The weather was perfect for more than two hundred families that participated in the first ever Hennepin Hoopla, organized by the Big Island Soil and Water Preservation Association, along with the Village of Milan and University of Illinois Extension on August 12, 2017.

There was something for everyone to do at each lock, whether learning about the history of the canal from river historian. John Vize, eating ice cream from the cool Vibrant Credit Union bus, learning about QC Trails and Be Healthy QC, or looking for clouds during River Action's Scavenger Hunt at Lock 30. Participants were also spotted playing games at the University of Illinois Extension's SNAP-Ed booth and pedaling the blender bike to make a smoothie, learning about pollinators from Master Gardeners and exploring the newly planted pollinator prairie garden, and eating healthy snacks from the Hy-Vee Healthy You mobile truck at Lock 31. Families also discovered mus-

BISAWPA Nominates Blackhawk Township for River Action's EDDY Award for Stewardship

When asked to partner with the Big Island Soil & Water Preservation Association NFP, Inc. to renovate Lock 32, Blackhawk Township readily agreed to help. And help they did with extensive vegetation removal, grading and laying 300 tons of gravel in the parking lot, installing 3 new directional signs, refurbishing the "Hennepin Canal" park sign and replacing one rusted trash container with 4 new ones. The work did not stop there. They also replaced the deteriorated wooden decking on the Lock 32 walk bridge and at Lock 31 partnered with us

to install the bike/walk ramps connecting the Picnic Shelter to the Bike/Walk Trail on top of the levee.

As columnist, Bob Groene, stated in his November 17, 2015, Argus/Dispatch article regarding the improvements to Lock 32, "The area was transformed from a community liability into a community asset, at a place many folks say has one of the best views in the Quad Cities – the confluence of the Mississippi and Rock Rivers and the Hennepin Canal." Lock 31 Pollinator Prairie Garden

On a cool spring morning lots of nice folks planted our Pollinator Prairie Garden at Lock 31. Grant money from Rock Island County Soil & Water Conservation District and Big Island Soil & Water Preservation Association made this positive project a reality. These 32 varieties of native plants (forbes & grasses) will provide shelter and food for pollinators. The garden was designed and plants selected to attract pollinators and blossom from spring to fall with assistance from Martha Smith, University of Illinois Extension Horticulture Educator, Rich Stewart and Sarah Fitzgerald of Rock Island
