

St. Augustine Shores Service Corporation April 13th Board Meeting Summary

"This Summary is a brief overview by the Observer Editor and is not the complete meeting minutes. Minutes are to be approved and posted at the Riverview Club and Association Website.

The St. Augustine Shores Service Corporation's Board of Directors meeting was called to order by President James O'Such at 7:00 P.M. Present: Treasurer Claire Lorbeer, Director Philip Van Tiem, Vice President Austin Dietly, Director William Ney and Secretary Sue Chitwood. Quorum Established. Absent: Director Winston Burrell.

The Invocation was given by General Manager Smith followed by the Pledge of Allegiance.

Approval of the Minutes – March 9, 2017.

Motion: Director Van Tiem made a motion to accept the minutes as presented.

Seconded By Treasurer Lorbeer. Unanimous. The motion carried.

Treasurers Report – Read by Treasurer Lorbeer accepted for audit. General Manager Smith explained the decrease in the operating fund and the increase in the reserve fund.

Managers' Report - Joseph H. Smith III

Discussion on Proposed Deed Restriction Amendment to Raise Cap Fee.

President O'Such explained that the request to raise the cap to \$50 at a maximum of 5% per year was initiated because we are currently at the maximum assessment cap of \$30. Hurricane Matthew forced us to exceed our budget in debris removal and asset replacement and prudent planning would allow for future unexpected disaster damage.

The Board will not raise the amount of assessments annually unless the need arises. The alternative is special assessments or using reserved funds scheduled for future asset replacement. General Manager Smith provided details of the excess expenses related to the storm and details of rising costs to operate the business.

Progress on Board Goals

Curb Appeal - We have applied fertilizer to the medians and the shrubs. We are mulching the landscaped areas around the Riverview Facility. We worked with the Developer on the landscaping at the entrance to San Savino installing stone walls and some Florida friendly landscape.

Safety and Security - General Manager Smith presented 3 bids to pour a cap over the shuffleboard courts at Aragon Park to provide a safe court for the children to play basketball. Smith explained that there are funds budgeted in the reserve study for concrete/asphalt repair scheduled to be expensed in 2019 - 2020 and again in 2023 and 2024. There are 3 sections of concrete that need to be repaired at Viscaya Boulevard and the ditch that runs to Holiday Lake and 3 sections of sidewalk behind the lots on Deltona Boulevard across from the Church. This would require an additional \$3065. Board Discussion. Motion: Secretary Chitwood made a motion that we award the project to DN Concrete. Seconded by Director Van Tiem. Lou Tracy commented on the sidewalks around the lakes. Smith offered to walk the sidewalks with Tracy. Unanimous. The motion carried. 

Vikings Receive All-Conference Honors

Seven Viking student-athletes have been named to the 2017 All Mid-Florida Conference team for softball. Sophomore Sydney Shows was an All Mid-Florida Conference first team selection. Sophomore Kayla Kight and freshmen Selena Bezares and Brittany Lewis were selected for the All Mid-Florida Conference second team. Sophomore Christiana Marasa and freshmen Taylor Nilsson and Madison Roeshink were All Mid-Florida Conference honorable mention selections.

An honorable mention selection for last year's All Mid-Florida Conference team, Sydney Shows returns as a first team selection this year. The sophomore from Lafayette High School played a huge part in the Viking offense, batting .421 for the season with 45 runs, 15 doubles, three triples, three home runs and 32 runs batted in (RBIs), as well as 5 stolen bases. Defensively, Shows had a .931 fielding percentage for the season, committing only 16 errors in the 232 plays in which she was involved.

Sophomore Kayla Kight, freshmen Selena Bezares, and Brittany Lewis earned All Mid-Florida Conference second team honors this year. Kight was also a strong force in the Viking lineup this season, batting .399 with 27 runs on 63 hits, including 15 doubles, three triples, two home runs, 33 RBIs and a stolen base. The infielder and Creekside High School alumnus had an impressive .940 fielding percentage, committing only 10 errors out of 168 chances. Kight was also a member of last year's All Mid-Florida Conference honorable mention team. Her .327 batting average does not accurately reflect Selena Bezares' solid performance for the Vikings this season in which she produced 25 runs and 41 RBIs from her 49 hits, which included five doubles and 11 home runs. Defensively, the freshman infielder from Plant City boasts a .943 fielding percentage, committing only nine errors out of 157 chances this season.

Viking catcher Brittany Lewis was also consistent at the plate this season, batting .340 with 10 runs scored on 34 hits, including two doubles, 12 RBIs and five stolen bases. The Gainesville High School graduate was an anchor behind the plate, committing only one error out of 154 chances for an impressive .994 fielding percentage.

