Telling the Truth

A light snow is falling again as I write. We just finished a cold snap that drove temperatures down into single digits over several nights and even a few degrees below zero one morning. It's weather I've long associated with west Michigan winters and most of us are prepared for the worst. Our greatest concern has been keeping goats and chickens supplied with water during the bitterest days. Otherwise most of our daily routines remain little changed. For now, winter maintains its frigid grip on our part of the world. However, daylight is growing noticeably longer. Within a few weeks, warmer breezes will breathe life into the landscape and a new growing season will begin.

Lent falls during this annual transition from winter to spring. It can be a season to prepare for spiritual growth. It is a time to look toward resurrection's dawn. Yet we do so walking in the long shadow of the cross. We do not reach that sunrise other than through the path of the shadow. While many people may see this as a solitary journey--focusing on self-examination or self-improvement-- it's important to join hands and walk that walk together. I firmly believe faith is personal, but not private. You and I need each other in our spiritual journeys. Those things that live in my heart at some point will reveal themselves in my life and relationships.

This year, relationships need attention. Many of us have struggled to maintain and strengthen our personal relationships during the epidemic. While many of us have been aware of the growing fissures in our civil society for years, the insurrection at the U.S. Capitol on January 6th revealed just how poisonous privileged entitlement can be. Not only media personalities, but also office holders have stoked the fires of fear and hate against our fellow citizens with falsehoods. These same voices have manipulated faith language to rally the mob. Murder is not a Christian value...at least not in the church in which I grew up. As tiresome as it may sound we have to continue speaking the truth in love. We may not remain silent as a way to keep the peace.

The Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. wrote in his "Letter from the Birmingham Jail: "We will have to repent in this generation not merely for the vitriolic words and actions of bad people, but for the appalling silence of the good people. We must come to see that human progress never rolls in on wheels of inevitability. It comes through the tireless efforts and persistent work of men [and women] willing to be co-workers with God, and without this hard work time itself becomes an ally of the forces of social stagnation. We must use time creatively, and forever realize that the time is always ripe to do right."

Only the truth can bring us together. Only the truth will set us all free.



Holocaust Remembrance Event Sunday, March 21, 3:30 pm Virtual Presentation



Irene Miller is a Holocaust survivor. Her book, 'Into No Man's Land', speaks of her survival journey from Poland to no man's land where Jews from Poland fled towards Sovietoccupied Poland in 1939-40 where she spent the winter under an open sky. With the outbreak of the German invasion of the Soviet Union, her journey continued to a Siberian labor camp where the bears come to your door front. She will talk about her journey to Uzbekistan where she lived will on boiled grass or broiled onions, and shivered with malaria, and the years in orphanages.
