We are so thankful to have been awarded a grant with the 2022 Urban and Community Forestry Program through the Delaware Forest Service.

Davey Tree Expert Company has done significant tree work: removing dead trees, grinding stumps, pruning to remove hazards, and planting four new trees on the Northwest side of Market Street.

After careful consideration members of the Arboretum & Landscape committee selected four new trees and Davey Tree professionals planted them in empty spots or where older trees had died. They are an **American Beech** (*Fagus grandiflora*), a **White Oak** (*Quercus alba*), a **Ginkgo**, (*Gingko biloba*), and a **Black Gum** (aka sour gum, tupelo, black tupelo, pepperidge, Nyssa; scientific name *Nyssa sylvatica*). Each one has its own special character and appeal although only one of them, perhaps the least familiar, has six common names. Whatever you choose to call it, it is a special tree, with glossy leaves in the summer, tiny fruit that birds love, beautiful fall color, and twisty branches visible in the winter. Davey Tree graciously volunteered to water the new trees this summer since they planted them a little late. Come visit them and pay your respects when you have a chance.



By the end of May over 200 volunteer hours had been logged working on the landscape and arboretum and we are still at it!

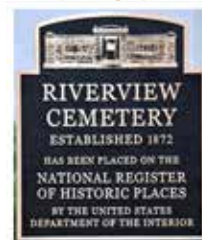


The Man behind the Plan

Riverview Cemetery has its origin in 1872 and was developed in two sections, each with a distinct landscape design. **Hermann J. Schwarzmann** (1846-1891) was a prominent 19th century landscape architect who designed the Southeast side in a formal grid plan. Riverview Cemetery is the only known example of his work in Delaware. Some evidence of planned plantings remain. On the SE side of the cemetery, Norway Maple, Spruce, Weeping Birches, Kulmar-nock Weeping Willow trees were planted in 1873 lining Main Avenue.

Riverview Cemetery, located at Thirty Third and Market Streets in Wilmington Delaware was placed on the National Register of Historic Places by the United State Department of the Interior on July 3, 2012. Riverview, founded in July 1872, met certain "special criteria considerations" and became the first cemetery in Delaware to qualify on its own merit.

Over the next two years, National Wildlife Federation (NWF), Delaware Interfaith Power & Light (DelIPL), Delaware Nature Society (DNS), and Delaware Center for Horticulture (DCH), will assist 20 congregations in Wilmington in becoming NWF designated Sacred Grounds sites. Riverview Cemetery has been invited to participate as a Sacred Ground site. The **Orientation Workshop** will take place in the Riverview Cemetery Visitor Center at the end of July.

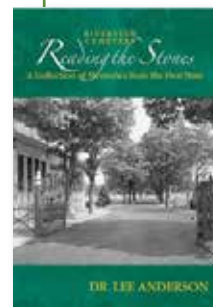
BURIALS: The Board of Directors assisted with 3 burials.