Christiana Marasa was also a member of last year's All Mid-Florida Conference honorable mention team. The sophomore pitcher from Palm City, Florida, earned honorable mention honors again this season, batting .323 for the Vikings with 33 runs on 60 hits, including six doubles, a triple, two home runs, 24 RBIs and eight stolen bases. On the mound, Marasa was 10-10 for the season, including a shutout against Miami-Dade College, and averaged 1.54 strikeouts per game. In addition, she boasts a .986 fielding percentage, committing only three errors out of 215 plays in which she was involved. Marasa has received a scholarship offer from Franklin Pierce University in New Hampshire.

Freshmen Taylor Nilsson and Madison Roeshink also earned a spot on the All Mid-Florida Conference honorable mention team for their contributions this season. Outfielder Taylor Nilsson, a graduate of Buchholz High School in Gainesville, played in 56 of the Vikings' 57 games this season. Nilsson batted .297 for the season, with 21 runs scored on 38 hits, including four doubles, 16 RBIs and three stolen bases. Defensively, she had a .930 fielding percentage, committing only seven errors in 100 chances. Viking pitcher and outfielder Madison Roeshink was 13-13 on the mound this season, with one save and two shutouts. The DeBary native averaged 3.26 strikeouts per game and committed no errors in the 102 plays in which she was involved.

The Viking softball team ended its 2017 season at 27-30 and 7-17 in conference play. SJR State athletics consist of women's volleyball, women's fastpitch softball, and men's baseball and are based on the Palatka campus. Wild Flower Meadow Group

In the meadow is a tiny vine which, left to its own, entangles other plants and keeps many wildflowers from blooming. As I work these days, I pull out those little vines but have to keep pulling out the grasses too. The vines use them as pathways to the flowers. But! Not all grasses threaten wildflowers and we have to be careful which kind we remove. It's not enough to plant

seeds and transplant flowers; we have to keep the negative influences at bay. In gardens people call that weeding; in the wildflower meadow we call it "grassing" and now "vineing".

Early this spring we lost a long-time member of our group. Declining health made it impossible for her to come to the meadow the last couple of years, but she remained interested and donated some her plants. When pulling out grasses began to overwhelm us, she would remind us, "A wildflower meadow is a field of grasses sprinkled with flowers." Oh so true. Thank you, Muriel McKinlay.

This spring the meadow didn't have its usual profusion of spiderwort, fleabane, or field sorrel. I'm guessing it's because of the draught, but the many clumps of coreopsis we found after Hurricane Matthew are blooming. So are the Mimosa strigillosa (powder puff). There are some spiderwort, southern bee blossom, and ground cherry. There are a few gaillardia, scorpion tail, fleabane, field sorrel, painted leaf, prickly pearly false dandelion, and Spanish needle. There are several wild petunias, a fire bush, honeysuckle vine, coral bean, and one butterfly weed. Thanks to Terry Stockmeier for his photos of the Spanish Needle, Mimosa strigillosa, and fleabane.

We occasionally visit state and county parks and welcome newcomers, even if you want to come only on the outings. Later this month we're going to visit Haw Creek Park. Our group meets the first Saturday of each month at 8:30 by the Riverview Club House. Our goal is to preserve the wildflower meadow, learn about native plants, and those that grow in this location. We're an informal group without officers or dues and hope you will join us. Call Claire at 904-826-5366 for more information.

It is that time of year again and starting the first of June until the end of July, I will be in Maine. I will continue to write this column and can return cell calls and emails. Since the cell signal depends on which way the wind is blowing, I will probably have to return your call when I go to town; so please leave a message.

Stay safe; do NOT talk with anyone who calls says your computer has trouble or follow any directions from a popup on your computer telling you to call a number, and certainly do NOT start following any directions that ends up with any stranger taking control over your computer. Remember also banks do NOT send you emails and have you click on a link to fix your account (just ask them in person).

A virus is not the only threat to you and your computer. Good old-fashion street smarts can help you avoid troubles; but a street education can be a costly one. Here is some terminology that may help, later we will go into some of these and learn how to recognize and avoid the danger:

A virus is a piece of software that can replicate itself and infect a computer without the permission or knowledge of

the user.

SPAM is electronic junk email. Spoofing is an attack in which a person or program masquerades as another.

Spyware is software that is secretly installed on a computer without the user's consent. It monitors user activity or interferes with user control over a personal computer.


A keylogger is a software program that is installed on a computer, often by a Trojan horse or virus. Keyloggers capture and record user keystrokes. The data captured is then transmitted to a remote computer.


Adware is software which automatically plays, displays, or downloads advertisements to a computer.

