



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~ Alumni History ~

The W. A. Pattillo High School Alumni Association was the brain child of four of its graduates – Nathan Lewis (Class of 1955), William Boyd (Class of 1959), Rayfield Perkins (Class of 1955), and George Worsley (Class of 1940). Members of the Class of 1955 consented to contribute proceeds from their class reunion held in 1978 to organize the Pattillo Alumni Association. Nathan, Rayfield, William and George made several contacts, encouraging and recruiting other graduates and former students to participate and attend meetings. As a result, chapters were formed in various cities since many of the participants resided out-of-state, predominately in Washington, DC and Philadelphia, PA.

More supporters were attracted following the first reunion. They included: Iris Braswell, Charlie Brown, Lois Cobb, Myrna Deloatch, Evelyn Faulk, Eunice Parker, Hubert Simmons, Grace Swinson, Rev. James Wooten, Marvin Purvis, Eva Bell Norfleet, and Willie "Jig" Giles. During that time, the Interim National President was Nathan Lewis and Iris Braswell served as the Tarboro Chapter President. Alfred Norfleet became the Washington, DC Chapter President and Grady Ashe was elected as the Baltimore, MD Chapter President.

Under the tenure of National President Earlene W. Lawrence, in 1983, the alumni association secured a state charter and become incorporated. Pattillo graduates, Attorneys Jessie Baker and Glennie Matthewson provided assistance. Initially the organization was chartered as the Tarboro Black Education Alumni Association but was later amended to be the W. A. Pattillo High School National Alumni Association, Inc. Charter members included: Grady Ashe, Iris Braswell, Cora Boddie, Jimmie Bullock, Helen Knight, Lorna Lloyd, George Matthewson, and Thomas Perry. The Tidewater chapter was later formed in 1983.

Several Pattillo attendees have served as the National President. They are Nathan Lewis, Jimmie Bullock, Barbara Bratcher Anderson, Earlene Knight Womack, Eva Norfleet, Thomas Newton, and Varnell Vines Kinnin. Fred E. Wood, Jr., Ed.D., was elected in July 2011 and is currently serving in the capacity as National President.

The association has a 501c (3) status with a Board of Directors and a standard slate of officers. It continues to carry out the purpose according to the articles of incorporation which is: to provide scholarships and grants to students deemed worthy by the organization for assistance to further their education; and to provide financial and other assistance to educational institutions at all levels. The association has donated over \$100,000 in scholarships, incentive awards and contributions which have been given to area students and schools in the Edgecombe County Public Schools and beyond since its inception. In 2014, the first Nathan Lewis Member Scholarship was awarded to a senior who graduated from high school in Erial, New Jersey.

The association sponsors a variety of programs and supports local businesses; however, contributions to education are the core of its success. The alumni association will continue its endeavors to improve mankind's quality of life by supporting education at all levels.

Operation of the Association

The W. A. Pattillo High School National Alumni Association, Inc. was the vision of graduates Nathan Lewis, William Boyd, Rayfield Perkins, and George Worsley.

In 1978 following a very financially successful reunion of the Class of 1955, Nathan Lewis and other members of the Class of 1955 agreed to donate the financial proceeds from their class reunion to organize the W. A. Pattillo High School National Alumni Association.

The purpose of the Association is to provide scholarships and grants to students which the organization deems worthy to assist in furthering their education, and to provide financial and other assistance to educational institutions at all levels. The Association is a 501c (3) organization with a Board of Directors and the normal array of corporate officers. Basically, the purpose is the sponsorship and participation in community activities and to have an Annual Reunion celebration that will provide for fellowship and preserving the legacy of W. A. Pattillo High School.

The Association operates basically on three arms: administrative, programs and scholarships. Daily administrative functions are the responsibility of the officers and are supported from membership dues and fundraising efforts. The reunion is self supporting. Officers, chairpersons and directors-at-large receive no financial compensation. Their time and services are strictly on a volunteer basis.

During the association's fiscal year, a number of programs sponsored are spearheaded by a specific committee. The Scholarships and Awards Program is our largest program. It is vital to the success of the association and consistent with its purpose. The Scholarship Committee coordinates and implements the Board approved recommendations for the Scholarship and Awards Program.

#### Distinguished Graduate

#### Dr. Leroy E. Bynum, Jr.

Dr. Leroy E. Bynum, Jr., a Tarboro, NC native, is a 1972 graduate of Tarboro Senior High School and an Honorary Graduate of the W. A. Pattillo High School, Class of 1972. He holds performance degrees from the University of Georgia, where he studied with David Stoffel; the University of South Florida, where he studied with Annetta Monroe; and the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, having studied with Joel Carter.

