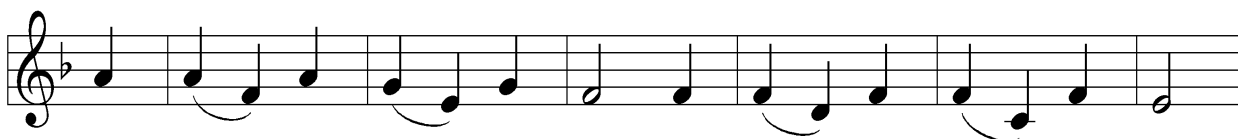

• CHILDREN'S MESSAGE

Theme: Good Role Models

Materials: A Football, Baseball, Golf Club or any other sports equipment

Scripture: Philippians 1:1-18a

Good morning girls and boys! I hope you had a great week! I'm really happy to see you this morning.

I have some sports equipment here today. Do any of you play sports? What sports do you play?

Today I have a baseball and a golf club. If you want to become really good at these sports how would you do that? I think that beside doing a lot of practicing the best way to get really good at throwing a curve ball or perfecting your fastball or even getting better at hitting the ball with a golf club is to watch what other people who are champions in the sport do. You imitate what the really good players do and maybe with enough practice you can be just as good or maybe even better than they are...

We call these people role models because we learn from them how to get better. Did you know the same is true in other areas of life? We learn how to be better people by imitating the people we admire and who live their lives in faithfulness and trusting in God.

In our Bible story for today we have just that sort of person. His name was Saint Paul. He lived his life trusting God and our savior Jesus. Because he loved Jesus and trusted Jesus Saint Paul was courageous even when he faced terrible things like being ship wrecked and when he was put in prison just for telling people about Jesus. Paul started many Churches in the ancient world and he was the role model the first Christians looked to when they faced bad things in their lives too.

Who is your role model when it comes to learning about Jesus for you? Is it your mom or dad or your grandma or grampa? For me it was my mom and then later in life it was my wife PJ who inspires me and helps me to live a better life as I try to walk with Jesus. Of course, our best role model is Jesus himself. He spent his days loving everyone, even people most others didn't love...

I hope you have lots of people in your lives who help you live as Jesus would like us to live. Let's close with a prayer... dear God, thank you for all the wonderful role models and teachers you give to us. Help us to learn from them how to live our lives so that we can be more like Jesus. Amen!

• **SCRIPTURE READING: Philippians 1:1-18a**

P: Our scripture reading for this day is from the Book of Philippians the 1st chapter.

C: Glory to you O Lord.

1 Paul and Timothy, servants of Christ Jesus, To all the saints in Christ Jesus who are in Philippi, with the bishops and deacons: ²Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.

³I thank my God every time I remember you, ⁴constantly praying with joy in every one of my prayers for all of you, ⁵because of your sharing in the gospel from the first day until now. ⁶I am confident of this, that the one who began a good work among you will bring it to completion by the day of Jesus Christ.

⁷It is right for me to think this way about all of you, because you hold me in your heart, for all of you share in God's grace with me, both in my imprisonment and in the defense and confirmation of the gospel. ⁸For God is my witness, how I long for all of you with the compassion of Christ Jesus.

⁹And this is my prayer, that your love may overflow more and more with knowledge and full insight ¹⁰to help you to determine what is best, so that in the day of Christ you may be pure and blameless, ¹¹having produced the harvest of righteousness that comes through Jesus Christ for the glory and praise of God.

¹²I want you to know, beloved that what has happened to me has actually helped to spread the gospel, ¹³so that it has become known throughout the whole imperial guard and to everyone else that my imprisonment is for Christ; ¹⁴and most of the brothers and sisters, having been made confident in the Lord by my imprisonment, dare to speak the word with greater boldness and without fear. ¹⁵Some proclaim Christ from envy and rivalry, but others from goodwill. ¹⁶These proclaim Christ out of love, knowing that I have been put here for the defense of the gospel; ¹⁷the others proclaim Christ out of selfish ambition, not sincerely but intending to increase my suffering in my imprisonment. ¹⁸What does it matter? Just this, that Christ is proclaimed in every way, whether out of false motives or true; and in that I rejoice.

- **SERMON**

Grace and peace to you from God our Father and from the one who unites us in His Gospel, Christ Jesus, Our Lord, amen.

Paul's letter to the Church in the Macedonian city of Philippi is one of my favorite books of the Bible. It was certainly Saint Paul's most joyful letters. The unbridled joy Paul has when thinking about the Saints in Philippi is perhaps a bit surprising since Paul says he's writing this letter from behind bars in prison. I certainly wish I had the ability to be so positive when the chips are down in my life... Scholars aren't quite certain exactly when this letter was penned, but if it was when Paul was in the prison in Ephesus, then it would have been about 54 to 55 AD. If it was when he was in prison in Rome it would have been perhaps 5 or 6 years later, so maybe around 59 to 60 AD. Paul had established the Church in the city of Philippi and this became the first church in Europe. It was located in modern day Greece. The city of Philippi was founded around 450 years BC by Philip II, Alexander the Great's father. It was later conquered by the Romans and converted into a Roman City, which is who ruled during the time of Paul.

When I read about the early Church I wonder how they survived. How'd they keep their faith alive when they see the missionaries and Apostles like Saint Paul thrown in prison and even killed. The church at Philippi was one of many

new churches being established by Paul and other missionaries and Apostles. As a new church in a world that didn't like such a dramatic change, hearing stories of the missionaries' imprisonment, beatings, and even executions must have been terrifying. Even though their founder was in prison and his fate unknown, once you see the truth for yourself, you can't unsee it. So, how would they continue in the face of such trials? From prison, Paul wrote to the Philippians. He encouraged them in their work. He spoke with grace and courage, even as his own fate was all but cast in stone. He lifted them up and pointed to other models of leadership that were doing God's work boldly despite the danger. Paul's gift to the people was in the way he modeled grace under pressure with his words and his attitude. He maintained his composure and he continued the work, looking out for the Philippians even as his own life was in grave danger.

