Tyabb Township Plan - Airfield Precinct Plan

After the rush of the TAPP release by Council last year the next stage, the formation of the CRG (Community Reference Group) has started and the Ratepayers Group committee members had an initial meeting with the proposed CRG chairperson. Additionally the CRG draft Terms of Reference have been produced and we are currently working through them with general comments, alterations and corrections. We are led to understand that the PAC (airfield operators) are currently preparing a master plan for the airfield's longevity, which was one of the major recommendations that came from the TAPP. Equally important will be the preparation of the noise plan. The timings for the ongoing work hasn't been released at this point in time, so again we wait and prepare as best we are able.

How the airshow affected the town I will leave with those who were at home. I was interstate working, but there won't be another for at least two years.

One comment which did come to us was parking in the main street which affected numbers at local businesses.

Around Town

As you will have noticed new soccer goals have been added to the Central Reserve. The local soccer club was running out of room in Somerville, so will be using the Tyabb Central Reserve for their games and will also use the old baseball club building. This is a great asset and will mean that it will be cleaned up and used on a regular basis,

During a recent cricket game or practice session a ball ended up on Frankston/Flinders Road which in itself isn't too worrying, as long as the players don't chase it, but a soccer ball could cause traffic to swerve. So we are in discussion with the Shire for the erection of fencing on the eastern side of the Reserve - this was in the master plan for the Central Oval in the Tyabb Town Plan. Hopefully they can move on it sooner rather than later.

Over recent months the walking/bike path from Bungower Road back to Tyabb has been upgraded to make it safer. Hopefully this will mean more cyclists and pedestrians using this path.

Graffiti has become a problem in town and the Council are working to clean it up as soon as possible. An article later in this newsletter will show you how you can report things like graffiti back to Council for their attention. This is a phone based app called **Snap Send Solve** and it works brilliantly. Many residents use it on a regular basis to report problems.

FIRST Robotics World Championship



FIRST stands for: For Inspiration & Recognition of Science & Technology


Three local teens are off to Houston, Texas to compete in the FIRST Robotics World Championship. Jadimo and Oriyla Nelson and Finlay James are members of I C Robotics, which came second at the South Pacific Regional final in Sydney in March. This fantastic achievement reflected the 1,800 hours of work - including design, prototyping, problem solving, CAD, mechanical and electrical systems and coding - put in by team members over the six week build season.

In addition to the opportunity to display the versatility & accuracy of their robot, the IC team was also honoured to be presented with the Chairman's Award "The most prestigious award at FIRST, it honours the team that best represents a model for other teams to emulate and best embodies the purpose and goals of FIRST". This award was given because of the team's significant outreach efforts, and their championing of STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering & Mathematics) education for all, including efforts to encourage girls into STEM. IC team members are active within their community; running workshops, working with council members, giving robot demonstrations and spreading STEM within local and broader communities. In addition to the STEM initiatives the 13 youth members and mentors hoping to go to Houston are all involved in their community in other ways, including: Scouts, Boys and Girls brigades, Surf Life Saving, Sailability and Riding for the Disabled. Team members coach disabled kids' gymnastics, community drama classes and Milo cricket and volunteer at church and with local RSLs.

With only four weeks to apply for passports, book the trip and raise funds, the three friends have been very busy.

The team returns from Houston on 24th April, so getting up for the Dawn Service on ANZAC Day should be easier than normal as their body clocks will think it's lunchtime! Finlay will be playing the Last Post at the ceremony and the girls will help to lead the singing of the national anthems.

Somerville Quarry



Residents' objections to the operations of the newly expanded open cut quarry on the old pottery site in Somerville are mounting. Noise and dust blowing from the defoliated site and laden trucks swinging out dangerously into oncoming traffic on Jones Road all remain unresolved.



A challenge to the Work Authority for the new quarry is being mounted in VCAT by a local resident. The hearing is set for May 11th at 10:00am in 55 King Street, Melbourne. All are invited to attend.

Lastly, the quarry owners have not obtained permission to breach the water table and extract up to 90,000 litres of saline water each year. They are now applying to the EPA for a licence to discharge water from the quarry into Balcombe Creek. The pollution will be strongly resisted by residents and concerned citizens.



Friends of Clifford Drive Bushland Reserve

In March members of the Friends Group attended the Melbourne Water Healthy Waterways strategy development meeting for the Western Port catchment areas. Key targets are the reduction of pollutants entering the creeks in our area and continuing to increase the tree canopy and improve recreational access to various waterways.

The work we have done on our little Reserve was applauded and seemed to be at the forefront of rehabilitation efforts on the Peninsula.

For those of you who haven't been through the Reserve, please do come and see what volunteers can achieve when backed by resources from the Shire and Melbourne water.

What is Snap Send Solve? Like all great ideas, Snap Send Solve was developed from a simple thought -"wouldn't it be great if I could report this broken swing in the park through an app".

The result has been a robust, user focused, mobile app that takes all the thinking out of reporting to local authorities.

The premise is simple: the app works out where you are, who manages incidents within that particular area and then using a users own email address sends through relevant information such as location, incident type and any related image to the correct contact.

The best part? Users don't have to wait in phone queues, pass on any additional personal information, if they don't wish, and the same app can be used anywhere in Australia - no need to download an app every time you travel across the country.

After being available to download for a number of years and receiving an increasing amount of feedback from users, Snap Send Solve was redeveloped so that it could similarly work in conjunction with Water, Gas and Electricity companies, Asset Management bodies and a number of other organisations who want to be a part of Australia's most used incident reporting app.



