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Welcome to Bible Jeopardy!

Kids love playing games, and you love it when they stretch their minds to learn new facts. Both kids and their teachers will love this game of Bible Jeopardy. Kids' parents will love it also!

Combine the age groups!

This game contains sets of both hard and easier Jeopardy-like questions. Thus, you and your students can have fun by combining age groups or generations in play. The game makes for great entertainment when the eating is done at pot luck suppers. It also makes a great fundraiser when players get sponsors, and friends and family buy tickets to attend. Finally, the game works great in Sunday school when you are between lessons or simply want to help kids improve their Bible knowledge. Get their minds working while they're having fun!

It's a lot like TV Jeopardy

If you watch Jeopardy on television, you'll recognize our formula. Our questions are in the form of statements and the answers are in the form of questions. It has a very authentic feel!

However, we have rules set up for accumulating points as opposed to dollars, and we also are keeping it simple. We don't have the point-counting difficulties of "double jeopardy," though you can add this if you want, using our questions and doubling the points in a round. Questions increase in point value in each category, as they also in-



crease a little in difficulty.

The easy structure will enable you to add on anything that you choose!

What's included?

We have included two complete rounds of Bible Jeopardy for children, plus another two for adults. That's 120 questions and answers total! The questions are broken down into the following six Jeopardy-like categories, all having to do with the Bible:

- Places
- Heroes & Renegades
- Miracles
- Books of the Bible
- Angels & Demons
- End Times

Where appropriate, we have included the Bible book, chapter and verse in the question. That way, if you want to give students a chance to look up the question before answering, your students are provided with another chance to learn from the Bible.

To Make it Easy

In the first round, we have included the actual questions with the statements in case people need to get used to the game. An example is this:

2 Points:

This garden is the very first recorded in the Bible! It is thought to have been located somewhere inside the modern-day country of Iraq. (*Which garden?*)



A: What is Eden?

Jeopardy is like riding a bike – before kids know it, they will automatically be answering in question format and understanding what part of the statement requires the answer.

While some questions are designed to be difficult, others require common sense answers with just a little bit of thought. Kids will feel mentally challenged throughout without feeling overwhelmed.

Designed for Flexibility & Learning

If you want to mix up the ages, having kids play against adults, you can use both the adults' and kids' questions in the same game. Using the questions repeatedly doesn't hurt either! What players didn't get right the last time, they will remember the next time – and hopefully they will know the material for life after hearing the questions a few times.

The game is designed to meet your needs, be it after-dinner fun at the potluck, a fundraiser, or a way to put good time to use in Sunday school. It will help kid's stretch their knowledge of the Bible and show off a little prowess in what they do know. Even the best Christian adults find that facts about their faith can slip into a fog after a while, and this game is a great way to get it all in workable condition again.

Just have a great time and watch your students gain pride along with facts about the Bible. It's a quick, easy, economical, and fun way of learning for kids of all ages!



Rules for Bible Jeopardy

General information

Each round of Bible Jeopardy presents 6 categories, in which there are 5 questions. The questions ascend in point value as they get more difficult. The easiest question will be worth 2 points. The most difficult question will be worth 10 points.

Generally speaking, 2 rounds make up 1 game. (However you can make 1 round equal 1 game to save time or keep distractions to a minimum.) You are provided here with 4 rounds: 2 easy rounds, plus 2 harder rounds that follow the same categories as the easy ones.

This formatting allows students of all ages (including youth ministers and staff!) to participate in a game.

The Objective of Bible Jeopardy

The objective is to be the player who accumulates the most points by the end of a game by answering questions correctly.

But it is also our goal to help your students learn important facts about Christianity and to expand their knowledge of Bible verses. In many cases, we have included the Bible book, chapter and verse in the Jeopardy question so that you can give students time to look them up if you so wish. Keep a copy or eCopy of the Bible handy if you wish to make learning and Bible look-ups a big part of the game.



The Flexibility of the Rounds

The order in which you use the rounds is quite flexible. If a game is 2 rounds, you can use the more difficult set of questions on the same categories as the 2nd round. Or you can use the easier questions on other categories as the 2nd round. Arrange these in any way you think your particular students would learn best. Students who are new to the Bible could get discouraged with the more difficult questions, and learned students could rack up too many points using the easy questions.

