Romans 3:19-28

¹⁹Now we know that whatever the law says it speaks to those who are under the law, so that every mouth may be stopped, and the whole world may be held accountable to God. ²⁰For by works of the law no human being^[6] will be justified in his sight, since through the law comes knowledge of sin.

²¹ But now the righteousness of God has been manifested apart from the law, although the Law and the Prophets bear witness to it— ²² the righteousness of God through faith in Jesus Christ for all who believe. For there is no distinction: ²³ for all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God, ²⁴ and are justified by his grace as a gift, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus, ²⁵ whom God put forward as a propitiation by his blood, to be received by faith. This was to show God's righteousness, because in his divine forbearance he had passed over former sins. ²⁶ It was to show his righteousness at the present time, so that he might be just and the justifier of the one who has faith in Jesus.

²⁷Then what becomes of our boasting? It is excluded. By what kind of law? By a law of works? No, but by the law of faith. ²⁸For we hold that one is justified by faith apart from works of the law.

Reformation Sunday October 25, 2020

Message: How Do We Hear It?

"If you continue in my word, you are truly my disciples; 8.32 and you will know the truth, and the truth will make you free."

How do you hear that? What do you hear? Law, or gospel? Is Jesus warning, threatening us, or is he giving us a promise? Because, in reality, when Jesus said, "If you continue in my word, you are truly my disciples," he was also in effect saying, "If you do not continue in my word, then you are truly not my disciples."

So, what do you hear?

Let's try the same story a slightly different way...

There once was a Dad that said to his children, "If you eat the meals I present you, you'll be truly healthy; and you'll have energy and energy will make you strong."

One of the children listened and realized what a wonderful gift Dad was giving them. There would always be food for them – they wouldn't have to go looking for it.

The food would be nutritious and healthy. They would never need to worry that it might be just junk food, or that it would actually be something that was intended for the dog or cat.

They heard the words of the Dad as a word of reassurance, of promise; something they could depend on.

And with that promise ringing in their ears, they eagerly looked forward to every meal. They anticipated with excitement the plate that would be presented to them at their next meal. What has Dad prepared this time? Would it be one of their favorites? Would it be familiar flavors on their tongue or would it be something new, different – maybe a little on the wild, exotic side? And they could hardly wait to get to the table!

Years later, looking back they realized that not everything had been to their liking. Some things had a taste that was a bit bitter, some puckered their mouths up, some was so spicy it made their eyes water. But Dad's promise had come true! They had indeed, grown up healthy! They thrived; they had energy, and that energy had enabled them to do all sorts of things.

And they thanked their Dad every day for his promise and his provision.

But the other child, hearing the same words, reacted very differently. Instead of gift and promise, they heard from their Father words of restriction, warning and impending punishment! "What if we don't eat? What then? What are you going to do about it? Force feed us? Stuff that nasty tasting stuff down our throats?"

"No, said Dad. "But if you don't eat, you won't be healthy. If you refuse to go without food long enough, you will become sick. You won't have energy to ward off disease; your imune system will be compromised. If you presist, eventually you will die. Please, come to the table!"

But the children still rebelled. "You don't really love us! You don't give us what we want! We know of other foods – Twinkies and Ho-Ho's, candy bars and sodas. That's the kind of food we want. What do you mean we'll become sick? We see other children eating those and we want them, too! We haven't been sick a day! Those kids have lots of energy!"

"No," said Dad. "I know you – I know what your bodies require. I know about your food alergies and vitamin defficiencies. I will give you what you really need. Please, come to the table!"

But the childrens refused. And so it was that some of the children wandered away from the table in search of things more to their liking. And in time, some grew thin and malnurished. They came down with colds, fevers and the flu. And, in spite of the Father's warning, some ultimately starved to death, for everything he told them was true.

And the Father wept over their graves.

Jesus said, "If you continue in my Word, you are truly my disciples."

How do we hear that? Do we hear it as the promise that discipleship, belonging to the Lord of the universe is ours for as long we want it? Or do we hear it differently? Do we at once begin to suspiciously ask, "Yeah? Well, what if I don't continue in your word? What do you mean, 'continue'? Are you saying coming to church a couple times a month isn't good enough for you? Suppose I don't do that...What then? Are you saying I'm no longer a disciple? Is that it? Are you saying you are going to kick me out?"

Jesus said, "And you will know the truth and the truth will make you free!"

How do we hear that? Do we hear the promise that true release from all that binds our souls, freedom, is winging its way to us in the truth, in Word and Sacrament? Or do we at once begin to suspiciously ask, "Yeah? Well, what is truth, anyway? What if I don't believe it's true – what then?"

Jesus said, "If you commit sin, you are in bondage to sin." How we you hear that? Do we hang your head in repentance and confess that you are indeed in bondage to sin and cannot free yourself? Or do we at once begin to suspiciously ask, "Yeah? Well, what are you calling sin? I don't think what I'm doing is such a big deal! I mean, it's not like I'm out killing people and robbing banks! What are you saying? What are you going to do? Throw me in chains? Tie me up? Make me some kind of slave?"

And what happens when we discover that everything Jesus said, regardless of how we heard them, warning or promise, both law or gospel, both were true all along?

We are in bondage, but if the Son of God frees us with his truth, we are free indeed.
