Article V Dues

Currently:

The annual dues are:

- (A) \$50.00 per person.
- (B). Prorated dues: new membership dues will be prorated
- (C). Late fees \$10.00

Proposed: Increase of \$10 per year for annual dues

The annual dues are:

- (A) \$60.00 per person.
- (B). Prorated dues: new membership dues will be prorated
- (C). Late fees \$10.00

Article XIII

Benefits

Currently:

Section 1. The following benefits are available for use by club members in good standing only.

- a. Rental of club and other rental components will be available at reduced prices after the member has attained 1 full year of membership in good standing. During the 1-year
 - probationary period, full rental prices will be paid.
 - b. Use of the club equipment free of charge.
 - c. Cost of functions at member price.
 - d. Free of charge annual Christmas Party.

e. When a member in good standing (or a member of their immediate family) passes away, the family will have the use of the club after the funeral at no charge as long as the club is not rented.

RSVP Changes and Email Communications




Our Membership is growing, which is a good thing, but it is making it a necessity to change some of our guidelines for attending events/dinners.

Going forward, our events will have a maximum of 96 attendees (including the kitchen staff) or sometimes less depending on the event. For example, if we are having a DJ or a band, we might have to pare down the maximum to 80 to allow room for band set up, equipment, etc. Please understand this is for the safety and comfort of everyone attending.

All of our events will now have an RSVP stipulation of number of attendees or a cut off date, whichever comes first. Since the attendance can fill up quickly, we are advising that you do not wait until the last minute to RSVP if you want to participate. If you find the event is closed when you RSVP, we can put you on a list to be called if there are cancellations.

This is a reminder to check your spam/junk folders for email communications and **EVITE emails.** Periodically, a communication can be detected as junk from your internet carrier because so many people are being sent the communication at one time.

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A LIFE WELL-LIVED Member Spotlight: Ann Barni

Who is this world traveler who traversed the planet...from Alaska to Hawaii? From Sicily to Sardinia and the Greek Islands? From the Caribbean south to Panama and east to Hong Kong? And naturally her favorite spot, Bella Italia? A history buff, she bought a CD at age 16 for a trip to China. Five decades later when she visited the Great Wall and Terracotta Soldiers, her dream finally came true!

This adventurous gal is Lifetime Member of our Italian American Club, ANN CONSTANTINE BARNI.

Ann hails from an ethnic suburb of Pittsburgh, the first child in her large Italian family born in the US. Always bilingual, she spoke their native tongue to her parents, English to her siblings. Ann admits that her mother was her greatest influence. Mama insisted that her "Mericana" daughter learn to read and write in Italian, sending her to the Lodge for instruction. Ann knows all the lyrics to those lovely folksongs that her Neapolitan mother sang to her as a child. Lucky IAC folks enjoy her "O Solo Mio" at club sing-a-longs.

A mother of two boys, Ann found herself a single mother after 16 years of marriage. She went to work as a department store clerk. Through hard work and eagerness to succeed, Ann rose to the position of shoe buyer for thirteen branches. When she married Leo Barni, the couple decided to move to Jacksonville where her eldest sister lived. Ann says, "I belonged to an Italian club since I was 21, and was thrilled to discover our club."

Ann has been a dedicated club member since the 1970's, serving on various committees and as Secretary for many years. When the board encouraged her to run for IAC president, she refused. "They weren't ready for a woman president back then," Ann laughs and says, "but I'm glad we have a good one now!" Some of her favorite times were representing our club at Florida Federation of Italian Clubs and being the interpreter when Italian Navy ships docked in town.

When IAC was planning the expansion of our current building, the club had no collateral for a bank loan. Eighteen members signed a promissory note for the construction project including Ann and Leo. She admits, "We worked like Hell to raise the money"...dinners, dances, fund raisers, 4th of July celebrations downtown and making "tons of meatballs" at the canning kitchen.

