UNDER CONSTRUCTION THEME: We are working, building and making improvements together.

**Preschool:** We have adjusted nicely to our routine. We had so much fun learning about apples last week. We painted apples on an apple tree, colored and drew apples. Then, we ate apples. This week we will talk about the letter "A". We will learn to write it and what sound it makes. We will begin working in our handwriting book and begin learning how to write! Please encourage your child to start all letters at the top and write left to right. We will learn the proper way to hold our pencils too! Have a great week! - **Miss Stacie** 

**Kind:** This week's theme is Apples. We will discuss nonfiction books, how we can tell that it is nonfiction, and what would happen if apples did not have seeds. Our vocabulary words this week are bloom, ripe, thud, dribble, and rot. We will talk about what these words mean all week. During phonics this week we will focus on rhyming words, reviewing sounds /a/, /s/, /t/, and introducing /i/ and /p/. It is important to talk about these sounds and letters at home. During your nightly reading this week, try to point out different words that rhyme. You can also give your child two different words in the car or at the dinner table, and ask them if they rhyme or not. If they seem to catch on to this quickly, give them one word and ask them to come up with a rhyming word. I hope everyone has a great week! **-Mrs. Stewart** 

**1st/2nd:** This week in 1st grade we will talk about friendship and read the story <u>Matthew and Tilly</u> by Rebecca Jones. We will talk about asking questions as we are reading and making connections with the story. We will also work on describing characters, setting, and the main idea again. We are working on reading words we recognize and learning different ways to decode a word we are not familiar with. In math we will work on writing numbers 11-20 and talk about shapes and their sides. This week in 2nd grade we will read the story <u>When I Was Young in the Mountains</u> by Cynthia Rylant. We will discuss what the setting is and learn all about nouns! I encourage you to ask your child what a noun is

throughout the week (at home, in the car, at the grocery store, etc.) In math we will continue working on greater than and less than but will also be adding time to our daily math activities. I encourage you to read when you can with your child or listen to them read and ask them about it! This helps with comprehension. Have a great week! - Mrs. Thomas

**5th/6th:** 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> graders will be making cell models tomorrow. Thank you, parents, for sending in supplies so we could do this! This is Constitution week, so both grades will be looking at the U.S. Constitution and doing some activities

to learn more about it. In English, both grades will be reviewing simple subjects and predicates. In Reading, 5th grade v	will
look at making inferences and 6th grade will compare and contrast different texts. In Science, both grades will be	
reviewing this week and will take their first test next week. In Social Studies, 5th grade will read about pilgrims and the	e
first Thanksgiving and 6th grade will finish Ch. 1 and get ready to test next week. 7th/8th Grade Comm. Arts: Students	
will be starting new chapters about character and point of view. They will also be brainstorming for their Patriot's Pen

5/6 Math: In fifth grade, students are learning how to recognize patterns in story problems, looking at data displays, and practicing their skills in all four operations. In sixth grade, students are also practicing recognizing patterns in story problems, reviewing rounding and estimating, and taking an early look at negative numbers. Tests This Week: 5th Math Thursday 7/8: In science, seventh grade is continuing their unit on matter. Eighth grade students will continue their unit on electricity and magnetism. This week, in social studies, I'm planning on having the students work on a web search in observation of the upcoming Constitution Day.
