Membership Report 2020

As of December 31, 2019, GFWC of Kansas had 30 active Clubs throughout the State and 442 members.

During 2019, we added 21 new members. We did not add any new Clubs in 2019. The Mae Wenger Membership Award for 2019 is awarded to the GFWC Brewster Beta Club. They added 3 new members for a 27% increase in membership putting their total Club membership at eleven. The GFWC Goddard Women's Club also added 3 new members for a 15% increase in 2019 (23 members); and GFWC Sedgwick Amitie added 2 new members for a 14% increase (14 members).

We are very proud of all GFWC Clubs in Kansas who maintained their existing membership numbers and a big hooray to those who added new members!

Treasurer

In the June issue of *Kansas Clubwoman News*, a lot of people usually write articles about the GFWC of Kansas Convention that we just attended. Unfortunately, that is not the case this year. I really missed that annual gathering, and I hope we ALL can attend the State Board Meeting in Hutchinson in August.

The month of April starts a new fiscal year for GFWC of KS. Fiscal year 2019-2020 began on April 1, 2019, with a total cash balance of \$46,511.56, and ended on March 31, 2020, with an unaudited balance of \$41,908.72. Our annual expenses continue to exceed the income received. The Executive Committee is diligently studying ways to cut

expenses, and looking for ideas to increase income, but the current economic crisis is making that difficult. That issue was made apparent today when I renewed a certificate of deposit that had matured. Because of the COVID-19 pandemic, interest rates have fallen drastically. The \$25,000 C. D. that had been paying interest at a rate of 2.40% for the past two years will now be paying 0.80% for the next two years. That calculates as a net loss of \$400.00 in annual interest received!

Stay well, everyone, and have a great summer, even if we have to add face masks to our summer wardrobe!

GFWC of Kansas Chairman Reports

Libraries and Literacy

Our Kansas Clubwomen are working so hard in their communities supporting their local libraries and literacy! There are so many worthy projects, it is hard to pick just a few. Highlighted here are just the projects that were reported in 2019 that supported International President Mary Ellen Brock's Grand Initiative—to celebrate Dr. Seuss Birthday by participating in Read Across America Week. This One, of her Seven Grand Initiatives challenged clubs to donate Dr. Seuss books and encourage reading. Here are amazing things done by our clubs!

A special guest, The Cat in the Hat, visited a GFWC Junction City Ladies Reading Club meeting to guard the 25 Dr. Seuss book brought to the meeting by members. The club then donated the books to their local library.

GFWC Wamego Ad Astra Club received a \$200 GFWC literacy grant and purchased 38 Dr. Seuss books. Members labeled and distributed the books and assisted with activities at Read Across America Day where over 200 books were distributed.

GFWC Towanda Nokomis Club donated \$25 and one Dr. Seuss book to Towanda library. Members supplied books that GFWC Wichita Women's Club donated. GFWC Goddard Women's Club had a Dr. Seuss theme for story time at the local library which included crafts, activities, snacks and each student attending received a Dr. Seuss book to take home.

GFWC Hutchinson Questers members dressed in a Cat in the Hat costume and read Dr. Seuss books at 5 preschool sessions (total audience of 129) across town and donated 2 books and Dr. Seuss themed flash cards.

Conservation

Ladies, I am sure we all are doing everything we can to be safe in this COVID-19 world. I am sure many of you have made masks to wear and many of you may be wearing gloves. I want to share some things from the U.S. Centers for Disease Control regarding gloves. Did you know that there is a right way to remove them to protect yourself and your home from contamination?

Here are the steps for the correct glove removal:

 Grasp the outside of one of the gloves at the wrist. Do not touch with your bare skin.
Peel glove away from your body, peeling it inside out.

3. Hold the glove you've just removed in your gloved hand.

4. Peel off the second glove by sliding your "glove free" fingers inside the glove at the wrist.

5. Turn the second glove inside out while pulling it away from your body, leaving the first glove inside the second.

6. Dispose of the gloves safely. If you have worn them out to a store it is best to keep a small plastic bag in your vehicle to place the gloves into. Use hand sanitizer or wipes after removal to clean hands. If you are at home they can be put into the trash. Be sure to Wash hands if at home.

Please do NOT throw them down on the ground or leave in carts!

Gloves are NOT to be used time and time again. In fact, the CDC suggest that our best defense to fighting the Coronavirus or ANY virus is good old hand washing!

Hopefully you know that our hands need to be washed with Running water and soap for a minimum of 20 seconds. Lather hands with soap by rubbing the palms together to start. Then lather the back of hands, in between your fingers and under your nails. I have found that by singing either the ABC's or the song Happy Birthday I will have washed them for more than that. Be sure to rinse and dry those hands well. We need to keep recycling but Gloves are NOT one of those things!! Thank you ladies and hang in there.

International Outreach - Heifer

At State Board Meeting clubs were asked to put Heifer International on their calendars and in their program books, and report back to me. Almost all clubs did report something they did. But these four clubs were outstanding.

GFWC Goddard Women's Club in Goddard, KS. Donated \$25 to Heifer International and ONE member donated \$250 to Heifer International and purchased honey bees and a sheep. And two members donated \$40 to Heifer International during the State Board Meeting. \$315 - 22 MEMBERS

GFWC Questers in Hutchinson, KS. passed around a "honey pot" for collection each month. All members generously participated. Three gifts of honey bees were purchased by the club through Heifer International. \$90.30 - 13 MEMBERS

The Junction City Reading Club has a milk bottle in a prominent place during meetings so they could make a \$25 donation to Heifer International. \$25 - 51 MEMBERS

GFWC Gardner Athena collected spare change during meetings and purchased one pig and one sheep for Heifer International, at \$120 each. \$240 - 14 MEMBERS

And statewide, we collected almost \$1000. So I am very happy with the results of the last 2 years from you wonderful women as I leave this Chairmanship. I hope you continue to help your chairmen as you have helped me. To win awards at state for both years made me very proud of you all. And who knows, maybe we won again. Women's History Resource Center

As State Chair, at State Convention and newsletter articles I have emphasized the importance of clubs recording and preserving their clubs' activities. I have highlighted below two of the five GFWC of Kansas clubs who submitted WHRC reports for 2019.

GFWC Junction City Ladies Reading Club: With a history that dates back to 1875, our club is the oldest Federated Club in Kansas. It is the only club with a Private Club House that was donated to the organization and used exclusively for their purpose. We continue to maintain and improve the building and preserve the memories that we are creating. We have an impressive collection of scrapbooks highlighting our history. We have a monthly newsletter that continues to keep present members current with the month to month activities and share joys and sometimes problems.

To celebrate the passage of the 19th amendment, at each meeting we are reviewing a book about various women who fought so hard for our right to vote. We have a poster in the House to remind us not to take

this right for granted and exercise our vote at every election. Members of our organization work at the voting locations as well as counting ballots.
