<u>Last Month's Program</u> – Carole DeGrenier provided our February program. She gave a mini workshop on how to make Microwave Bowl hot pads to protect from burns when removing bowls from the microwave. She explained how the bowls were made and provided directions as well as providing dos and don'ts for making these bowls. Two big things to remember are to use 100% cotton thread and you can't use batting such as Insul-Bright between the layers or any other project for microwave use! Machines were set up at the meeting for those who were interested in trying their hand at making a bowl! Also, thanks to Carole for showing us how to make port pillows for breast cancer patients. This is a great project for those small pieces of fabric you have left from your sewing projects. Thanks, Carole for volunteering for the February program!

<u>Secret Pal</u>


If you turned in a form to take part in this year's Secret Pal, you should have received the name of the person drawn for you. If did not get your name or if you have any questions, get with Carolyn.

<u>**Quilt Show Update**</u> – Wow! Only 6-1/2 months until show time! We had a show committee meeting Feb 23^{rd} and are really making headway. Thanks to those who have already committed to work in certain areas of the show! It is so exciting knowing that all of you are getting ready too! Here are some of the things from the meeting:

- Vendors We now have 12 vendors who have registered to attend the show! At this point, Becky will have to look at the layout to see if we will have room for additional vendors.
- Hospitality Jinnia has really been on the ball getting the menu and a budget for the food the day of set-up, the reception on Thursday night and the meals during the show on Friday and Saturday. She is working on a signup sheet for members to signup to donate a few of the food items.
- Hospitality Brenda Mayfield and Jackie Fink are our new co-chairs for this area. Wrist bands have been decided upon, admission fee is set for \$5.00 and children 10 & under will be free.
- Judging The contract for the judge is being put together to get finalized. Judging will be conducted the first part of the week of the show this time.
- Quilt Receiving Angie Fortner is working on the process for receiving the quilts and holding them until the day of judging.
- Layout Becky is working on the show layout. This year the layout will change dramatically since we are having a bed turning, quilt appraisals and the Hoffman Challenge. Also the vendors and quilts in separate locations of the Civic Center.
- Bed Turning/Appraisals Bernice is working the setup and an antique headboard has been loaned for the bed turning. The contract with Alma Moates is finalized.
- Community Service Sharon has started a list of those who are willing to donate a basket or items for baskets to be put together. This will give us baskets other than those donated by vendors and local merchants.
- Photography Angie Dempsey is our photographer again! She is working on the possibility of us having CDs of the quilt show available for purchase.
- Publicity Anita has the write up ready for the websites that have quilt shows listed. She will be getting postcards printed as soon as the opportunity quilt can be photographed for all of the publicity items.

Lick Skillet Recipe Corner

Nutter Butter – Banana Pudding Triffle

3 cups milk 3 large eggs

- 3/4 cup sugar
- 1/3 cup all-purpose flour
- 2 tablespoons butter
- 2 teaspoons vanilla extract
- 5 medium-size ripe bananas

1 (1-lb.) package peanut butter sandwich cookies (Nabisco Nutter Butter)

2 cups sweetened whipped cream

Garnishes: cookies, dried banana chips, fresh mint sprigs

1. Whisk together first 4 ingredients in a large saucepan over medium-low heat. Cook, whisking constantly, 15 to 20 minutes or until thickened. Remove from heat; stir in butter and vanilla until butter is melted.

2. Fill a large bowl with ice. Place saucepan in ice, and let stand, stirring occasionally, 30 minutes or until mixture is thoroughly chilled.

3. Meanwhile, cut bananas into 1/4-inch slices. Break cookies into thirds.

4. Spoon half of pudding mixture into a 3-qt. bowl. Top with bananas and cookies. Spoon remaining pudding mixture over bananas and cookies. Top with sweetened whipped cream. Cover and chill 2 to 24 hours. Garnish, if desired.

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Educational Corner – *Applique* – *Using Fusibles and Stablizers* – If you started out sewing clothes, then you are familiar with interfacings to stiffen particular parts of garments. Quilters now have newer versions of interfacings, called fusibles, that have revolutionized quilting by allowing us more freedom to create designs, reposition and layer designs, and stabilize and adhere embroidery.

You have huge options with stabilizers. Do you want to thread paint, using only thread to create a wispy, original design that you can attach to your quilt? Do you want to stabilize an edge for an unusual treatment? Do you want to protect a delicate fabric from stretching as you embellish it? Stabilizers are temporary, permanent, heat activated, and tear-away, giving you all these possibilities. Permanent ones provide stretch resistance and stay with the fabric through laundering. Temporary ones are easy to tear away and prevent distortion of stitches. Wash-away stabilizers are easy to remove when you don't want anything to show on top, bottom, or through layers. Some will even disintegrate with heat, perfect when distortion would occur by wetting or tearing.

Fusibles allow you to place both large and small pieces temporarily on background fabric until you can sew them in place. You can add a fusible to the back of appliqué pieces and then iron them permanently in place on your backing fabric, or hold them temporarily. You can check various brands and determine which is best for your project.

Some fusible interfacings are too heavy for appliqué, either by machine or hand. They are permanent and thick, making it very difficult to get needles (machine or hand) through to anchor into place. Heavy fusibles will clog your needle, causing thread breakage. Light-weight interfacings may be a better choice. Keep in mind the options in fusibles include those developed just for quilting, so you have more choices. The wrong fusible can lead to thread breakage and problems with tension on your machine.

Fusibles with a sticky back have a couple of advantages. You can trace your appliqué pieces right on to the fusible web and cut out fairly intricate designs. You can use this for large pieces of fabrics, as well as thick fabrics like Ultrasuede. Perhaps most important, you can move your appliqué pieces around very easily, so you can design as you go.

A double stick fusible allows you to stick the entire appliqué piece in place. You can pin pieces to the design wall to check placement without worrying about gravity. You also can put your project aside and pieces won't move, which is great for transporting a project or taking a break.

With fusibles, your iron is critical, as is reading the directions for your particular fusible. If your fusible peels off, then you have not used enough heat. Read about your setting, and experiment with some sample pieces. A teflon plate on your iron (or added to an old one) helps with the potentially sticky mess caused by using fusibles.

Landscape quilts are an example of an innovative approach to appliqué using fusibles. Choose fabrics representative of a particular scene. You can iron a fusible to the backs of your fabrics, cut out bushes and other features, pin and then iron onto the background permanently. You could also use a temporary fusible to allow you to create a complete scene, with repositioning at any time. When you are done, then iron the completed scene, melting the fusible to permanence.

The creative options, available in appliqué through the use of fusibles, is incredible. You can create just about anything and stretch your own ideas even further with any of these new products.
