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

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Meet our cover artist: Rebecca Barker

Art has always been a part of Rebecca's life. Her Father was a dairy farmer and her Mother was an artist since she was a baby, painting Christmas tree ornaments. Consequently, she grew up with paint and paper in-hand. She attended the Fine Arts program at Ohio University (Athens, Ohio) and received her BFA degree.

On her family's dairy farm quilting and collecting old quilts was a pastime for the Barker women. Rebecca's natural appreciation for quilts and the country landscapes became the subject she chose to paint. She developed a line of paintings she calls "QUILTSCAPES". The old-time quilt pattern is depicted in the painting with the quilt. For example, the LOG CABIN quilt has a painting of a log cabin in the background. Several paintings have the quilt images subtly mixed into the landscapes while others have the quilt hanging on a clothesline in the foreground. Rebecca paints her quilts in acrylic on masonite board. The quilt patterns come from quilt history books and quilt shows. "I do not make up the patterns. I love the designs of old-time quilts". She creates her own colors and materials in the fabrics. "I do not work from real quilts because the colors have to match the landscapes". Her style is described as realistic, with clean, clear colors and sensitivity to composition and texture.


She shows her work on her web page and has produced a line of note cards, limited edition prints, two books and gift items.

I'm one of the girls who graduated with a degree in home economics, and it's my joy to welcome family and friends for a meal or a cup of tea. But the COVID-19 pandemic has created restrictions and the need for caution. So now what?

Family, friends, and neighbors need TEA-L-C now more than ever, so I've looked for new ways to deliver love. Maybe some of these ideas will inspire you.

1. Deliver a love surprise.

Many school children are struggling with changed routines and learning from home. Three of my grandchildren, ages 10, 15, and 17, are attending school online. Fortunately, their mother, Amy, a former schoolteacher, is home to guide them as needed. With this change, I sensed they would enjoy an occasional surprise during the day. 
2. Order or mail a surprise.

Many visitors to Quilty Pleasures will recognize Amy, who has worked at the shop for over a decade (most recently as store manager) while Sam, a previous employee of QP, has worked in the wholesale side of fabric distribution and trade for almost 10 years. Their combined knowledge of both behind-the-scenes production and front-end retail gives them a unique perspective that they hope will add to the shopping experience of everyone who walks in the door. An amazing team of both quilters and sewists are on-hand to help with fabric selection and product questions in a friendly and welcoming environment. And, of course, Val and Leslie still work in the shop on a part-time basis (Sam and Amy wouldn't let them get away that easily!).


At Quilty Pleasures you'll find a mix of both modern and traditional fabrics in a wide range of colours, from bold jewel tones to soft pastels and beyond. Threads, scissors, sewing needles, and patterns are readily available, making the jump into quilting that much easier. The store specializes in the sales of Pfaff sewing machines and sergers, with on-site technicians that service most makes and models. And while COVID-19 restrictions have somewhat changed the way the store operates it is business as usual - the shop is open for in-store visits (at a limited capacity) as well as curb-side pickup. Plus, the addition of an online store makes shopping in your pajamas even easier! Classes, while usually a staple of the QP calendar, are on hold during the lockdown but online YouTube tutorials and product spotlights are filling in the gaps.

Sam and Amy are thrilled to officially be a part of the wonderful quilting community in Ottawa and look forward to continuing the legacy built by Val and Leslie (and having a little fun while doing it, too!). There's no guilty pleasure like Quilty Pleasures!

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

We're going to have to add a second page to the "Guys' Handbook."

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
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From Lydia's Recipe File:
Double-Thumbprint Heart Cookies

(Recipe from *In the Kitchen with Grandma*, page 131)

A delicious cookie for Valentine's Day or any day. Buttery, almond-flavored shortbread hearts filled with raspberry jam.

Ingredients

- 1 cup butter, softened
- 2/3 cup granulated sugar
- 1 teaspoon almond extract (or vanilla extract)
- 2 cups flour
- Pink food coloring
- 1/2 cup seedless raspberry jam
- powdered sugar (optional)


Glaze (optional)

- 1 cup powdered sugar
- 1 teaspoon almond extract (or vanilla extract)
- 2 to 3 teaspoons water