Today, Snap Send Solve allows users to report incidents to every single council in Australia as well as a growing list of new organisations.

To start using this service just download it from your app store. Once you have made a report to Council or whoever they will reply with a case number. It's a great idea and works so well. You can download it direct to your phone from the AppStore or Google Play.

Why have a register?

The program is designed to make senior citizens living in their own home feel safer. It is a FREE service.

How do you join?

If you are a senior citizen residing full time within the Hastings area from Shoreham to Baxter - complete an application form which is available from Hastings Police Station, via e-mail at hastingsregister@hotmail.com, by calling the Register on 5979 2137.

Benefits of joining the Register

You can choose to receive a regular phone call from one of the friendly Hastings Police Senior Citizens Register volunteers to check on your welfare.

Two bus trips and two social events are conducted each year at a minimal cost to those registered.

An Identity Card

Each person on the register is issued with a laminated identity card. The purpose of the card, which is about the size of a credit card, is to advise any emergency person who may have to attend to you in an emergency while you are away from home that your personal details are held at the Hastings Police station. Whether out shopping locally or travelling interstate or overseas in the event of an emergency this ID card will be another piece of reassurance for the holder.

Privacy and Security

Your personal information will be kept private and confidential on a secure database at the Hastings Police station and all volunteers have undergone Police checks.

Reassurance for Families

With this service all families who may be worried about their more senior members welfare can rest assured that someone is in regular contact.

Why Keep The Mornington Peninsula Rural

The following article was written by Cllr. David Gill, Red Hill Ward Councillor. It speaks to what our Ward Councillor, Julie Morris said at the Ward meeting on 10th April.

People who talk to me would love to protect the future of the Mornington Peninsula from urban sprawl and insensitive development.

The Peninsula has a split of 70% rural/agricultural to 30% residential/commercial zonings. The Green Wedge and urban growth boundaries maintain this in our planning laws. However, we are threatened by a projected increase in Melbourne's population from 4 million to up to 10 million people within just a few decades.

This will create even more pressure on governments by the powerful development industry to erode the local urban growth boundary and may lead to larger housing developments on the Peninsula and the loss of important agricultural areas.

Why should we protect the Peninsula?

Feeding the booming city from nearby rural zoned areas is essential. We are already losing this prime agricultural land to those pursuing unproductive rural lifestyles and inappropriate tourist developments. This then applies pressure to prices and leads to less available farmland.

It is obvious that we will need to increase our output from the already substantial \$1.1 billion local food bowl in order to support Melbourne's growing population. Melbourne simply cannot afford to lose any more nearby prime agricultural land.

Of course, we also don't want to lose the many other rural and environmental values that we appreciate.

How do we accomplish this?

Mornington Peninsula Shire Council (MPSC) has released its Green Wedge Management Plan for public comment and finalised its local Housing and Settlement Strategy for State Government adoption.

The strong attendance at the recent Council series of town planning public meetings has prompted the MPSC to take these planning issues to the population of the city of Melbourne and to all Members of Parliament through an ongoing advocacy and advertising campaign. Thank you to all those who came and voiced their concerns.

The MPSC advertising campaign will promote rural and village aspects of the Peninsula as essential to Melbourne on many levels.

Most Melbournians visit the Mornington Peninsula and they are the target audience of the campaign. We don't have swinging electorates here, but they do and we hope that politicians will listen to them.

The message is clear ...

Don't expect us to build more suburbs on the Mornington

Peninsula and don't force urbanisation onto us

Topics covered included:

Tyabb Airfield

- The Shire will investigate any complaints of overweight nonemergency services aircraft using the airfield at night, if they are forthcoming.
- Breaches of the Sunday morning curfew on flights at the airfield are being investigated by the Shire.
- The TAPP Community Reference Group will probably begin in May this year and all are welcome to apply to be members of the Group.
- The proposition of a regional airport at Tyabb raised in a recent radio interview was dismissed as impossible by both the Councillor and the PAC.

Somerville Quarry

- With 120 truck movements a day (one every 4 minutes) the junction of Pottery Road and Jones Road is inadequate and constitutes a serious safety risk to traffic on Jones Road.
- The Shire is continuing to negotiate with Bayport Industries over funding of an upgrade to the junction.
- Concern was expressed by residents as to what assurances any trade-offs the Shire may have made to Bayport to secure their financial contribution to the upgrade.
- The Shire admitted that with a Work Authority issued by the Department of Earth Resources no one body was responsible for the effects on the safety of the junction caused by the quarry's operation.
- It was pointed out that the 60kph speed limit signs erected by the quarry owners were probably not compliant with VicRoads standards and therefore probably not enforceable. The Shire will investigate.

Tyabb Guide Hall

• A request was made to put in place maintenance on the hall, which is believed to be heritage listed and in need of a facelift.

Tyabb Central Oval

- The provision of a ballproof fence first promised in the Tyabb Town Plan was again requested.
- The inclusion of the cypress trees adjacent to the cenotaph in the 'High Risk Trees' program for 2018/2019 was requested.

Somerville Community House

• External lighting was discussed and will be included in the S223 submission for the 2018/2019 budget.

Grant Road Speed Limits

• A request was made to reduce the speed from 70kph to 60kph along Grant Road from the roundabout to Taits Hardware .

Councillor Morris' Leave of Absence

• Our congratulations to Cllr. Morris who is expecting her second baby and so will be taking leave of absence later in the year. During that period the Mayor, Cllr. Payne and Council Support will look after Watson Ward matters.
