


Inspiring a love of reading through author links

- To develop an understanding of how the scheme can work in your own school.




FACTS AND FIGURES!

- Did you know...
 - One in five children have never been read to by their parents
 - Only one in seven have been read to by their dad
 - One third of children do not own a book
 - The bulk of children worldwide now only read because they are being told to, rather than because they want to


WHAT IS A PATRON OF READING?

- A Patron of Reading is a school's special, designated children's author with whom the school forms a personal attachment.
- The author might be a writer of fiction, a writer of non-fiction, a poet, a storyteller, a graphic novelist or an illustrator.
- They will work with the school for a period of approximately three years to raise the profile of reading for pleasure with pupils, parents and staff.



WHAT DOES A PATRON DO?

- The title is extremely flexible to suit each school and each patron, but here a few possible ideas:
- Visit the school regularly (at least once every year).
- Write a blog or newsletter about books they are reading, their own work, book awards, etc.
- Support the Summer Reading Challenge (or any other reading challenge).
- Donate (a couple of) copies of any new books to the school library.
- Share any new ideas they hear regarding reading, books and libraries.
- Interact with pupils and parents on the school's website or the author's website.
- Occasionally write to pupils who do something outstanding in terms of reading (eg make amazing progress, win a competition, etc).





WHAT DOES THE SCHOOL DO?

- This varies hugely from school to school, but suggestions include:
- Book the author for a school visit (at least once a year).
- Add a link to the author's website on the school site.
- Promote the scheme in school newsletters, online and to the local media.
- Read the author's books and send them feedback.
- Put up a display about the author in the school.
- Have a special area in the library displaying the author's work.




















Brownlow Book Week 2015!

- Visit from Mike to launch
- Whole school assemblies
- Year group workshops
- Classroom drop-ins

SNEAK PREVIEWS OF NEW BOOKS!

- Exclusive reading
- Understanding of how books are created
- Awe and wonder that this person "really made that book... with the pictures and everything!"
- Feedback for the author... children say what they do and don't like!



AUTHOR AS A CHILD READER

- Important that children see the author as a reader
- Patron shares the books they enjoyed during their own childhood!

TAILORED WORKSHOPS

- Carefully planned in line with School Development Plan
- Data analysis to identify vulnerable groups;
 - Less able boys
 - Pupil premium girls and boys
 - Reluctant writers
 - Gifted and talented writers




TEA WITH THE PATRON!

- A less threatening way for most reluctant readers
- An open forum for more able children to ask questions and get to grips with what an author does



BOOK DOCTOR

• Reluctant readers get recommendations from Patron about books they might like to read!





ANNUAL READING AWARDS!

- Book Day award ceremony; reading challenge for whole school!
- Children to read and review books collaboratively – focused on specific authors, genres.
- Children nominate their own favourite books for an award!
- Vote for favourite books and Patron awards prizes at whole school ceremony!
- Dress for the occasion!



PATRON OF READING PRIZE

- Annual award for the most dedicated reader in each class
- Author presents at the end of the Summer term... if not in person then via a recorded message to be shown in assembly!
- Parents invited into assembly as a surprise for the winning child!



READING ROCKS

- Challenge children and parents to read three times a week at home.
- Every three reads wins them a 'reading rock' for the class jar
- Each term the rocks are counted and the winning class all receive a book to keep!
- Keep an online record of leader board via school website
- Motivational messages from Patron via video link or email messages!




NAME A CHARACTER COMPETITION!

- Author gives children a summary of new book and perhaps a draft illustration
- Challenge to name the character!
- Winner has their name used in the story!



BOOK DEDICATION!

- A book dedicated to the children of the school!
- Book signing in school for parents and children!



A BOOK OF THE CHILDREN'S WORK

- Fundraising for the school library
- Children's work
 published into school
 book with introduction
 written by the Patron
- Engages children and parents and promotes the value of reading and writing!



TAKE OVER THE LOCAL LIBRARY!

- Work with librarians at local library to enable school reading champions to run the library for a day (few hours!)
- Invite Patron to run with children
- Promote in school to encourage parents to take their children to the library!





SUMMER READING CHALLENGE!



TROLLEY OF AWESOMENESS!

- A display of books that are 'too good to be a on a shelf"
- Displayed in entrance to school, together with children's reviews of the books
- Books selected by the Patron for each term, together with a review of why it was selected






PARENT WORKSHOPS

- Author and staff copresent to promote the importance of reading for pleasure!
- Modelling how to share stories effectively
- Develops confidence and understanding of why reading matters
- Engages parents, just as it does children!



MAINTAINING MOMENTUM

- One key contact within the school
- Link to the school action plan
- Reflect on individual and small group needs
- Partnership working!



WHAT THE CHILDREN THINK!


