She wanted to be a psychologist and work with children in that field. After volunteering at Al Ihsan for two years, she decided to apply for a teaching position.

"As a new teacher, I remember laughing, crying, and working harder than I ever thought I could," said Ms. Saeda.

Ms. Saeda believes the most challenging grade level to teach is any grade in elementary, "You need to teach them new skills, and set a foundation for them." Cleveland, OH- On Nov. 7th, the General Elections will be held at polls all across the state.