People You Will Need

- Score keeper
- Host
- 2 - 4 players

The host must be given a copy of the questions for that round. She will read questions as players request their corresponding category and point value.

The scorekeeper must do two things:

- Keep watch for the order in which hands are raised when players feel they know an answer.
- Remove questions from the wall as they are answered and put them in piles for each player.

Preparation is Easy

You simply print out the round or rounds of Bible jeopardy that you want to use and tape the first set of 36 tiles to a wall. It will include the categories and the point value tiles, 2, 4, 6, 8 and 10 of each category. You are then ready to begin.



How the Game is Played

To start the game: The host will jot down a number between 1 and 15. The players each guess a number. The player that comes closest to the number the host was thinking will be the first player to start the game.

A player must start by requesting a 2-point question in any category of his or her choosing. Example: "Holidays for 2-points, please."

The host will then read the question that goes with that category and point value. The questions will be in statement form. Example: "Jesus' mother went by this name."

As players believe they know the answer, they should quickly raise a hand.

The scorekeeper should be watching closely and call on the first player to raise a hand.

That player should say the answer *in question form*. Example: "Who is Mary?"

If the player gives the correct answer, the scorekeeper takes down the wall tile that corresponds with the category and point value. She will put the wall tile in a pile for that player.

If the player doesn't answer correctly, players who think they know should quickly raise their hands. The scorekeeper will call on the first player to raise a hand. That player will have a chance to answer correctly.

A player who fails to answer in question form loses 1 point but may keep the correct answer. The scorekeeper should write a -1 on the corresponding wall tile for that player.

Often, scriptures and verses are provided in the Jeopardy question. Example: Romans 3:23 says that all people have done this not-so-great thing in their lives." (Answer: *What is sinned?*) If you want to include Bible lookups as part of the game, provide each



student with a Bible. If nobody knows the answer to a question with a scripture, say, "You may look up now."

This is sort of like the time in Final Jeopardy when the producers play the theme song and players get to write their answers down. You are giving your players time to look things up. (If you are musical, *hum the Jeopardy song twice through while students look up the verse!*) Stop when you feel the time is sufficient and have the scorekeeper pick the first hand raised.

Continue on in this fashion until the question is either answered correctly or all players have missed or defaulted.

The player who answers the question correctly gets to choose the next question and category.

Players may not skip point values. If the last question answered had a 2-point value, the question they must ask for in the category of their choosing must have a 4-point value.

When the board is entirely cleared of questions, the score keeper will count the points in each player's pile of correctly answered questions and announce a winner.

If there is a Tie

There are no Daily Doubles in Bible Jeopardy, but there are tie-breakers. In the case of a tie, the host will bring forward the players with the tied scores. She will read from the Tie Breaker Questions, which are Bible verses.

Players will quickly raise their hands as if they know the book, chapter or verse. Example: "All have sinned; all fall short of the glory of God."



The scorekeeper will call on the first player to raise his or her hand. That player will get 1 point for knowing the Book (Romans), 1 point for knowing the chapter (3), and 1 point for knowing the verse (23).

A player needn't know all three to raise a hand. Feeling he knows the book will suffice.

When the player has guessed, the host will read the scripture again along with the book, chapter and verse. Example: "All have sinned; all fall short of the glory of God. Romans 3:23."

The player will collect 1 to 3 points, depending on how much he knew.

The host will then read the next scripture and let the other player in the tie identify a book, chapter, and verse.

Keep adding the points of those involved in the tie until the tie is broken.

If You Want a Round 2

For a Round 2, use the winner of the first round as "the person to beat." Other players may be new if you have enough students, or keep the same players.

Use Round 2 questions at your discretion. We have provided a couple of options. You can increase the difficulty of the questions, using a more difficult round that involves the same categories. Or you can use easy questions that involve new categories.

Your use depends largely on your students. If you feel they would grow frustrated with more difficult questions, use the Round 2 of easier questions. If they are enthused and well versed, use the harder questions in the same categories to build confidence.