He currently resides in Portland, Oregon where he serves as Dean of the College of the Arts and Professor of Voice and Opera at Portland State University. Prior to Portland, Leroy served as Dean of the School of Arts and Humanities at the College of Saint Rose in Albany, New York and 22 years at Albany State University in Albany, Georgia and ultimately becoming Dean of the College of Arts and Humanities.


Bynum, a lyric tenor, has appeared as a recitalist and soloist throughout the United States, South America, and Europe. He has sung operatic roles with the Opera Company of Bahia, in Salvador, Brazil, the Munich Opera Company, the German States Opera in Berlin, the Lyric Opera of Salzburg, the St. Petersburg (FL) Opera, Orlando Opera, North Carolina Opera and the Godovsky Opera Workshop. Bynum has performed his signature role of "Tamino" in Mozart's *The Magic Flute* over one hundred times in the US and abroad, including at the world-famous Dresden Opera House in Dresden, Germany.

Bynum has received performance certificates from the Mozart Conservatory in Salzburg, Austria, where he studied with famed tenor, Werner Krenn and celebrated soprano, Hilde Zadek; and the Berlin Conservatory in Berlin, Germany, having studied with renowned baritone, Dietrich Fischer Dieskau. Bynum's other voice teachers include Bennie Middaugh, Bill McGraw, Richard Hughes, and Richard Cassilly.

His teaching has produced a large number of outstanding students, who upon graduation have gone on to graduate study at the most prestigious music schools in the country. As a respected member of Georgia's community of voice teachers, in 2013 Bynum was elected president of the State's chapter of the National Association of Teachers of Singing.

While at Albany State University Bynum founded the institution's Opera Theater program, producing fully staged operas annually, making ASU one of Georgia's only universities with a fully developed opera program, and one of only five HBCUs (Historically Black Colleges and Universities) in the country with such a program. Leroy also served as artistic director of the region's professional opera company, *OperAlbany*, which, under his direction, mounted numerous major productions including George and Ira Gershwin's *Porgy and Bess*; Johann Strauss' *Die Fledermaus*; Bizet's *Carmen*; *The Marriage of Figaro* and *The Impresario* by Mozart; Rossini's *The Barber of Seville*; Puccini's *La Boheme*; and *Dido and Aeneas* by Henry Purcell.

As a choral conductor, Bynum has directed large and small choral ensembles in Florida, Georgia, and New York, and has been a much sought after choral clinician. Leroy founded the highly celebrated Albany State University Concert Chorale, which under his direction, travelled abroad extensively to countries including Austria, the Czech Republic, England, France, Germany, Hungary, Scotland, Switzerland, and Wales, performing for enthusiastic audiences, and to critical acclaim.



#### Distinguished Graduate Tuskegee Airman Captain Willie Howell Fuller

Posthumous Award

Willie Howell Fuller was born to Edward William and Mamie King Fuller on August 2, 1919, on the King Family Farm near Tarboro, North Carolina. His paternal grandparents were Howell and Ida King, both of whom were born at the end of slavery. They lived on the King family farm land which had been purchased by his paternal great-grand parents. Captain Fuller's siblings were Jennie King Carney, Sally King Dancy, Howell King, letta King Thorpe, Demsey King, Allen King, Mattie and Matthew (twins) King, and Meltchus Leander King.

After graduating from Tarboro Colored High School in 1937, Willie pursued a formal education at Tuskegee Institute in Tuskegee, Alabama, where he eventually earned two undergraduate degrees. After receiving his first degree, Willie joined the United States Air Force and served courageously from 1942 to 1947 as a member of the original 99th Fighter Squadron-European Theater with the rank of 2nd Lieutenant. As a fighter pilot, he was instrumental in conquering the Island of Pantelleria, flew 76 combat missions, and was lauded as an "Unsung Hero."

The requirements for admission to the Tuskegee program were deliberately set high with the expectation that few, if any, would qualify. This meant that the men who were admitted were particularly well qualified, a factor that contributed greatly to the success of the program and later to their success in combat.

The 99th Fighter Squadron, including 42 officers and 287 enlisted personnel, departed April 2nd for Camp Shanks, N.Y., en-route to Casablanca, Morocco, North Africa. They arrived on April 24, 1943. The Squadron moved from North Africa to Sicily, then to Foggia, Italy, on October 17, 1943. There the Airmen joined Colonel Earl E. Bates, Jr., Commanding Officer of the 79th (all White) Fighter Group who integrated the 99th Fighter Squadron. The Airmen remained with the 79th over Anzio in 1944.

Captain Fuller's and 99th Fighter Squadron's exemplary combat performance during World War II, including the destruction of 260 enemy aircraft, earned them more than 850 medals and helped to persuade President Harry S. Truman in 1948 to issue Executive Order 9981, desegregating the U. S. Military.