An ardent love of all things Italian prompted four trips to the land of her ancestors. In Naples, Ann connected with La Famiglia and fell in love with her paisani. At age 80, this feisty lady attended a traditional Italian wedding of her *cugini*. Her mother shared love of the Sea and Ann was enchanted by the majestic Mediterranean. Living at Pablo Towers in Jacksonville Beach for 18 years, she says, "I thank God every day to look out my window and see the ocean."

Ann brags about her long-time involvement in IAC and membership in the local chapter of the Sons of Italy. When asked why it is important to make this connection she replies, "I feel camaraderie when I am with other Italians." Thanks, Ann Barni, for a life celebrating your Italian heritage and...for the mortgage-free clubhouse we enjoy today!

Best Hidden Gems in Italy

Umbria (OOM|bree|ah) is a region of central Italy. Umbria population is 900,000, area square miles is 3,265 and the capital is Perugia. It is the only region without a coastline or a border with another country. Umbria neighbors are: Tuscany to the west and the north, Marche to the east and Lazio to the south.

Umbria is known for its landscapes, traditions, history, culinary delights, artistic legacy, and influence on culture. The region is characterized by hills, mountains, valleys, and historical towns such as Perugia (known as an important university center),

Assisi (a World Heritage Site associated with St. Francis of Assisi), Gubbio, Spoleto, Orvieto and Todi. All the towns of Umbria are small. Farming in the hills and valleys is prosperous, producing wheat, corn (maize), potatoes, sugar beets, grapes, and olives. The wine of Orvieto is exceedingly popular throughout Italy.

Nature lovers will enjoy Umbria's unspoiled mountains and sparkling rivers. Country lanes that pass olive groves and flowercarpeted fields make nice walking paths all over the region. Lake Trasimeno is one of Italy's largest lakes, perfect for water skiing and boating. It also boasts three islands that can be reached by ferry.

Umbria is also Italy's spiritual center- famous as the birthplace of two of the world's most famous saints, St. Francis, and St. Benedict. In Assisi, you will want to visit the famous basilica of San Francesco. Frescoes by Giotto vividly tell the story of St. Francis's life. The birthplace of St Francis of Assisi, the creator of the order of the Friars Minor. Assisi is one of the most beautiful, peaceful spots in Italy. It should not be missed and is one of the most popular tourist destinations in the world.

Religious pilgrims have come here for centuries to see where St. Francis is buried and the Basilica of Santa Chiara (to see the tomb of St. Clare). Visit the Remo delle Carceri to see caves where medieval hermits withdrew from the world (you may find such solitude quite appealing).

Orvieto is a picturesque hillside town perched dramatically on top of enormous porous rock cliffs. Dating back to Etruscan times, Orvieto is split in two: the old-town hilltop and the new town at the base, connected by escalators and elevators, as well as a cable car (the most scenic form of transport). Sprinkled with ancient monuments, tombs, a large cemetery,

and a network of underground passageways dating back to the Middle Ages, there is much to uncover in this hillside town. Visit the 16th-century Saint Patrick's Well with its historic spiral staircase, discover ancient artifacts inside two archaeological museums, explore the Albornoz Fortress, and admire the Gothic Duomo Cathedral with its glittering, mosaic-adorned facade and impressive paintings done in watercolors on wet plaster.

Orvieto is everything a typical Italian town should be - quiet, unassuming, and blissfully traffic free. It is a popular location for shopping, dining and exploring the nearby vineyards for the finest Classico wines. You can browse

local handicrafts and ceramics along Via del Duomo and whatever you do, do not leave without admiring a view of the Umbrian valley from the Torre del Moro! Nestled within central Umbria, Perugia is the region's thriving capital. This picturesque Etruscan town is charminaly medieval, with a backdrop dominated by Italy's largest fortress, the Rocca Paolina. Believed to be older than Rome, Perugia lives up to


tain forms the centerpiece.

It is home to world-famous chocolatier, Perugia, creators of the legendary Baci chocolate kisses. 