Winners

Winner can receive prizes at your discretion. You might consider not only offering a prize to the student who accumulates the most points, but here are some other ideas:

- Students who did the most Bible look ups
- Students who did the look-ups fastest
- Students who tried hardest
- Students who overcame shyness in order to be a player
- Student who beat the Youth Minister

10 Points:

John the Baptist did his work in this body of water, according to John 1:28, where Jesus appeared two days in a row. (Which body of water?)

A: What is the Jordan River?

2 Points:

This city was prophesied in Micah 5:2 to be the birthplace of the Messiah, and Micah turned out to be correct. (Which city?)

A: What is Bethlehem?

4 Points:

When Jesus was under two years old, his father Joseph had a nightmare that Jesus was in grave danger of being killed. According to Matthew 2:14, he took Jesus and his mother Mary to this country. (What is the country?)

A: What is Egypt?

6 Points:

After spending 40 years roaming the desert, Israel finally found a homeland by attacking this city, after the famed city walls came tumbling down. (What is the city?)

A: What is Jericho?

8 points:

Experts say there has probably been more bloodshed over this Biblical city than any other place on planet earth. (Which city?)

A: What is Jerusalem?

10 Points:

This legendary place, written about by King David in Psalm 18:5, is for the dead, and it is shadowy and not much fun. (Which fabled place?)

A: What is Sheol?

2 points:

In the first chapter of Jonah, Jonah was told to go to a certain city, and when he tried to run from God, God delivered him there in the belly of a fish.

A: What is Nineveh?

4 points:

This province, containing both the town of Nazareth and a sea by the same name, is where Jesus was raised after returning from Egypt.

A: What is Galilee?

6 points:

The Apostle Paul was blinded, then spoken to by Jesus on this famed road, alluded to in Acts 9.

A: What is the Road to Damascus?

8 points:

While he was still known as Saul, the Apostle Paul was also known by this place, from which he hailed. He was Saul of....

A: What is Tarsus?

10 points:

Streets in Jerusalem are often still known as "via's." This famous via is where Christ carried his cross to the site of his crucifixion.

A: What is the Via Dolorosa?

2 points:

Along with Gomorrah, God rained brimstone on this community for their hedonistic ways, saving only the families of Lot and Abraham, according to Genesis 19.

A: What is Sodom?

4 points:

A queen from this affluent nation traveled far to question King Solomon, as recorded in 1 Kings 10. She arrived with so many gifts and jewels that the famous question is still raised to materialistic women: "Who do you think you are? The queen of....?"

A: What is Sheba?

6 points:

Genesis 12:5-6 shows God pointing Abraham to the land of his descendants, which was known at the time as by this name and now contains Jerusalem.

A: What is the Land of Canaan?

8 points:

Strange and wonderful things have happened on this Mount, including God giving Moses the Ten Commandments there according to Exodus 20.

A: What is Mount Sinai?

10 points:

There had been centuries of strife between the Jews and a certain people inhabiting the Northern Kingdom of Israel, which is the why the disciples were stunned when Jesus spoke to a woman at a well who hailed from there in John 4.

A: What is Samaria?

2 points:

The man was created from the dust of the earth, and the woman was created from one of his ribs.

A: Who were Adam & Eve?

4 points:

This man may have spent a hundred years building a craft big enough to carry several of every species of animal, protecting them from annihilation.

A: Who was Noah?

6 points:

This man was eighty years old when he started on an incredible journey to free the Hebrew people from their Egyptian slave masters.

A: Who was Moses?

8 points:

This Bible hero is known as the Father of the Nation of Israel and followed God's command in Genesis 17 to create a nation in a new land.

A: Who was Abraham?

10 points:

This Old Testament prophet was taken by God up to heaven instead of dying. And, centuries later, He appeared with Moses and Jesus at the Transformation.

A: Who is Elijah?

2 points:

He came before Jesus and swore that he was not worthy to untie Jesus' sandals in John 1:27.

A: Who was John the Baptist?

4 points:

This famous servant of Christ's was transformed from a murderer of early Christians to a writer of 14 books in the New Testament.

