The program was provided by Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Lawson concerning a shelling trip to Bonaire. Many positive comments were forthcoming as the program included many color slides.

25 Years Ago

The regular meeting of SSC was held on January 9, 1992. The treasurer's report showed a balance of \$6428.93.

Mollusk Fossil Hunting at Jackson Bluff Dam, FL

On November 5th, 2016 Mary Jo and I attended the Florida Paleontological middle of the Pliocene epoch. Society (FPS) meeting in Tallahassee, FL. One of the activities was a fossil trip to the Jackson Bluff Dam (photo 1). The





Photo 1: A map of the Jackson Bluff area

Jackson Bluff Dam was made in 1927 on the Ochlockonee River to produce electricity. The waters that were formed by this became known as Lake Talquin

Approximately 40 members of the FPS traveled 24 miles from Tallahassee to the dam site. Upon arrival members approached and dug on a wall approximately 50 feet long which was totally exposed Jackson Bluff Formation (photo 2). This material is known as the "Cancellara Zone" and is similar to what is found in Unit 7 of the Pinecrest Beds at the SMR fossil pit. What we found is approximately 3.6



Hunting mollusk fossils in this type of environment is completely different than most shell club members are used to. Instead of picking up shells on the surface and/or digging into shell piles where the samples are easily obtained, shells at the Jackson Bluff Dam have to be carefully removed from the matrix. Later that day FPS members converged upon the Florida Geological Survey building in Tallahassee. We were met by Harley Means, Assistant Florida State Geologist, who gave a tour of the new facility including a complete dugong skeleton mold—the original is in the Natural History Museum in Washington

The survey building had a limited display of fossil mollusks since most had migrated to the Invertebrate Paleontology Department of the University of Florida in Gainesville. One interesting display was a case which housed echinoid fossils where I found club member, Bernie Peterson, inspecting and admiring.

The geologic survey building was lined with a multitude of maps produced by the same organization-Mary Jo loves maps and took time to study many of them The maps included sinkhole locations; topographical levels of many of Florida's counties and many other aspects of geologic formations. We were also able to see the thousands of samples of core drillings that have been taken through the state. Some core samples exceed 1,900 feet. In the photo are just ten feet of a core



sample—that means the survev houses 190 boxes for this one site.

The next

day we returned home to face the daunting buckets of shells we found.

Remember Jeremy, the **Left-Handed Snail?**

Luckily, Jeremy found a friend in Angus Davison of the University of Nottingham, who is working with a team to find out what gene creates this one in 100.000 anomaly. One of the best ways to do this is to study Jeremy's offspring. But first the snail has to have offspring, which requires another counterclockwise snail.



To find a mate for the lovelorn snail, Davison asked the public for help on Twitter, attaching the hashtag #snaillove to his plea.

"We didn't really know how big a hope it would be, or the chances of success, to find one," Davison told NPR about his "shellebrity." "But it worked — we found two."

The two lucky ladies belong to snail enthusiasts who saw the tweet; one is named Lefty and is the pet of an Ipswich. U.K., woman, and the other was found by a snail farmer in Majorca, Spain, who discovered the rarity in a pile of snails about to be cooked.

So far, Jeremy has just met Lefty. The pair seems to be on the road to mating, a bizarre process for snails.

Snail mating first starts with some flirtatious biting, followed by "traumatic insemination," in which each snail stabs the other with "love darts." Once Jeremy and Lefty (hopefully) mate, the research team is interested in seeing if they will task of cleaning and identifying the four produce counterclockwise-shelled "children."
