Well we met at the Riverdale10 movie theater in Little Rock to see the movie about Hugh Glass's trek through the wilderness after being deserted by his trapping partners and left for dead after he was mauled by a grizzly bear.

I was extremely impressed by the photography which was simply breath-taking, to say the least, and I have a new respect for DiCaprio for the part he played. A GREAT movie, though it didn't stick "strictly" with what is known about Glass's experience. It was pretty close and the costuming and the articles of trade, scenes inside the fort, and the casting was pretty close to what we can imagine things looked like back then.

Glenn Cook, Jimmy Worten, Tim Richardson, David Howlett, Keith Cook, Andrew Hooper, James Thompson, and I watched the movie after Keith Armburst left because of his work schedule, and Ed Williams left before the movie started as he had already seen it.

We passed out fliers for EARA to the public, though the movie was not well attended on a Sunday night in a small venue, we did get some interest in EARA from some of the folks. We also had Mayor Mark Stoddala come by though to say hello and find out why we were dressed so funny! It was a great experience and we had a great time, as we always do when EARA members get together.

If you haven't seen this movie, I highly recommend that you do go see it, and hey, dress out in your pre-1840 duds, if nothing else, you will get some strange looks from the other people attending, and you can tell them you are with EARA. Tim Richardson had even printed up business cards for EARA to go along with the fliers Keith and Gwen printed up.