A: Who is the Apostle Paul?

6 points:

This man was the second king of Israel, but is probably best known for slaying a Philistine soldier with only a three stones and something akin to a slingshot in 1 Samuel 17.

A: Who was David?

8 points:

He almost didn't marry his bride, thinking she must have committed adultery instead of believing she had gotten pregnant via the Holy Spirit.

A: Who was Joseph?

10 points:

He was not only Jesus' first disciple, but he was also the first to state a belief that Jesus was the son of God and the Messiah in Matthew 16.

A: Who was Simon Peter?

Round #1: Adults (or harder)

2 points:

The older brother of Moses, this man was also considered a prophet.

A: Who was Aaron?

4 points:

Simon Peter's brother, this fellow disciple, actually introduced Simon Peter to the Lord in John 1.

A: Who was Andrew?

6 points:

Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego, in Daniel 3, make a believer out of this King of Babylon after surviving the heat of the fiery furnaces.

A: Who is Nebuchadnezzar?

8 points:

This major prophet is often thought of as having been depressed because of his accusatory tone and (big clue:) lamenting.

A: Who was the prophet Jeremiah?

10 points:

This minor prophet is best known for predicting that Christ's arrival would be preceded by a second arrival of the prophet Elijah. He also wrote the last book in the Old Testament.

A: Who is Malachi?

Round #2: Adults (or harder)

2 points:

Mentioned in the Bible only once, in Isaiah 14, this well-known master demon is said to have fallen out of heaven.

A: Who is Lucifer?

4 points:

This double-crossing woman in Judges 16 cost Samson his strength. She duped him into telling her that he'd be rendered powerless if his hair were ever cut.

A: Who was Delilah?

6 points:

Considered the wisest man in the Bible, this man lost his faith and turned away from God in the end of his life, according to 1 Kings 11.

A: Who is Solomon?

8 points:

This son of Abraham was almost sacrificed to God, except that God himself interceded, according to Genesis 22.

A: Who is Isaac?

10 points:

This woman in The Revelation shares the name of the evil, idolatrous wife of King Ahab during the days of Elijah. Revelation 2 has her leading the church of Thyatira into sin.

A: Who is Jezebel?

Round #1: Children (or easier)

2 points:

This is considered the greatest miracle surrounding Christ's years on earth and is the nucleus of Christian belief in Jesus.

A: What is the Resurrection?

4 points:

Christ once multiplied fishes and loaves for a crowd of this many people, according to Matthew 14.

A: What is 5,000?

6 points:

To help create this miracle, Moses had to hold up his hands twice, on either side of the sea – once to open the sea and once to close it back up.

A: What is the parting of the Red Sea?

8 points:

According to Luke 8, Jesus raised Jairus' 12-year-old daughter from the dead and told her parents to give her some of this.

A: What is food?

10 points:

This was Jesus' first miracle, which happened at a wedding in Cana in John 2.

A: What is changing water into wine?

Round #2: Children (or easier)

2 points:

Most people think God appeared to Moses in the burning bush. But according to Exodus 3, Moses saw this type of creature – and not God himself.

A: What is an angel?

4 points:

A prophet refused to go to Nineveh to speak to the people about their great sins. He was thrown into a tempestuous sea after the mariners discovered he had been disobedient to his God, according to this book in the Bible.

A: What is Jonah?

6 points:

Seven of these were cast upon Egypt before Pharaoh's heart was softened sufficiently to let the Hebrew people go.

A: What are the Plagues of Egypt?

8 points:

Some scientists say this miracle never could have happened; however Christian scientists see plenty of evidence that this one miracle affected the whole earth.

A: What is the Great Flood?

10 points:

Joshua asked God for this miracle in Joshua 10 and, thanks to it, he was able to lead his army to fight the Amorites for twenty-four hours.

A: What is the sun standing still in the sky?

2 points:

History reveals only three periods on planet earth that saw great miracles. Along with the time of Moses and the time of Elijah, there was this period.

A: What is the time of Christ?

4 points:

After hearing the people complain bitterly, Moses used his staff to tap on a rock, in Numbers 20, and bring forth this item that was requested from the people.