Directions

1. Preheat the oven to 350°.
2. In a large bowl, cream together the butter, sugar, and almond extract.
3. Add the flour gradually and mix the ingredients together by hand.
4. Knead the dough on a lightly floured surface until it is blended and smooth.
5. Divide the dough in half. If desired, tint one-half light pink.
6. Shape the dough into 1/2-inch balls (slightly larger than a marble).
7. On an ungreased baking sheet, place 2 cookies side by side so they touch. If you tinted half the dough pink, place 1 pink and 1 white ball side by side. Or make some cookies with 2 white balls or 2 pink balls.
8. Make a hole in the center of each cookie ball with your finger or thumb.
9. Shape the lower part of the cookie to a point to form a heart. Flatten the dough between the holes to join the thumbprints and make one larger hole.
10. Fill the center of each heart with 1/4 to 1/2 teaspoon jam.
11. Bake the cookies for 12 to 15 minutes or until they are firm but not brown.
12. Remove the cookies from the oven. Cool the cookies for about 10 minutes before adding glaze if desired.
13. Mix together the powdered sugar, almond extract, and water. Drizzle the glaze over the cookies with a fork. If you don't add glaze, dust the cookies with sifted powdered sugar.
14. When the glaze is firm and the cookies are cool, place the hearts in a covered container.

Makes 3 dozen cookies.





Gosh - don't you need a good quilt show?

This Spring, there will be a wonderful opportunity to visit one of two shops, **Stitch By Stitch** in Kingston in Eastern Ontario or **Quilting By Design** in New Hamburg in Western Ontario to see a world-class collection of quilts created for the **HomeMade Challenge by Free Spirit Fabrics**. Each of these shops have been selected as one of only eight shops worldwide to host the collection of quilts shortlisted in the **Tula Pink HomeMade challenge**. 12 quilts, selected from a vast number of competition quilts created during Covid and submitted to the jury this past Fall are arriving in Kingston in mid-May for a brief visit before they move on to be hosted by the winners' studios - including **Quilting By Design** in New Hamburg Ontario at the beginning of June. Created in vibrant colours each quilt inspires us to create exquisite handiwork and to create our own quilts using vibrant fabrics like those from the vibrant **Tula Pink HomeMade** collection.

During Covid, after we used up our scraps, it seems we were striving to capture colour and joy in our quilts, and the sheer number of people participating in the Nebula Block of the Month (nearly 10,000 participants!) has expanded people's incorporation of both bright colours and black and white themes in their quilts. These quilts display excellence in applique, handwork, machine quilting, ruler work, paper piecing and mixed media.

Heather Dawson, co-owner of the store at Golden Mile and Days Road, says "We are so thrilled, and honestly were absolutely gobsmacked that our big dreams of being a host of the tour were fulfilled! We have been striving to get our plans in place to host the quilts." Working with the local health unit to put together the plan so that everyone can attend in the most responsible manner - Stitch by Stitch has chosen to rent a big tent that will allow the quilts to be viewed in an open-air environment.

Quilting By Design has managed a similar safe plan and will be welcoming a few people inside the store at a time to see the quilts. Being selected as one of the shortlist quilts, may mean a meet the quilter moment: Julia Schumm created a beautiful quilt that will be included in the travelling show. "I choose this quilt because of the challenge of piecing circular quilts. I also wanted a quilt that would be a great candidate for custom quilting and am very thankful for the beautiful job my sister, Claudia did."

Heather Dawson, continued, "The winning quilts are so inspiring, and we can't wait to see them in person - some are machine quilted with home sewing machines, and some are made with hand-stitched embellishments. We are especially excited to see what our visitors will create when they are inspired by these next-level creations. We are all about helping people to get to the next level in their own craft and will be teaching people the skills to create their own HomeMade quilts."

"Covid has been an incredible time of growth in the handicraft industry - we have sold many new machines to people this year, and our service team has expanded to 2 full-time staff keeping ahead of mask wear and tear on modern machines and helping people get their heirloom machines up and running again! We have always acted as a hub for quilting for the area, and while people we limited to shopping outside our store we have been expanding our concierge services of quilt design calculations and colour consulting."

Heather took partial ownership of **Stitch By Stitch** on February 29 last year and has hosted a popular Facebook Live each day since mid-March 2020, using the platform to help people make masks and learn how to use their sewing machines. In April, during the lockdown, Heather was often found at a patio table in the parking lot teaching people how to thread their sewing machines so that they could make masks and coordinating teams of sewers who were provided with free fabric to produce fabric PPE for front line workers.

"We are sure that being awarded this quilt tour is karma - and we are so thankful!"

