Eddy Care Teams Offer Comfort

"Wonderful, compassionate, caring." These are the words one of our parishioners Darlene used to describe the care team which helped with her mother who suffered from Alzheimer's. In fact, Darlene played a significant role in initiating a care team here at Immaculate Conception. After a friend told her about an article she had seen about care teams in the Evangelist, Darlene brought the idea to Rachel

Winters, Pastoral Care Coordinator, who was already visiting her mother, and Rachel worked with the Eddy to start a team here.

Sandy Monahan is the volunteer coordinator for the Eddy Alzheimer's care teams which have been in existence since

2002. In this position, Sandy helps to recruit, trains, and meets regularly with team members to discuss their work and plan for the coming weeks. Modeled on the Visiting Nurse AIDS care teams of the '90's, the goal is to train and organize volunteers who can help families with a loved one at home who has Alzheimer's. Notably, to emphasize the team approach and to put everyone on the same level playing field, the person with the disease is referred to as the "partner." With 75 different diagnoses producing some form of dementia, the need for services like this is significant.

Each team is made up of at least four members who agree to volunteer two or three hours every six weeks. Many of these volunteers have had personal experience with Alzheimer's. Training includes basic information about changes in the brain, dementia and the changes in behavior that it causes, and effective ways of communicating with the partner. The importance of confidentiality is stressed. Funded by grants from the State Department of Health, the program has a community focus and is set up to keep people at home although team members do continue to visit a partner who might be moved from the home to a memory care facility. There are currently twenty-four teams, most associated with churches, in the four counties of the Diocese.

When a family is dealing with a loved one suffering from Alzheimer's, managing the necessary 24-7 care is daunting. Statistics show that 40% of primary caregivers themselves eventually end up with some depression. Connecting with a care team becomes a lifeline. Sandy first goes to the home for the referral which she then brings to the team. Through regular meetings they will pursue a plan that will bring

> comfort and relief to the family and socialization and connectedness to the partner.

The team members perform non -direct care. They are companions, visiting with the partner at home or taking the partner out if possible. Although there is no medical component

to the work of the care team, care navigators are available through the Eddy when care in a facility or respite care is needed. In Darlene's case, team members often read to her mother, gave her snacks and would watch TV with her mom as well. Furthermore, rather than helping two or three hours every six weeks, the team members would come two or three hours a week, and in the last month of her mother's life, they often came without being asked.

Often volunteers say that they get more out of their volunteering than they give. This is evident with members of the care teams who support each other as well as the families, who become friends with each other and become like extended members of the families. Sandy calls them "extraordinary, compassionate people." Darlene has experienced the same power of the care team and she has become friends with the members who came into her home and helped with the care of her mother. In fact, Darlene has attended a couple of the care team meetings and has become a member of our care team herself.

Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults (RCIA) Schedules a "Meet & Greet"

The mission of RCIA is to help guide seekers along their faith journey, teach them about our Catholic faith and assist them in receiving the Sacraments of Initiation (Baptism, First Eucharist and Confirmation) enabling them to be full members of our Catholic faith and our wonderful parish.

RCIA stands for the Rite of Christian Initiation for

Adults. I'm sure many of you know someone who may be interested and may benefit by the process. It's not a program with a definite beginning and ending. It's a process, an on-going faith journey with the purpose of assisting adults who are seeking full communion with the Catholic Church through the Sacraments of Initiation. There isn't any age limit. So if you've never been baptized or if you were baptized in another Christian faith, this process is for you. If you were baptized Catholic but have never received the sacraments of First Eucharist and/

or Confirmation, this process is for you as well. If you just need the sacrament of Confirmation or if you've received all of your sacraments but have been away from the Catholic Church for a number of years, we can help you too. Some who have been through the process have offered their reflections:

I truly enjoyed the RCLA experience at Immaculate Conception. I always looked forward to our weekly classes because of the unbelievably kind and caring people that are part of the RCLA program. Not only did I learn a great deal about the Catholic faith, but I gained a faith family and learned a lot about myself in the process. The program helped me understand myself better as a person and as a Catholic.

I would advise those considering coming into the Catholic church to give yourself time. At first the process can seem overwhelming and you might feel as though you don't belong there; however, with time it becomes an extremely comfortable and rewarding process. As the weeks went on, I looked forward to learning more and more about the church and seeing my RCIA classmates and group leaders. Each person brought such an interesting perspective to the class and all opinions/ questions were discussed openly. The group accepted each person so willingly it was a blessing to be a part of the program. Give yourself time to contemplate, reflect and change. Be kind and open-minded.

This past year I began as a Confirmation catechist teaching a group of students who were confirmed on May 7th. As a new Catholic, I was concerned that I would not know enough about the faith to teach these teens; however, it felt like God was offering a way for me to continue learning about my faith now that the RCLA process was over. I answered the call and am so glad I did. It was a very rewarding experience to talk with these young people about faith and help guide them toward the beautiful sacrament of Confirmation. I plan to continue as a Confirmation catechist this coming year.



I cannot imagine having gone through any other program but the RCLA program at the Church of the Immaculate Conception of Glenville. I would sum it up as one of the most thought-provoking, powerful and truly transforming processes I have been through in my life. This church is now a home to my husband and me and we are blessed to be a part of it!

Thank you for giving me a chance to gush about the program. I appreciate the opportunity to look back and remember just

how wonderful it was becoming a member of this amazing church!