Following his service in the military, Willie owned and operated the first black cab company (The Arrow Cab Company) in La-Grange, Georgia, and went back to Tuskegee to complete a second Bachelor's degree. He then accepted a position with the South Florida Council of Boy Scouts of America in Miami, Florida, where he served as District Executive. Also, during the years immediately after World War II, Fuller served as a flight instructor for civilians.

On visits to his mother and family in Tarboro, Willie would "buzz" her house on West Wilson Street (near Edgecombe Community College), land on a landing strip along side Highway 258 outside of Princeville, and be met there by his mother.

Upon retiring in 1982, he remained an ardent member of the Lakeview United Methodist Church. Before his death on January 2, 1995, he was honored with numerous accolades including the following: Air medal with Oak Leaf (World War II); featured in the landmark exhibition of "Black Wings: The American Black in Aviation" at the Smithsonian Air and Space Museum (1984); recognized by the Congressional Black Caucus for his courageous leadership during World War II (1991); honored by the Metro Dade County Aviation Department for his leadership with the Tuskegee Airmen, and for pioneering efforts for the advancement of Blacks in aviation (1993); featured in a historical display at the Miami Museum of Science and Space Transit Planetarium, Miami, Florida (1994); featured in a historical display at the Troup County Archives Historical Society, LaGrange, Georgia (1994); Memorial Fellowship Room (dedicated to his memory) Union Baptist Church, (1990).

Willie Fuller died on January 2, 1995, and was survived at that time by his wife, Willie Dunson Fuller; Louanna Howell Coleman, daughter; and Demetrius and Donovan Coleman, grandsons.

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#### **Distinguished Graduate**

#### Milton "Pete" Taylor

Posthumous Award

Milton "Pete" Taylor graduated from W. A. Pattillo High School in 1954 where he excelled in football and baseball and was a member of the 1953 NCHSAC State Championship Football Team.

In 1958 Milton received a Bachelor of Science degree from Fayetteville State Teachers' College (now Fayetteville State University). He later obtained a Master's Degree in Education from North Carolina Agricultural and Technical State University in Greensboro, NC and an Advanced Certificate in Education Administration from the Principal's Executive Program at the University of North Carolina-Chapel Hill in Chapel Hill, NC.

Following graduation from Fayetteville State University Milton joined the Kannapolis City School system, where he served as a public educator for over 30 years. He started as a 7th Grade Teacher and Coach at George Washington Carver School, where he was instrumental in leading the school to three district championships.

In 1965, Milton was promoted to Principal of George Washington Carver School. Four years later, he sat at the forefront of integration in Kannapolis, NC. As the Principal of the Carver Seventh Grade Center, he became the first African-American Principal to house students of one grade level citywide in the same facility. Later, as the school was renamed as Kannapolis Middle School, he became well known for creating a student-centered learning environment. He advocated: "one of the best ways to get to know children is to do things with them". Throughout his career, Milton continued to live out this message.

After retirement, Milton continued to lead students to excellence in Math and Science. As one of the founding members of the University of North Carolina at Charlotte's North Carolina Mathematics and Science Education Network (NCMSEN), he orchestrated the development of a pre-college STEM program that expanded throughout the state of North Carolina.

Milton's leadership spread far and wide. He served on the Board of Directors for a number of organizations, including the South Rowan Optimist Club, the South Rowan Community Service Council, where he served as Vice-President, the Cannon Memorial YMCA, the State Math/Science Network, the Kannapolis Rotary Club, the Cabarrus County American Red Cross, the Bible Teaching Association, Cabarrus County Meal on Wheels, Kannapolis Crime Stoppers, Barber-Scotia College Unit of the United Negro College Fund (UNCF), and the Kannapolis Student Loan, Inc.

By 1997, Milton received an abundance of accolades for his service. He was featured in the 1971 edition of the "Personalities of the South", a biographical listing of individuals selected for national, state, and community leadership. In 1978, he received the United Negro College Fund's "Distinguished Service" Award. He received the highest commendation of his profession in 1985 when he was awarded the Association of Citizen's "Educator of the Year" Award, and the Kannapolis City Schools Local Board of Education's office personnel, "Administrator of the Year" Award. Milton also received the YMCA Southeastern Distinguished Service Award, the Cannon Memorial YMCA Board's "Director of the Year" Award, the YMCA of the USA South Field Distinguished Leadership, the YMCA Northern Piedmont Cluster Hall of Fame Award, and the Distinguished Rotarian Award for the 7680 District. In 2016 he was inducted into the Kannapolis African-American Museum and Cultural Center, Inc. (KAA-MaCC) Legacy Hall of Fame for his lifetime achievement in Education, Civic Leadership and Community Activism.