A computer worm is a self-replicating, malicious software program. It uses a network to send copies of itself to other computers on the network.

A Trojan horse or Trojan is a piece of software which – like the Trojan Horse of Greek mythology – conceals a payload (often malicious) while appearing to perform a legitimate action. Trojan horses often install "backdoor programs" which allow hackers a secret way into a computer system.



In the Law Vacation Rental Regulations: Clear as Mud

Ask a St. Augustine resident what a vacation rental is and you'll get a variety of answers, one of which may be "nuisance." Transient rentals are units which are rented more than three times in a calendar year for a period of less than 30 days. But there is nothing transient about vacation rentals. A search in St. Augustine on Airbnb or VRBO reveals that the industry is alive and well.

While neighbors raise arguments on either side of the fence either for or against vacation rentals, Section 509.032(7) of the Florida Statutes states that local governments cannot prohibit the operation, nor regulate the duration or frequency, of rentals. And if the most recent bills to address short term rentals are any indication, change is not on the horizon.

The latest Attorney General Opinion to address the issue came last October when a Ft. Lauderdale community sought to implement distance separation requirements and limit the number of vacation rentals in neighborhoods. In Opinion AHGO 2016-12, Attorney General Pam Bondi answered with a resounding, "no."

So if you operate short term rentals in St. Augustine, are you in the clear? Not quite. The statute does not apply to regulations adopted prior to June 1, 2011. The City of St. Augustine's short-term rental ordinance, Ordinance 2010-24, was adopted in 2010 and prohibits "large gatherings" of 20 or more people in the RS-1 and RS-2 zoning districts.

The ordinance refers to rentals "for periods of one week or more." Some interpret this as requiring that rental durations are for at least seven days, but no such requirement appears in the text. In fact, it defines a short-term rental as "a one or two family dwelling unit which is rented more than four times in any calendar year," with no restriction on duration. Furthermore, amending the ordinance to clarify would jeopardize its "grandfathered" status and render it invalid.

Those interested in vacation rental regulation should stay abreast of pending legislation, as it is commonly the subject of proposed bills. One should also consider other sources of authority such as governing documents of any applicable condominium or homeowners association.

Accumulating Dysfunction

I wrote this column a few years ago but I find myself referring to it more and more when I teach. It was written following a conversation with an older friend of mine. I asked him how he was doing and he said, "well, but I've got the normal aches and pains that come with age." I asked him, when was pain required with aging?

Each of us has experienced injury during our life time; some more significant than others. We typically brush ourselves off and press-on never thinking of the long-term consequences. We were young, healthy and motivated or we were busy and didn't have time to get things checked out.

This works for a time but after a while we do what I call, accumulating dysfunction. If you think about it, how many times have you blamed an ache/pain or inability to do something on a previous injury? "My knee hurts because I have an old football injury." "My body has not been the same since I gave birth to my kids," "I was fine until that guy rearended me four years ago." Perhaps there are legitimate, residual consequences from a previous injury and our function will never be the same, but usually what happens is we compensate over and over. A little weakness. A little shift in the way we move, an extra pillow, or something to help us get through.

The word function is a term resurfacing in healthcare. Perhaps the re-focus is due to our more active babyboomers, or changes in healthcare and insurance policies. Regardless of the reason, it's important because function requires movement and proper movement keeps us healthy. Our bodies consist of an osseus (bony) frame, controlled by a myofascial system, which receives its orders from the nervous system. Injury to any one of these systems will result in dysfunction (impaired or abnormal function) great or small. Fortunately, due to "selfpreservation" our bodies Accumulating Dysfunction compensate in varying

degrees – resulting in imbalances.

Most of us provide more regular maintenance to our cars by changing worn tires or other parts to keep them running than we do our own bodies. We don't wait for the air conditioner to breakdown before scheduling service. We schedule regular annual service in an effort to keep it running without interruption. We even get vaccinations and medical check-ups annually for the purpose of prevention - to keep our organs healthy. Why not give your musculoskeletal system an annual check-up? What was your shoulder or hip range of motion last year? What was your strength? Have you lost some? What are your baseline measurements?

We've all heard the phrase, "prevention is the best medicine." I prefer the phrase, "prevention is the best intervention." Prevention can intervene (or get in between) you and dysfunction. Whatever movement you have today – don't lose it. Maintain your strength, muscle length, joint motion and function with prevention. Get current baseline measurements and compare annually just like you would your weight, cholesterol, blood sugar or INR. When you schedule your annual medical exam, schedule an annual functional exam with your physical therapist. Keep moving. Minimize compensation. Stay healthy and be functional.