I looked forward to our meetings every Sunday. I planned my schedule around the meetings and was sad when it was over!

Immaculate Conception is such a blessing for me. When the RCIA program ended I wanted to stay involved. I felt I wanted to continue to learn and give back to the church. So many people gave up there time and shared there stories to make my RCIA experience a success. I just had to choose a ministry and get involved. There is a ministry for everyone. I work full time so I am somewhat limited as far as free time. I joined the picnic committee as soon as I finished the program. It was a great way to get to know lots of parishioners. The St. Vincent de Paul Society is made up of 8 to 12 adults dedicated to helping the needy members of our community without regard to religious beliefs. Members are available during the day, Monday through Friday, from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m., although they do not have to be available all the time.

A client who needs financial or food assistance should phone the rectory. The information given there, including the type of help needed and contact information, will be forwarded to a St. Vincent de Paul member on call, who, in turn, will contact the client to gather the details to satisfy the need. If the client needs food, the member will pick up supermarket and\or gas gift cards from the rectory and will then fill the appropriate number of boxes with available food, depending on the size of the family, from the food pantry in the pole barn. If the client is unable to pick up the food, it is delivered to the client's home in the Scotia or Ballston Spa area.

If the client is in need of financial assistance, contacts are made to National Grid, landlords, or other appropriate personnel to verify the validity of the request and ascertain the proper mailing address. Except in dire emergency, a client will not receive cash directly.

Because some members of the St. Vincent de Paul Society cannot physically continue with the required duties, the organization is in need of adults who can replace them. The requirements are outlined above, but anyone who could not commit to these but would still be interested in assisting the group at Thanksgiving and Christmas would be welcome to help sort food and fill baskets at this time when the Society provides food and gifts to over 100 families.

The Story of a Priest by Fr. John Hunter

The following note was recently mailed to the rectory:

When I was a child (which today would be called a kid – although back then a kid was a baby goat) I was an altar server, and I had thoughts of becoming a priest. This lasted a few years.

When I graduated from high school in 1942 I was ready to go into the world. The next year, my "Uncle Sam" sent me a letter asking me to be a part of World War II. At his request, I joined the U.S. Navy.

After the war was over and I left the Navy in 1946, I wanted to enter the seminary. At that point, my dad had died, my sister was married, and my mom was ailing, so I thought I better stay home. I graduated from Siena College and followed a teaching career for the next 34 years!

After my mom died, I finally retired from teaching and I joined the seminary, finally on my way to the priesthood. In 1986 I was ordained by Pope John Paul II. I never dreamed that would happen to me! I was a priest in the Archdiocese of New York until 2007.

At that point I came to the Albany diocese, and asked to celebrate masses as St. John the Baptist. After that I went to St. Margaret of Cortona in Rotterdam Junction, a very joyful and spiritual assignment, thanks be to God!

I am the priest who attends the 5PM mass on Saturday here at Immaculate Conception. You may recognize me with my rollator, and I am there with my cousin Mary Agnes Dame. Fr. Jerry has been most welcoming to me, as are all the parishioners. May the Lord bless us all, now and forever!



My initial introduction to the Church of the Immaculate Conception is not all unique. Like many others, my first experience with Father Jerry and the congregation was at a funeral Mass. Over a relatively short period of time, I actually attended several funerals at Immaculate Conception. After each Mass, I was a bit taken aback with the sense of peace that I felt. In one particular situation, the funeral Mass was for a young woman who died under very tragic circumstances. While there certainly was a great deal of sadness and grief on the part of family and friends following her death, I was once again struck by the overwhelming sense of peace I felt as the service concluded. It was this experience that prompted me to return to Immaculate Conception each week. It truly is a mystery how joy and thankfulness can emerge from sadness and despair.

After attending weekly Mass for several months, Father Jerry invited me to learn more about RCIA. Truthfully, I was a little overwhelmed at the information meeting. I realized that I was not simply contemplating joining a weekly prayer group; I was making a commitment to God.

At the beginning of the first class, between services on a Sunday morning in October, I still wasn't sure if I was ready for such a commitment and spiritual journey. All doubt faded as I got to know my classmates and teachers. The group hit it off quickly and discussions flowed freely. There was a feeling of trust and camaraderie. I came to look forward to our

My journey with RCIA began at the beginning of October and Sunday morning sessions. Kim Klementowski, Deacon Mike, and each of our session leaders provided us with essential information about what it means to live each day as a Catholic. Moreover, they seemed to anticipate our questions and doubts. No topic was "off limits." While I am sure that our teachers had an agenda or lesson plan for every class, it seemed like we rarely stuck to any preplanned script. Instead, our conversations were natural and free-flowing.

> At the start of the process I certainly thought that 30 weeks of classes would be a daunting obligation. In fact, I came to enjoy and look forward to our sessions. Truth be told, I kind of miss our weekly gatherings. In part, the discussions helped me to become more calm and caring about those around me. Instead of being quick to judge others, I now have the peace of mind to get to know people and accept them for who they are. I definitely have become a better, husband, father, and son as a result of my spiritual journey. Again, it is the simple matter of learning the importance of putting others first.

> While I am unsure where my spiritual journey will eventual lead me, I know that I am destined to be of service to others. Recently, I was hospitalized for several weeks. During that time I found great comfort in the regular visits from Eucharistic Ministers who celebrated Holy Communion with me. It is indescribable how these visits helped me to strengthen, physically, emotionally, and spiritually. For these reasons I find myself called to helping those who are hospitalized.