A: What is water?

6 points:

There is a miracle in Numbers 22 that details an animal speaking like a human. This animal was a....

A: What is an ass or donkey?

8 points:

Shadrach Meshach and Abednego were supposed to be tortured and killed by this device in Daniel 3 after they refused to bow down to Nebuchadnezzar's golden image.

A: What is a fiery furnace?

10 points:

This was the last miracle of Jesus' during his time on planet earth, and it is still celebrated today as a Catholic and Christian remembrance day.

A: What is the Ascension?

2 points:

Jesus calmed a storm at sea by saying only these three words in Mark 4:39.

A: What is "Peace be still?"

4 points:

A mighty wind roared around the disciples and they began to speak in other languages on this particular day recorded in Acts 2.

A: What is the Day of Pentecost?

6 points:

According to John 18, Jesus performed this miracle on a servant in the Garden of Gethsemane after one of his disciples got a bit overzealous with his sword.

A: What is restoring an ear?

8 points:

When Jesus was tempted by the devil in the wilderness, he responded three times with arguments that started with these three words, according to Matthew 4:

A: What is 'It is written'?

10 points:

In Mark 8, Jesus healed one blind man by packing mud and spit on his eyes. When the man began to see, he told Jesus that people looked like these items in nature.

A: What are trees?

2 points:

This book contains the story of Noah's Ark and four generations of the family of Father Abraham.

A: What is Genesis?

4 points:

The first book in the New Testament, this was written by a fairly accomplished and history-loving Jewish man.

A: What is Matthew?

6 points:

Primarily written by King Solomon, this book is also known as The Book of Wisdom.

A: What is Proverbs?

8 points:

The second to the last line in this book is the famed, "He who testifies to these things says, 'Surely I am coming soon.' Amen. Come, Lord Jesus!"

A: What is Revelation?

10 points:

Some say this book contains our very first UFO sighting. Others say the writer simply saw "A wheel of God, way in the middle of the air!"

A: What is Ezekiel

2 points:

Though Jesus had already ascended into heaven, this book covering his apostles' ministries.

A: What is Acts?

4 points:

This scripture reads, "God so loved the world that he gave his only Begotten Son, that whosoever should believe in him shall not perish, but have everlasting life."

A: What is John 3:16?

6 points:

The four first books of the New Testament, Matthew, Mark, Luke and John have one name that represents all of them.

A: What are the Gospels?

8 points:

This New Testament book contains a scripture often read at weddings, containing, "Now abideth faith, hope and love; but the greatest of these is love."

A: What is 1 Corinthians?

10 points:

The story of Moses is told herein, though other books have added to Moses' story.

A: What is Exodus?

2 points:

There are four major prophets in the Old Testament and this many minor prophets.

A: What is 12?

4 points:

This book is famous for many salvation scriptures, including this one: "All have sinned; all fall short of the glory of God."

A: What is the Book of Romans?

6 points:

Some say Moses wrote all five of these first books in the Bible, which are known by one name:

A: What is the Pentateuch?

8 points:

This Old Testament Book was named after the sacred priest who anointed both King Saul and King David, and it contains the story of his mother, Hannah.

A: What is 1 Samuel?

10 points:

Things are not always as they appear, especially concerning the order in which they appear. Some say this is the oldest book in the Bible.

A: What is the Book of Job?

2 points:

The Seventh Commandment does not actually say, "Do not lie." Rather, it says this:

A: What is "Do not bear false witness against thy neighbor"?

4 points:

This major prophet made the most prophecies about the coming of Christ.

A: Who is Isaiah?

6 points:

This New Testament epistle was written by the brother of the man many consider to be Jesus' favorite disciple. What would the book's name be?

A: What is James?

8 points:

These two books in the Old Testament were named after the women they featured.

A: Who are Esther and Ruth?

10 points:

The word "rapture" is not found in our Bible. However one scripture so closely describes it that many Christians believe, and it is found in this book.

A: What is 1 Thessalonians? (4:16-18)

Round #1: Children (or easier)

2 points:

Most people think this creature from the Garden of Eden was actually the devil in disguise, even though Genesis 3 never mentions the devil or demons directly.