As you can imagine there is a huge interest in this event - **Stitch by Stitch** will have limited tickets releasing this month. Tickets to view the

quilts starting May 19th will be available through the store's website at StitchByStitchKingston.com

Quilting By Design is planning on having a few people at a time visit and tour the quilts and shop, and planning admittance to be first-come-first-served.

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
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

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Puzzle Piece Afghan

I designed this pattern not knowing at the time that puzzle piece print was used as a symbol for Autism awareness. I have had many requests for this pattern but have never had time to sit down and write one out. Seeing as how April is National Autism Awareness Month, I decided it was a good time to write out the pattern.

My pattern may not be the normal way to write out a crochet pattern, but it's the only way I know how as I do not crochet from patterns.

I find that 5 strands of yarn are about the maximum you want when carrying yarn for patterns, but you can use as many colours as you wish.

My pattern will make a small baby or puppy blanket, but you can add chains in increments of 20 to your chain row for each extra puzzle piece you want to add. For each additional row of puzzle pieces repeat rows 13-24.

Notes:

Chain 3 at beginning of rows counts as the first dc on each row throughout.

Pick up proper colour yarns to match puzzle pieces throughout unless otherwise stated.

Ch 103 (use your lightest colour yarn for the chain row and first puzzle piece)

Row 1: dc in the third chain from hook (counts as first dc), dc in next 19 chains leaving 2 loops on hook at last dc. *To change colours, pick up the next colour yarn by looping over hook and pulling through 2 loops on hook to finish dc (repeat this to pick up all yarns for colour changes throughout).* dc in the next 20 chains carrying the first yarn and all subsequent yarns along the backside of row and looping around it/them with every stitch. With all colours repeat dc 20 picking up new colours on 20th dc until end of chain row (5 colours in total). *Before turning make sure the yarns you are carrying are pulled snug to remove any slack* = 100 dc. Ch 3 and turn.

Row 2 Ch 3 counts as first dc. Dc into next 19 dc picking up next colour on the last dc. *with new colour dc in next 20 dc, pick up next colour on the last dc.* repeat from * to * to end of row. Ch 3 turn.

Row 3 repeat row 2

Row 4 repeat row 2

Row 5 ch 3 counts as first dc. dc in next 14 dc, pick up proper yarn colour for the next puzzle piece, *dc in next 3 dc, pickup previous colour and dc in next 2 dc. Pick up the previous colour and dc 15*. Repeat from * to * twice, matching puzzle piece colours as you go. With last puzzle piece colour dc in next 20 dc, Ch 3 turn.

Row 6 ch 3 counts as first dc. dc in the next 25 dc. *Pick up next colour and dc into next 20dc*, repeat from * to * twice. With the last puzzle piece colour dc in the next 14 dc. Ch 3 and turn.

Row 7 ch 3 counts as first dc. dc in the next 13 dc. *Pick up next colour dc into next 20 dc*, repeat from * to * twice. with last puzzle piece colour dc into next 26 dc, ch 3 turn.

Row 8 ch 3 counts as first dc. dc in next 14 dc, *pickup next puzzle piece colour and dc into next 3 dc, pickup previous colour and dc into next 2 dc, pickup previous colour and dc into the next 15 dc*, repeat from * to * twice. pick up the next puzzle piece colour and dc into the next 3 dc. Pick up the previous colour and dc into the next 2 dc. Pick up the previous colour and dc into the next 20 dc, ch 3 turn.

Row 9 repeat row 3

Row 10 repeat row 2

Row 11 repeat row 3

Row 12 repeat row 2 leaving 2 loops on hook to change colours. Pick up a new colour ch 3 turn.

Row 13 ch 3 counts as first dc. dc in next 7 dc, pick up yarn colour to match puzzle piece directly below and dc in next 4 dc, pickup previous yarn colour and dc in next 8 dc. *Pick up a new colour and dc in next 8 dc, pick up colour from puzzle piece directly below and dc in next 4, pick up previous colour and dc in the next 8 dc* repeat from *to* till end of row, chain 3 and turn.

Row 14 ch 3 counts as first dc. dc in the next 6 dc, pick up yarn colour from puzzle piece directly below dc in next 6 dc, pick up previous yarn colour dc in next 7 dc. *Pick up next puzzle piece colour dc in the next 7 dc, pick up yarn colour from puzzle piece below dc into next 6 dc, pick up previous yarn colour dc into next 7 dc* repeat * to* to end of row, chain 3 and turn.

