## Connellsville City Council MINUTES JULY 5, 2018

This special meeting of the Connellsville City Council was held this evening at 5:00 PM at City Hall, Connellsville, PA. Attending this meeting was Mayor Lincoln, Council members Keedy, Karpiak, Tzan and Topper. Also attending was City Clerk Ohler and Solicitor Witt.

Order of business was called by Mayor Greg Lincoln.

Mayor Greg Lincoln and members of City Council discussed the transfer of restaurant liquor license into the City of Connellsville.

After discussion, the following action took place:

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Mayor Greg Lincoln moved adoption of Resolution No. 7-1-2018 which was seconded by Councilman Ethan Keedy:

## ORDINANCE/RESOLUTION NO. 7-1-2018

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF CONNELLSVILLE, FAYETTE COUNTY, PENNSYLVANIA, APPROVING THE TRANSFER OF RESTAURANT LIQUOR LICENSE NO. R-12713 INTO THE CITY OF CONNELLSVILLE FROM DUNBAR BOROUGH, FAYETTE COUNTY, PENNSYLVANIA.

.WHEREAS, Act 141 of 2000 ("the Act") authorizes the Pennsylvania Liquor Control Board to approve, in certain instances, the transfer of liquor licenses across municipal boundaries within the same county regardless of the quota limitations provided for in Section 461 of the Liquor Code if, as in the City of Connellsville, sales of liquor and malt or brewed beverages are legal in the municipality receiving the license;

WHEREAS, the Act requires the applicant to obtain from the receiving municipality a resolution approving the intermunicipal transfer of the liquor license prior to an applicant's submission of an application to the Pennsylvania Liquor Control Board;

WHEREAS, the Liquor Code stipulates that, prior to adoption of a resolution by the receiving municipality, at least one public hearing be held for the purpose of permitting individuals residing within the municipality to make comments and recommendations regarding applicant's intent to transfer a liquor license into the receiving municipality; and

WHEREAS, an application for transfer filed under the Act must contain a copy of the resolution adopted by the municipality approving the transfer of a liquor license into the municipality.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that Bud Murphy Enterprises, Inc., has requested the approval of the City of Connellsville for the proposed transfer of Pennsylvania Liquor License No. R-12713 from 15 Woodvale Street, Dunbar Borough, Fayette County, Pennsylvania, 15431, to facilities within the City of Connellsville to be located at 701 North Pittsburgh Street, Connellsville, Fayette County, Pennsylvania, 15425, with the understanding that said transfer must be approved at a later date by the Pennsylvania Liquor Control Board; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the City of Connellsville has held a properly advertised public hearing pursuant to the notice provisions of Section 102 of the Liquor Code to receive comments on the proposed liquor license transfer; and BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the City of Connellsville approves, by adoption of this Resolution, the proposed intermunicipal transfer of Liquor License No. R-12713 into the City of Connellsville by Bud Murphy Enterprises, Inc.; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that transfers, designations and assignments of licenses hereunder are subject to approval by the Pennsylvania Liquor Control Board.

DULY adopted this 5th day of Tuly, 2018, by the City of Connellsville, Fayette County, Pennsylvania, in lawful session duly assembled.

A vote upon the adoption of the resolution resulted as follows:
