### PASTOR'S CORNER Rejoice in the Lord always. I will say it again: Rejoice! Philippians 4:4

I don't know about you, but sometimes I'm reading along in the Bible and I come across a verse that makes me sit up and say, "huh?" This verse is one of those verses. Especially this year, but really at just about any season of life, it can be hard to hear the teaching of Paul here. Sure, we like to be joyful, we like celebrating life's highs, we like laughing and camaraderie...but we know there are many times in life, even in each day, when it isn't all that easy to rejoice. Then we read a verse like this and can grow either angry – why would God expect us to rejoice in the midst of trouble – or confused – is something wrong with me that I'm not more joyful?

What Paul may be doing here, both for the Philippians and for us, is inviting us to change our perspective. Much of the time, our joy is dictated to us by our circumstances. We feel happy or sad because of what happens to us. We feel up or down because of the current reality of our lives. We feel joy or sorrow because of external factors. We are blown here and there, from the peaks to the valleys of emotion, by things over which we have little to no control. We are, in short, victims of what goes on around us.

Instead of being victims, though, Paul urges followers of Jesus to orient themselves by one thing, one Person: God. In the next verse, he reminds his readers that "the Lord is near." God is with us! That fundamental reality, unchanging, can influence every experience of our lives, every mood of our psyche, if we so choose. We can be joyful – note, he doesn't say happy; Paul knows there are often experiences of deep sorrow in our lives at any given moment – we can be joyful in any circumstance. What is that joy? A deep and abiding sense that things are standing on a firm foundation, a fervent trust in and appreciation for the Lord, an awareness of the love of Christ enfolding us at all times. That sort of orientation in life, centered on Christ and not on circumstance, is something we can work towards. That is something that we can do at all times. We just have to decide to do it, and then diligently embrace it each day. "Rejoice in the Lord always. I will say it again: Rejoice!"

Judy has received cards since John's death from persons whom he helped, saying they would never forget what John had done for them and their families.

While talking with Church members about their remembrances of John, each one, immediately, highlighted his devotion to family and his willingness to help. Many remember his conscientiousness of greeting everyone each Sunday morning. In order to connect, John and Judy sat on the back row, the perfect location for his mission.

Steve said his Dad was passionate about missions. Steve remembered in particular the times that "Dr. P." from India and Daniel from Uganda visited our congregation and our community. His father supported their ministries and quietly contributed to their ministries every month thereafter.

What Nancy remembers about John Giuliano were his prayers. In particular, she recalls the circle of prayer that we formed around Carolyn and Jimmy Mayberry's house one summer evening, joining in a concert of prayer for Jimmy's recovery from cancer. We were encouraged to join hands and pray out loud if we wished; John's prayer was amazing from such a quiet man. It was the prayer of a man who knew quite well the Heavenly Father to whom he spoke. What a testimony!

In a recent Sunday school lesson taping (Friday mornings), class members shared names of hymns which reminded them of how God strengthens us. It felt good even to call out names of favorite hymns. We are all thirsty for the experience of singing beloved hymns together in worship or fellowship. Just because we cannot sing collectively yet does not mean that you cannot sing at home, in the car, in the shower, or in your hearts. So sing! Keep your voices active and your hearts happy with the wonderful words and tunes of favorite hymns.

For Adam's focus on Psalms of refuge, the choir will feature many hymns and anthems that celebrate how God offers the blessing of refuge and rescue to us. One of those will be "O God Our Help in Ages Past", whose words were written by Isaac Watts. Isaac was born in Southampton, England in 1674. He began to write words to hymns early in his life, and he has written some of the best worship hymns we have. Fourteen hymns in our hymnal had their words written by him, including "When I Survey the Wondrous Cross", "My Shepherd Will Supply My Need", and "Joy to the World". He is often called the Father of English Hymnody. I owe gratitude to him for some of my favorite hymn texts (words). Perhaps you do also.