Row 15 repeat row 13

Row 16 repeat row 2

Row 17 repeat row 5

Row 18 repeat row 6

Row 19 repeat row 7

Row 20 repeat row 8

Row 21 repeat row 3

Row 22 repeat 2

Row 23 repeat row 3

Row 24 repeat row 12

Row 25-36 repeat rows 13-24

Row 37-48 repeat rows 13-24

Row 49-59 repeat rows 13-23

Row 60 repeat row 24 dropping each yarn colour when finished and weave in ends

Tie off and work in ends of last yarn to finish.



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
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Adventures, Parties & Memories





I encourage you to check out similar shops in your area that offer classes for creating - you'll find them within these pages. My first project there was a chunky blanket knitted with your hands instead of needles. It is pretty, but because my knitting wasn't consistent, it has started really getting stretched and sort of ugly honestly. It's still warm though! Dave, Rachel and I (Grace couldn't join us that night) also did some coffee table trays as gifts for our parents for Christmas 2019. Those turned out great! For a project for Rachel, Grace and I to work on this December, I got one of their "to go" projects of 6 wood ornaments. It was a fun quick project but wish I had mixed the gray paint color at once instead of in batches because we had some non-matching issues. Luckily that's hard to see from afar!

Another "crafty" thing I've taken on is painting a couple pieces of furniture with chalk paint. We changed our décor in living room, but had coffee and end tables that didn't match any longer but are made from good solid wood. So, chalk paint to the rescue! Again, some learning curves there (dark black is hard to accomplish) but the finished pieces look nice.

I started making another blanket knitted with my hands instead of needles before Christmas but ran out of yarn and then couldn't find the same yarn for over a month. In my search for the first yarn, I ran across the Bernat Alize Blanket-EZ. It's officially described as "Time to get crafty with Bernat Alize Blanket-EZ! This yarn features unique preformed loops. With no needles or hooks required, Blanket-EZ projects are completed faster and easier than traditional knitting." Yes, this is what I needed. Consistent loop issue handled for me and it's soooo very soft. I've now made 3 blankets with this yarn and plan on others soon. Check for it at your local yarn shops! Take it from the one who isn't crafty.... It makes being crafty easy!

Maybe I'm becoming crafty?? Or maybe I was always crafty; I just didn't spend time trying. Just don't ask me to draw anything, please!

5" Pincushion or Mug Rug



Cut Wool Strips as follows	
A - Center	1" x 1"
B	1" x 1"
C	1" x 2"
D	1" x 2"
E	1" x 3"
F	1 1/4" x 3"
G	1 1/4" x 4 1/4"
H	1 1/4" x 4 1/4"
I	1 1/4" x 5 1/2"

1. Cut Shape Flex fusible interfacing 5 1/2" x 5 1/2".
2. Place interfacing fusible side up on ironing surface.
3. Place wool strips in order indicated on top of the fusible interfacing so that each strip lays exactly side by side with no interfacing showing.
4. Fuse in place. Flip over and fuse again from back side.
5. Use Valdani Size 12 Pearl Cotton to add a decorative stitch between each piece of wool. We used the Fly Stitch. Check out needlenthread.com for tutorials.
6. Cut piece of flannel or wool 5 1/2" x 5 1/2" for backing.
7. Place right sides together with completed block. Machine stitch around edges using a 1/4" seam allowance, leaving a 3" opening on one side. Clip corners, turn right sides out through opening. Press.
8. Stuff with fiberfill or crushed walnut shells for a pincushion, then stitch opening closed. Leave flat, stitch opening closed, then topstitch around edges for mug rug.

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

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Finding Community: Quilt Guilds

I was helping a group of church quilters working on donation quilts when I first heard about quilt guilds.

Curious, I asked what a quilt guild does.

"There are monthly meetings, trunk shows, and service projects we work on. It's a lot of fun," one of the church quilters shared. "There are about 75 members. You should come!"

Being an introvert, I don't think of myself as a woman to run towards new groups. (Or was that just the excuse I made for myself at the time? Thinking about it now, several years later, I think about the miles I've traveled and the places I've gone since that conversation about quilt guilds.)

The same church quilter suggested I join the quilt guild a number of more times that year, but I knew looking for a new job would interrupt anything I might start.

When I moved during the summer of 2019, though, I committed to finding a quilt guild in my new area. The research-phase was as simple as walking into the town's only quilt store, and asking, "What can a new quilter in town do around here?" (I walked out of the shop with a business card for the guild—and a small bag of fabric.)

