The site also displayed some unexpected beauty. The "Ressurection Moss" was in its glory and it covered a good portion of the lave ridge surrounding the glyphs.

Meeting Report

The May lecture was by Samaria Hall of Big Horn Archaeology Consultants.

Samira talked about her work in Toquerville doing survey work in preparation for the construction of the Ash Creek pipeline and the Chief Toquer reservoir. Her work involved both historic and prehistoric sites.

Her work with the historic sites allowed her to gather the history of Toquerville from both historic documents and oral history from area residents.

She worked various Southern Paiute representatives when surveying the prehistoric sites. She discussed various artifacts found and gave her view of the purpose of the prehistoric sites.

She also showed images of the rock art in the area of the construction project. While not in danger from the reservoir, the rock art is very near to a proposed construction road that will be used to transport lave rock to the reservoir construction area that could damage the rock art.
