

Our first homestay was in Napier. I had been there before when we took travel vans to see the North Island of NZ after an exchange in Australia. We liked the Napier area and I was glad for a chance to go back and see the places that you only find when traveling with locals.

I traveled with my sister, Martha, from The Villages Club in Florida and our home hosts were Bob and Heather whose home was in Havelock North, a community south of Napier on the flanks of **Te Mata peak.**

It was a lovely location and we had daily visits from several local birds to the birdbath. One of my favorites was the Tui that looked like he had cotton balls at his neck.







One day we took a walk to the neighborhood park that Bob helped with maintenance and it was created from an old trash dump along a small creek at the back of the subdivision. They had created trails, added benches and cleaned up the trash to create an oasis. At the top of the park there used to be an old pottery factory and some spots, where the bank was eroding, there were pot shards.

We also visited the National Aquarium of New

Zealand and got to see the feeding of the little blue penguins. It was quite the place and decorated outside with huge murals.



Guy Fawks Day, we had a cookout on the beach and set off fireworks.





The week was full of activities, including a sightseeing tour of **Napier** which had been destroyed by an earthquake and fires and was rebuilt in Art Deco style.



We also took a tour of the area later in Vintage cars, ending at a rural restaurant where we

enjoyed the food.




One day, we visited a goat farm where they milked the goats to sell the milk. The goats lived inside all the time and were milked on a rotating platform that they entered, were hooked up to the milk machine and by the time they got back to the beginning, they were finished



and offloaded back to the sheds they lived in. I

tried the milk and it was quite good.

Then we went to my favorite spot, **Cape Kidnapper's**, where a large population of Gannets (seabirds) nest and raise their chicks until they a large enough to fly to Australia's coast to spend their years until they are old enough to mate and come back to the nesting area. The courtship dances were amazing, with a lot of necks reaching up and head shaking.



Napier had a lovely park with gardens and



one of my favorites was the rose garden.



Our farewell was at a local winery and we had winetasting with food.




I never tasted that many wines before and

That evening we went to a school program where the children performed many Maori songs. Each school has its own cultural costume.



Invercargill had a great Queen's Park that we visited several times. The flowers were beautiful and they had an enclosure with Tuataras (and ancient species of Lizard.

They also had a sports building with all sorts of courts indoors and a cycling circle. They paid for this place with a sales tax on alcohol.







The next day we went on to Southland at the bottom of the South Island – next stop south would be Antarctica. We stayed at the Les Gibbs house in Riverton which was a drive from the main town of Invercargill. Les had a boat that he would sail to Stewart Island in the summer which was just south of Riverton. We traveled all over Southland, particularly visiting numerous beaches and going on short

hikes. One of the most interesting places we went was a historic **Flax Mill.** It is sort of a working museum where they show how flax was grown and harvested. It was a major agricultural product for many years, often made into ropes.





We visited a number of museums and toured the countryside including a visit to **Anderson Park** which had lovely gardens and ducks, with their babies on the lawn.

We went to a local Riverton restaurant that look out over the inlet and the tide was out and huge mudflats appeared. At other times, it looked like a major waterway.

After the exchange was formally over, some of us rented a car and drove around much of the South Island and visited some beautiful spots in the **"Southern Alps"** and the west coast, including **Fijordland.** We also spent a few days with the Friendship Force club in Blenheim before driving to Christchurch and our flight home.