A: What is a snake?

4 points:

According to John 20, this woman went to the tomb of the risen Christ to find two angels seated, one where Christ's feet had been and one where his head had been.

A: Who was Mary Magdalene?

6 points:

The angels that came to visit these two disgusting towns looked like men, and in Genesis 19 they helped Lot's and Abraham's families to safety.

A: What are Sodom and Gomorrah?

8 points:

God posted angels outside the Garden of Eden after the fall to guard this particular item found inside, according to Genesis 3.

A: What is the tree of life?

10 points:

In Mark 5:1-15, Jesus casts a legion of spirits out of a tormented man and into these animals.

A: What are swine?

Round #2: Children (or easier)

2 points:

In Luke 1, the angel Gabriel appeared to this young woman saying, "Do not be afraid...for you have found favor with God."

A: Who is Mary, Mother of Jesus?

4 points:

The only people in the Bible known to have seen a multitude of heavenly hosts, singing and praising God, were these men in Luke 2. The angels were announcing that Jesus had been born.

A: Who were Shepherds?

6 points:

In 2 Cor. 11:14, this Biblical bad guy is said to disguise himself as an "angel of light."

A: Who is Satan?

8 points:

In 1 Peter 5, Peter encourages his brethren to be alert and sober minded, because their adversary the Devil roams about like this sort of animal.

A: What is a (roaring) lion?

10 points:

This archangel appeared to Zachariah in Luke 1 to tell him that he would be the father of John the Baptist.

A: Who is the Angel Gabriel?

Round #1: Adults (or Harder)

2 points:

When Satan proposed to God that his servant Job should be tested, God said Satan could do anything to Job except for this one thing.

A: What is Do not touch him?

4 points:

In Mark 9, Jesus casts out a spirit out the disciples had been unable to exorcise. Jesus gave the reason, saying that certain demons can come out only with these two practices.

A: What are prayer and fasting?

6 points:

This famous Psalm about God's protection contains the line, "For God will give his angels charge of you, to guard you in all your ways."

A: What is Psalm 91?

8 points:

An angel of the Lord is said to have opened the doors of the prison in Acts 5 to let the disciples out, and he told them to go preach the gospel in this very public place.

A: What are the temple courts?

10 points:

In 2 Samuel 24, an angel plagued Israel because of this sin that David committed. The sin had to do with trusting in numbers rather than trusting in the Lord.

A: What is counting troops?

Round #2: Adults (or Harder)

2 points:

In James 4:7, the apostle encourages followers to resist the devil, because then this will happen.

A: What is “He will flee from you”?

4 points:

In 1 Kings 19, Elisha the Prophet is fleeing from a woman known by this name, also the wife of King Ahab. An angel gives Elijah food and drink to help Him escape the woman’s wrath.

A: Who is Jezebel?

6 points:

In the Book of Jude, this archangel was lauded for not arguing with the devil, but rather saying, “Lord rebuke thee.”

A: Who is Michael?

8 points:

Acts 10:22 says that Cornelius was directed by a holy angel to summon this very threatening Jewish man to his house and to hear what he had to say.

A: Who is Peter?

10 points:

In Ephesians 4:26-27, the Apostle Paul encourages us to do several things: “In your anger do not sin: Do not let the sun go down while you are still angry, and do not give the devil” this particular thing.

A: What is a foothold? (Or opportunity?)



Topic #6: End Times

Round #1: Children (or easier)

2 points:

This book in the New Testament is primarily about the Apocalypse.

A: What is the Book of Revelation?

4 points:

In Revelation 20, it is stated that in order to be brought into heaven, your name needs to be found in this book.

A: What is the Book of Life?

6 points:

In Revelation 22:13, Jesus referred to himself with two opposite and opposing words that mean "first and last" in English. In Greek, they are this:

A: What are Alpha and Omega?

8 points:

The dragon that opens Revelation 13 is particularly ferocious, bearing 10 horns and 7 of these.

A: What are heads?

10 points:

These two Old Testament books contain many images and passages that mirror those in the New Testament Book of Revelation.

