Anything from small to large projects can be submitted. The project must be accomplished between January 1, 2019 and December 31, 2019. For larger projects, partnering with other organizations in the community can help with expenses and volunteers.

The winners will receive monetary awards up to \$5000 and state awards up to \$50 per club. The

overall winner will receive roundtrip transportation and one nights lodging to attend the 2020 Annual Convention in Atlanta, Georgia. Have you heard anything about trafficking on TV or other news? I have. It is around us. Girls and children being taken from malls, stores, gas stations. Girls being lured away over the internet, just to find out they were fooled.

Is there anywhere in your area that helps people like this? I found 2 or 3 in the Kansas City Area. My club is having them come talk to us, and to share how we can be involved with supporting their efforts. Can you do the same? All I can really ask is for you to try to find someplace somewhere, and see what they need from you. And learn the signs of trafficking, and report, report and report to anyone that can help...

Another area of interest is UNICEF. How about throwing a Halloween Party for UNICEF. Collect change or cash instead of candy, and send to UNICEF as the Halloween for UNICEF effort. It will be spent in other programs, not the End Trafficking initiative.

Heifer International is one of Kathy's emphasis areas. We have all heard so much about it I don't think I need to tell you much. But here is something you may not have known. Since 1944, Heifer has helped 25 million families in more than 125 countries through the gifts of livestock and agricultural training. Amazing stuff. The organization can't do this without help from others. People like us. So if there is a program your club can do, please try to include at least one thing through the year. And report efforts specifically. So credit can be given. Put efforts into winning an Award this year. One state certificate and one \$50 club award are available. But if these efforts go unreported in January, no awards can be given. So be specific in your reporting. need numbers, description, hours, money. I And mark reports for what need it all. specific GFWC emphasis you are reporting to help the chairwomen like me know where to collect our info.

International Outreach is my area, but there are others, and those chairmen will be looking for things in their area too. So make reports specific. Decide what efforts you are promoting, and label them, make them as specific as possible. We chair people will appreciate that so much.

GFWC of Kansas Citizenship Essay Scholarship Contest

1. Clubs should announce the Citizenship Essay contest at the beginning of the school year. The topic for 2018 essay is: <u>"Personal responsibilities of a good citizen."</u>

2. Contest may not be used as a school assignment, nor have been previously graded by a teacher, but topic may be announced for an individual writing assignment.

3. Clubs are responsible for encouraging student entries, providing advice and information to the essay writer Home schooled students must submit essays through a GFWC KS club.

4. The contest is open to all high school sophomores, juniors, and seniors in Kansas who have not been state scholarship winners previously.

5. The essay contest theme will be announced by the GFWC of Kansas Citizenship Essay Chairman.

6. The essay must be 500 words or less, typewritten and double spaced on 8.5×11 single sheets of paper.

7. Any GFWC of Kansas club may sponsor a student. Scholarships will be awarded to the college of choice to the top four state winners. The amount of the scholarship will be determined by the sponsoring organization. Certificates shall be presented to all district winners. Local club deadline is December 1.

8. The first place essay from a local club must be sent to the state Citizenship Essay Chairman by February 1st. Each club may recognize its own method of determining the club winner and how the club will recognize the winner. All essays are to be judged.

9. The announcement of winners and awarding of scholarships will be made at State Convention.

10. A cover sheet must accompany the entry. If there is no cover sheet the essay will not be judged. The cover sheet must include student name, address and phone number, e-mail address, name of sponsoring club, grade in high school, name of high school, and city. **NO IDENTIFICATION SHOULD BE ON THE ESSAY**. Students are to retain a copy of their essay.

11. Clubwomen, parents, essay writers, and friends are encouraged to attend the State Convention.

12. Students should be aware that the Judges' main focus will be on the content of the

essays, but that grammar and spelling will be taken into consideration in the overall score.

13. A \$5.00 fee per student will accompany each student essay to help defray expenses. Checks should be made out to: GFWC of Kansas.

15. Refer to page 12 of the State Handbook for judging criteria.

The Great Sock Adventure By Kids for Kids

In August 2018, GFWC Classics continued its partnership with By Kids for Kids, and helped provide new outfits to 165 kindergarten and elementary students, to ensure that their school year gets off to a good start!

By Kids for Kids (BK4K) is a non-profit organization that was established by several Lawrence women, who wanted to teach their children that not all children are as fortunate as they are and that it is important to see the needs of others around them and feel empowered to be part of the solution. Their children quickly saw a need among their less fortunate classmates – new outfits with which to start the school semester. The children of the founding members and their friends began raising money and purchasing outfits and the mothers established BK4K and started the twice-yearly Clothing Events.

BK4K holds these clothing events or "Stores" in August, prior to the start of the fall school term, and November, in advance of the second term. The August store offers a selection of summer/warm weather clothing and the November Store offers long pants and long sleeved shirts. All outfits are brand new and provided to the kids at no cost to their families.

At the August 2018 Store, students from 10 Lawrence elementary schools were invited to "shop" for a new outfit. Each student is allowed to select his or her outfit (a top, shorts/skirt and a pair of socks), with the assistance of a "personal shopper", while their parents visit in the waiting area. The parents have final approval of the outfit, but are not involved in the selection of the clothes, in order to empower the children. Several Classic members and boosters volunteer as personal shoppers at each clothing event, and are rewarded with wonderful smiles when a child models his/her new outfit for their parents. For some of the children, this is the first time they have received a brand new outfit!

In 2016, GFWC Classics partnered with BK4K to provide girls and boys socks for their twice yearly clothing events. We started with the August 2016 Store and have continued to provide socks since then. For the August 2018 store, GWFC members contributed 249 pairs of boys' socks! Many of these socks were happily added to the boys' outfits for the fall school year. The rest of the socks will be available at the winter 2018 store. The Classics plan to add to the inventory of girls and boys socks prior to the Winter Store and help the kids shop for their new outfits during the event.

GFWC Goddard Woman's Club

The Goddard Woman's Club spent a portion of the summer working on 2 of their Signature Projects; Ronald McDonald House Charities and Books and Blankets – Student Crisis Support.

On July 16th a group of members cooked sausage manicotti and strawberry cheesecake at the Sleepy Hollow House, located next to Wesley Medical Centre. On August 3rd, another group cooked chicken enchiladas and peach cobbler at the Mid-Town House located close to St. Francis hospital. Families are stronger when they are together. The houses allow the burden to be lessened by ensuring families are close to their child while they receive medical support.



On July 11th and 26th an additional group of clubwomen came together and completed 17 double-sided fleece blankets. Additional

blankets have been completed since those early summer workshop dates. All the recent blankets (22) have been distributed to two specific storage closets in USD265, where all the school counselors have access to blankets, books, bags, journals, pens and inspirational painted rocks provided by the clubwomen. When a need arises as determined by the counselor; loss of parent/sibling for example, the counselor can choose a blanket, several books, a painted rock, journal and pen for that student. We want that student to feel that they are supported by their community in their time of crisis.