Milton was a member and served as a Trustee for Sandy Ridge AME Zion Church. He was also a lifetime member of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc., Phi Chi Chapter, where he received the "Man of the Year" Awards in 1978, 1984, and 1992. Milton was an International Life Member of the Optimist Club. He served as the first African-American Lieutenant Governor for the Kannapolis Rotary Club for District 7680, where he received the 1993 Paul Harris Fellow Award. Milton was also a member of the NC Teachers Association (NCTA), the NC Association of Educators (NCAE), the NC State Principals Association (NCASA) and the National Association of Elementary School Principals (NAESP).

Milton "Pete" Taylor distinguished himself as a graduate of the W. A. Pattillo High School.

Evelyn attended Edgecombe County schools and graduated from George Washington Carver High School in Pinetops, NC, May of 1947.

Upon graduation, she enrolled in Fayetteville State Teacher's College where she majored in Elementary Education. She excelled at the university and earned her B.S. degree in Elementary Education in May of 1951. After earning her degree, she returned to Edgecombe County to begin her teaching career at White's Chapel Elementary School in Speed, NC. In December of 1952, she married her husband, the late Thomas (Tommy) Reeves, a Marine, and they had five children, Thomas, Sylvia, Dennis, Ricky, and Lavita. Tommy later became an educator as well and coached basketball at Conetoe High School. From 1951-1957, Evelyn taught at Living Hope Elementary School in Macclesfield, NC. During the 1957-1958 school year, she taught 6th and 7th graders at Conetoe High School and later taught at Pattillo Elementary School from 1959-1960. She was hired as a 5th grade teacher at Princeville Elementary School from 1960-1970. During the 1969-1970 school year, her husband was hired as a Biology instructor and basketball coach at Fayetteville State University and the Reeves family relocated to Fayetteville, NC.

During the 1970-71 school year, Evelyn began working at her alma mater, in the Preschool Laboratory. In 1974, she earned her Master's Education degree from North Carolina Central University. During her tenure at Fayetteville State, Mrs. Reeves taught preschool and later became the Coordinator of the Early Childhood Learning Center program until her retirement in July 1991. 





# DID YOU KNOW?



#### The Sanders Rest Home

Mrs. Delia Mack Sanders was born in Cape Charles, Virginia on July 13, 1907. At the age of two she moved with her family to Edgecombe County. For the majority of her adult life she lived at her original 913 Panola Street address.

In 1942 her husband, Sam Sanders, became ill and was ultimately bedridden. For the 19 years she provided daily care and comfort to him for his slowly declining health situation which included total blindness. Mrs. Sanders' brother, Mr. Charlie Mack, a single amputee, also resided in the home and received assistance from his sister. Her brother died in 1961 and her husband in 1962.


Mrs. Sanders found herself in an untenable position following these deaths which resulted in a loss of income and forced her to return to the only form of work available to her in Tarboro -- domestic day work. Moreover, she found herself left with idle hands and it was hard not to engage in the daily caring and comforting behavior that had occupied her life for the past two decades.

Her family physician, Dr. Howard Hussey, recommended that she take in boarders as a form of income but more so as a return to a mentality and a posture that she had known for so long and done so well with. Following the applications and processing, her home was licensed as the Sanders' Rest Home. There was no sign or shingle hung as she took in two gentlemen who were ambulatory but needed some assistance in getting along.

In 1962, she added rooms to her house making room for two more patients in this assisted family living atmosphere. Her daughter, Mary Hyman Wood Carney joined her in the management of the facility and James "Simp" Harrell assumed a part-time position as a caretaker for the four men assisting them with daily health and hygiene needs.

During the fifteen year history of the rest homes there was several changes in the patients. However, one patient, Mr. Roosevelt Drake, remained for the duration and was residing in the home at the time of Mrs. Sanders' death in February of 1976. The rest home closed in April of 1976.

# Oakland Plantation Circa Mid-1800s

#### St. Paul Baptist Church

900 Lloyd Street, Tarboro

St. Paul Baptist Church is a historic African-American Baptist church located at Lloyd Street and Edmondson Avenue in Tarboro, Edgecombe County, North Carolina. The church was built in 1871, and is a one-story, irregularly massed frame building with multiple gabled wings, and a corner tower. It is sheathed in weatherboard with abundant wooden decoration. The interior features a large open sanctuary with a dome and oculus above. It was moved from its original Main Street site to the present location about 1926.

#### **Oakland Plantation**

(also known as Lloyd Farm and the Elks Lodge) North side of Edmondson Avenue 2 lots east of Lloyd Street, Tarboro

A historic plantation house located at Tarboro, Edgecombe County, North Carolina. The frame dwelling dates to the mid-19th century, and consists of a two-story central section with flanking one-story wings and a series of rear additions. It has shallow hip roofs with Italianate brackets and features a one-story porch of the distinctive Tarboro lattice type. By 1931, the dwelling was occupied as an Elks Lodge for the African-American population.
