Mt. Irish

DAS visited Mt. Irish in October 2010.

The Mt. Irish site is one of many located in the Pahranagat Valley of Lincoln County Nevada. Mt. Irish is set up as a "Rock Art and Archaeological District" by the BLM.

The Mt. Irish sits above the Pahranagat Valley at above 5000 ft. The vegetation is primarily juniper / pinion forest. The sites in this area were not habitation sites, but rather hunting and gathering sites, with the habitation sites lower in the valley area where there was most likely a good water supply. The Pahranagat Valley was on a major north - south trade route that ran through the Mesquite / Overton area. We visited four of the sites on Mt. Irish. All of these sites were rock outcroppings that created good shelter from the elements, making them good camp sites. They were located around washes that would have supplied water at various times of the year.

The rock art consisted of Great Basin rectilinear and curvilinear styles along with later Shoshoni or Paiute style. The recognizable patterns consisted of many rain and star patterns along with sheep and deer / elk figures. The anthropomorphs were very different from the anasazi types of the St. George area. Absent were the common anasazi migration symbol (spiral), and clan symbols common in the St. George area. The sheep and deer symbols are often observed to have overwritten the abstract patterns indicating they were from the later groups (Shoshoni / Paiute).

Monolith Echo Panel

The rock art was located on a north facing wall. This site had mostly Great Basin Abstract images some of which have been overwritten with more figurative designs.

Figure 18 is interesting. It has a rectangular sheep (the only one) that is similar to ones on Anasazi Ridge. At the bottom it has a series of figures from left; thin man, fat man,

upright burden basket. In t he center is a symbol that is probably a cloud with rain, but looks like a sombrero or a spaceship. Next to it is another thin man, burden basket and two other men. This panel looks Virgin Anasazi (Gold Butte) and appears to be the only one of its type on the sites that we visited.
