- 8. Use commas to set off phrases at the end of the sentence that refer back to the beginning or middle of the sentence. Such phrases are free modifiers that can be placed anywhere in the sentence without causing confusion.
- 9. Use commas to set off all geographical names, items in dates (except the month and day), addresses (except the street number and name), and titles in names.
- 10. Use a comma to shift between the main discourse and a quotation.
- 11. Use commas wherever necessary to prevent possible confusion or misreading.

Publishing

Traditional Publishing. Why is it so Hard?

This article from "The Book Shelf" has a lot of info on publishing, so I will pick up a few points, and you can read the entire thing here:

- Because publishing is a commercial business
- If they don't believe there is a big enough market actively looking for it, then they will reject it.
- If it would take too much work (read that as "money paying staff") to get it up to scratch, then they will reject it.
- If it's too similar to all of the other books on the market and lacks differentiation, they will reject it.
- If it's too different to everything on the market and there's limited evidence on whether this kind of book will be successful, they will reject.
- And so on.

Editor's note: [No where does it seem that a really 'good' book will be accepted, because of all the reasons above. I think we're missing a lot of really good books.]

The definition of a pseudonym (or nom de plume in French) is a fake name used by a writer when writing and publishing their work in order to protect themselves or increase the chance of success.