A: What are the Books of Daniel and Ezekiel?



Topic #6: End Times

Round #2: Children (or easier)

2 points:

Jesus said that his return would be such a surprise to so many people that he compared it to the days of this man from the Old Testament, who survived the world's first major natural disaster.

A: Who was Noah?

4 points:

The Revelation was written by a man of this name, whom some think was also Jesus' favorite disciple.

A: Who was John?

6 points:

In Matthew 24:24, Jesus said that many false prophets would arise in the end and deceive many, because they are able to perform these things.

A: What are signs and wonders?

8 points:

In Matthew 24, the disciples asked Jesus about the end of time, and the first thing he said was to "see to it that no one deceives you. For many will come in my name, saying I am" this particular thing.

A: What is the Messiah?

10 points:

The second thing Jesus answered when his disciples asked about the end times, in Matthew 24, was that we would hear about these and rumors of these. What are "these?"

A: What are wars?



Topic #6: End Times

Round #1: Adults (or harder)

2 points:

Often said to be the devil's number, this number is associated vaguely and mysteriously with the Antichrist in Revelation 13.

A: What is 666?

4 points:

Some people think the end-times terminology "time, times and half a time" from Daniel 12 actually means this many years.

A: What is three-and-a-half?

6 points:

Revelation 17 portrays a hideous and violent woman who was drunk on the blood of these people.

A: Who are the saints?

8 points:

Daniel 12:4 predicts that a certain thing will be increased at the end of times, which seems to correspond with computers, electricity, air planes and the Internet.

A: What is knowledge?

10 points:

In Revelation 6, Jesus releases four beings who ride on four horses that are, respectively, white, red, black and pale, symbolizing conquest, war, famine and this last thing.

A: What is death?



Topic #6: End Times

Round #2: Adults (or harder)

2 points:

It has long been believed that the last battle of the world will be this one.

A: What is the Battle of Armageddon?

4 points:

1 Timothy 4:1 states that in the latter times, some shall depart from the faith, giving heed to seducing spirits and doctrines of these creatures.

A: What are devils?

8 points:

According to Revelation 21, in the new heavens and new earth there will no longer be this life source that mankind has always relied upon heavily.

A: What is the sea?

6 points:

In the New Jerusalem described in Revelation 21, these two great light sources will not be needed.

A: What are the sun and moon?

10 points:

John began the Book of Revelation with epiphanies or messages to this number of churches.

A: What is seven?



Tie Breakers or Final Jeopardy Rounds

Final Jeopardy will be identifying famous Bible verses, by naming the book, chapter and verse, such as "James 1:5." To garnish points, players should at least be able to name the Book in the Bible from which the scripture comes. Set points according to your desired level of difficulty.

For Children:

Scripture: God so loved the world that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever should believe in him will not perish, but have everlasting life.

A: What is John 3:16?

Scripture: In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God.

A: What is John 1:1?

Scripture: In the beginning, God created the heavens and the earth.

A: What is Genesis 1:1?

Scripture: For it is by grace you have been saved, through faith--and this is not from yourselves, it is the gift of God—

A: What is Ephesians 2:8?

Scripture: Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.

A: What is Matthew 5:3?



For Adults:

Scripture: But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, forbearance, kindness, goodness, faithfulness,

A: What is Galatians 5:22?

Scripture: If I speak in the tongues of men or of angels, but do not have love, I am only a resounding gong or a clanging cymbal.

A: What is 1 Corinthians 13:1?

Scripture: Blessed is the man who does not walk in the way of the ungodly, nor stand in the path of sinners, nor sit where the scornful and mockers gather.

A: What is Psalm 1:1?

Scripture: He which testifieth these things sayeth surely I come quickly.

A: What is Revelation 22:20?

Scripture: Beloved, let us love one another; for everyone who loves is born of God and knows God. He who does not love does not know God, for God is love.

A: What is 1 John 4:7-8?

Scripture: He will cover you with his feathers, and under his wings you will find refuge; his faithfulness will be your shield and rampart.

A: What is Psalm 91:4?

Scripture: All have sinned; all fall short of the Glory of God.

A: What is Romans 3:23?