One of the best gifts we can give others is to model faith. Our words are empty if they are not backed by our actions. When I went on my Via de Cristo weekend, which is the Lutheran version of the Methodist Walk to Emmaus, I learned a catch phrase that simply says, as Christians we must not just talk the talk, but also walk the talk. Sometimes our words aren't even necessary if our actions speak our truth. Still, the more authentic and honest our words, the more impactful they will be. Modeling faith takes practice. Like anything else in life the more

you try the better you get... With practice, living out our faith can become second nature. We can live our truth and others will be changed by what they see.

Over the years as a Pastor, I've had the privilege of sitting with several families as they wait for their loved one to pass. It's a sacred honor that I don't take lightly. One thing always stands out when I know the person is a Christian is they aren't afraid of death. They almost look forward to being released from this life to move on to the next. Christians don't cry out for more time or blame God for taking them. They have quiet confidence that their savior is waiting for them on the other side. Of all the times in our lives when the witness of the Christian is able to influence others, the time of our death is perhaps that one time when our actions really do speak louder than our words.

I'm not saying that our actions through out our lives are less important. The way we live our lives from Baptism onward show others what we believe and in whom we trust, but I think the way Christians react to and understand their mortality is the biggest example of how we can show grace under pressure, like Saint Paul did when he faced his uncertain future. He held close to his trust in Jesus Christ and even while being under the threat of execution, he was still concerned about the Church he started in Philippi. I can only imagine how his words must have encouraged that fledgling congregation as they watched in horror

as their founder was imprisoned and eventually put to death by beheading outside the city of Rome. They were, I'm sure, watching every move he made to see if his words matched his actions.

How do your words line up with your actions? Do you reveal by your actions where your trust is placed? Of course they do! For good or for bad our actions always speak louder than our words... Paul's grace and confidence in the face persecution served the Lord by encouraging others. His actions helped the Church at Philippi to grow spiritually in their own walk with Christ by seeing how Paul walked through his time of trial. In this text we have for today, Paul says he prays for the Philippian Congregation even though he's hundreds of miles away. He's showing them and us the Church isn't just about us and our cozy little gathering here in beautiful Pitsburg Ohio, the Church is global, and Paul cared what happened to other Christians, even those far away, even while facing trials of his own.

How can we show our caring for all Christians, even those far away? How do we demonstrate our partnership in the Gospel with members of Christ's Church who are different from us or are far away from us? We have been taking up a collection every week for our own missionary in Poland, Jodi Hessler. We've already sent two substantial gifts to her organization earmarked directly for Jodi.

Because of your generosity we are in partnership with her in the work she's doing to advance the Gospel of Jesus Christ half a world away in Poland. Another way we've been demonstrating our love for others and our partnership in the Gospel with those who are far away is through our Benevolence offerings that you generously give every week. In the past, those gifts have gone into a black hole called the ELCA and nobody really knew where the money went. About 6 months ago the Church Council voted to allow us to designate our Benevolence offering to special causes instead of giving it all to the ELCA as undesignated giving. Since then, I've been working with Diane Warner, our Benevolence Treasurer, to purchase specific gifts through the ELCA Good Gifts Catalog. For example, we've purchased farm animals like chickens, pigs, and cows for impoverished families in South America and Africa. We've contributed to digging wells in some of those same villages where clean drinking water was previously not available. We've even invested in technology to bring irrigation from those wells to the farmers who need the water to grow their crops. I'm really excited to see some of the ways we've been able to walk the talk with our Benevolence funds. If you're interested in what we're doing and how we're spending that money, we have copies of the ELCA Good Gifts Catalog on the communications table across from the office. If you have a heart for one of the Good Gifts in that catalog, please let

me or Diane know, and we'll try to work in your request for the next quarter when we do the shopping. Special thanks goes to Diane who has spent many hours figuring out how to distribute and spend those funds.

I could go on and give you many more examples of how this congregation, by our actions, proclaim our trust in Jesus Christ, just like Saint Paul did in our text for today. This Church isn't just a club where we gather to talk about Jesus. We're his actual body here on earth. I know others look to the Church to see if we Christians believe what we preach.

May we always follow in Paul's footsteps by reaching out to those who might be falling away or faltering in their faith. May we through our actions show the greater community how much we trust in our Savior. When our day comes to make the transition from this life to the next, may we remain steadfast in our faith and trust in our Lord Jesus Christ and the promises of our loving and living God for life eternal with God and all the saints who have gone before. May you be encouraged in your faith until that day when Jesus calls your name to join him in eternity. Until that day, I will always remember you in my prayers and give thanks for the partnership we have in spreading the Good News of God's love. Thanks be to God! Amen.

*** NICENE CREED**

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one Baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen

P: Gather our prayers, spoken aloud and offered silently, into your hands, for the good of your people and the glory of your name.

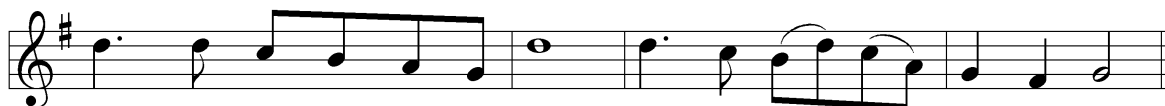