Three weeks later, I attended my first guild meeting. Although I selected a seat in the back row by myself, I wasn't alone for too long. The only challenge remaining at that time was that the quilt guild only offered daytime meetings—and I was starting my new job the following week.

Thankfully, there were others who apparently expressed interest in re-starting the evening quilt guild group, as the night group started up again in January. I was there, and applied for annual membership before I left! I was happy to return in February, and even took a project for show-and-tell. The support of the women was grand!

Returning for another meeting in March, with another project for show-and-tell, I felt more comfortable with the group; whispers about COVID-19 left me nervous about the future, though.

Things went "virtual" after that. Emails and newsletters have kept us anchored together as a group, and the quilt guild created ways for us to "stay together" virtually until we can meet face-to-face again. First, the President's quilt design was presented to commemorate her years of service: a quilt of face masks.

No kidding! Not my first choice of things I would want to commemorate, but I decided to participate anyway. I made my block, "signed" it with fabric marker, and returned it to the quilt guild president.

Next project: a sampler quilt! Twelve blocks of different designs, I chose Southwest fabrics and 6" blocks. The plan is to have it finished for October's Quilt Show. (Fingers crossed that we can have it!)

Nervous about making friends in my new community, it turned out to be as simple as attending a quilt guild meeting. Though we can't get together as a guild much this year, these ladies have still anchored me with friendships, connections, and community.

DO YOU KNOW YOUR NEEDLE POINTS?



SLIGHTLY ROUNDED POINT

The slightly rounded point is the standard point shape for household sewing machines. This point shape is qualified for trouble-free sewing of most materials and many applications.

The following sewing needles have a slightly rounded point:

- Universal Needle
- Super Universal Needle
- Topstitch Needle
- Embroidery Needle
- Metallic Needle
- Double Eye Needle
- Hemstitch Needle
- Quick Threading Needle



ACUTE ROUND POINT

This is a slim, acute point shape, useful for accurate piercing of densely woven and coated materials. It creates an exact seam appearance with straight stitches and helps to reduce seam puckering.

The following sewing needle has an acute round point:

- Microtex Needle



SLIGHTLY ROUNDED POINT WITH SPECIAL TAPER

The slim point with special taper to the slightly rounded point easily penetrates thick layers of fabric and batting and avoids material damages. It is the best point shape for quilting and patchwork.

The following needle has a slightly rounded point with special taper:

- Quilting Needle



LIGHT BALL POINT

This point shape displaces woven and knitted threads, directly piercing the spaces between the threads. Therefore, it avoids material damages. This is the best point shape for embroidery.

The following sewing needles have a light ball point:

- Embroidery Needle
- Gold Embroidery Needle



MEDIUM BALL POINT (SUK)

The medium ball point is more rounded than a light ball point. Therefore, it can be used for coarser knitwear, for material containing Lycra/Spandex and it is also very suitable for medium to heavy denim.

The following sewing needles have a medium ball point:

- Stretch Needle
- Jersey Needle
- Jeans Needle



TWIST POINT (LL)

This cutting point has a lens-shaped cross-section and the incision is made at an angle to the direction of the seam. It provides easier penetration of leather and leather-like materials. This point shape creates a decorative stitch slightly inclined towards the left (in household machines which are threaded from the front).

The following sewing needle has a twist point:

- Leather Needle



PART 3: Putting it All Together


Using Fabric B: Cut Sixteen (16) 4.5" squares.

Set aside Nine (9) of your 16.5" block and Eight (8) of your 4 patch row sets.


Follow the diagram to assemble 16 blocks. Sew one 4-patch row to the side of 16 of your strip set blocks. Sew a 4.5" block to the end of 16 of your 4-patch rows and then sew one of these to the bottom of the block. These blocks should measure 20.5" X 20.5"



Next take 4 of the 16.5" strip set blocks that were set aside and sew a 4-patch row to the **BOTTOM** of each. Press your seams.




Next take 4 of the 16.5" strip set blocks that were set aside and sew a 4-patch row to the **RIGHT SIDE** of each. Press your seams.




Follow the diagram to set the quilt together. There will be 4 blocks across and 5 down. The 5th block **ACROSS** will be the block you sewed the 4-patch row at the **BOTTOM**.

The 5th block **DOWN** will be the block you sewed the 4-patch row to the **RIGHT SIDE**. The block in the **VERY BOTTOM RIGHT** will not have a 4-patch row sewn to it.

Note: I have not drawn in **ALL** the lines in the diagram, but shown you the positions only with 1 block in each row.




GIRLFRIEND WISDOM

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
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
